Notices of Epecial Meetings must be delivered at the residence of Members of The Borough Council at least twenty (20) hours before time to meet. When the President takes the Chair, the Members shall take their seats and there shall be GENERAL SILENCE.

The President shall decide all questions of order without DEBATE, but Members shall have the right to appeal from the decision of the CHAIR, when the question shall be, SHALL THE DECISION OF THE CHAIR STAND AS THE JUDGMENT OF COUNCIL, majority of Members present will decide.

When any Member disturbs the order of the Meeting, or refuses to obey the Presiding Officer, he shall be asked to leave the room, and if he refuses to leave, he will be excluded from the room.

No Member shall be interrupted while speaking except it shall be to call him to order, or for the purpose of explanation.

All Members when addressing the Chair, shall stand and respectfully address the President. He shall confine himself to the question which is under debate, and avoid all personal and SARCASTIC LANGUAGE.

No motion shall be subject to debate until it has been seconded and has been stated so from the Chair.

On the call of three Members, Debate shall cease, and a vote shall be taken on the subject under debate.

Before putting the question the President shall ask is the Council ready for the question, and if no Member rises to speak, he shall put the question. After he puts the question, no Member shall be permitted to speak.

The person named first on any Committee shall act as Chairman. A motion to lay on the table shall be decided without debate.

When a motion is postponed indefinitely, it shall not be acted on during that Meeting.

No motion for reconsideration shall be in order if made by a Member who voted in the minority in the first instance.

It shall be the duty of the Secretary to record the names in the Minutes of all Officials of The Borough who attend Council Meetings, recording the time of their departure.

Any Borough Official desiring to leave the Council Chamber during any meeting of Council before adjournment shall obtain permission of the President of Council to retire.

All questions of order not provided for by these rules must be determined by ROBERTS RULES OF ORDER.

OFFICTAL- WEST VIEW BOROUGH ORDINANCE NO.

An Ordinance amending the Zoning Ordinance of the Borough of West View.

B e it ordained and enacted by the Town Council of The Borough of West View, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by the authority of the same, that Article VI of the Zoning Ordinance of the Borough of West View, Section 15, Sub-section (b) now reading "In 'A' residential district all dwellings must be two stories in height not including the roof" shall be amended to read as follows:

"ARTICLE VI, Section 15 (b) In "A" residential districts all dwellings must be two-stories in height, not including the roof, provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the erection of a one-story ranch type dwelling, provided the overall width of the front thereof on the public highway or street, shall be not less than sixty feet."

Any Ordinance or part of Ordinance, inconsistent or conflicting with this Ordinance be and the same is hereby repealed.

Linutes of a Special Meeting of The Town Council of The Borough of West View held Tuesday Evening, February 2, 1954.

The Call Letter was read by the President of Council.

Meeting was called to order at 8:29 by President of Council, A. L. Kress.

Roll Call...... Was answered by the following Members of Council; Messrs. Heil, Link, Mash and Kress. Burgess-Mr. Gahring; Manager-Mr. Deem; Controller-Mr. Douglas; Solicitor-Mr. Brandt; and Secretary-Mrs. Guckert; were present.

Rezoning...... President of Council announced to the Audience that the purpose of Wellington Hts. this Meeting was a Hearing RE; Amendment to Zoning Ordinance affecting the Residential "A" Use District.

Attorney W. A. Walker representing Mr. A. A. Scholze, who would like to build a Ranch Type Dwelling on a double lot on Marquette Road, which is the "A" Residential District. An amendment to the Zoning Ordinance states that in this District only two story homes may be erected.

Councilman Kress... Corrected the statement, calling attention that the amendment only defines what a two story dwelling is.

Mr. Walker..... Stated that he and Mr. Scholze believe that an attempt to build a ranch type house, which is one story, would be a non-conforming use and in violation of the Ordinance.

He stated Mr. Scholze wants to build a one story house where his

He stated Mr. Scholze wants to build a one story house where his wife would not have to go up and down stairs, and that after this matter was started last fall, they found there was some opposition to it. It was said that Mr. Scholze, in the deeds he himself had provided against one story houses. None of the restrictions which were placed in the deeds would restrict the building of a ranch or one story type house.

Mr. Walker stated they have a petition of 50 signatures of neighbors in the vicinity, some next door neighbors and people living adjacent asking that the Ordinance be amended.

He also stated he understands a letter was gotten out by the Civic Association, suggesting there should be some objection to this. Mr. Walker further stated that when any municipality wants to control building and curtail the use of a man's private property, they have to justify it under the laws of Pennsylvania. Pursuant to State Legislation, Boroughs enact an Ordinance and the purpose is for the general welfare of the municipality, but various provisions of zoning ordinances have been held illegal — no ordinance (Zoning Ordinance) is legal until or unless it has been tested by the courts.

Mr. Walker called attention to a case in Philadelphia, 1952; Judge Irvine ruled you could have a maximum height limit on a house, but not a minimum.

Mr. Walker continuing; Mr. Scholze wanted to build last fall, but Mr. Scholze wants to be friendly with his neighbors and would not challenge your Ordinance, although the Ordinance is bad in law — it bears no relation to public safety, morals or health. We cannot control the esthetic value in a house. We would like to, but a man can paint his house yellow with red circles. If a building is structually sound, you cannot prevent a man from building it.

Mr. Walker stated they did not want to change the Ordinance - only asked that it be amended, to permit this home. If these signatures are correct, all of the immediate neighbors have signed and do not object. The neighbors higher up on the plan cannot even see the roof.

Mr. Walker said: "I submit this petition. We just want to have the Ordinance amended. Tomorrow, if I may, I would like to submit the case to Mr. Brandt."

Mr. Walker then presented a set of plans and sketches if anyone wanted to examine them.

- Petition..... Mr. Kress referred the petition to the Solicitor, Mr. Brandt, who read it.
- Mr. Resler... Wellington Drive said the question was asked how many people on Marquette Road had signed the petition. It was his understanding 9 families, which is a minority of residents. He stated he is directly interested as there are some more properties where a similar structure could be erected if the ordinance is amended. He said he has the highest regard for Mr. Scholze and his service to the Wellington Heights Plan and stated as follows: "However, I submit to you, as an interested party, I think it is rather late to change the rules." He stated that in all fairness to the property owners who live adjacent and abided by the rules all these years, and as an interested party, he submits to Council that the Ordinance stands as it was passed originally.
- Mr. Daniels... Mr. Daniels advised that he is a fairly newcomer to the Borough and that when they planned to move out this direction, they thought of a ranch type dwelling, but preferred to live in the Wellington Heights Plan; we felt we would rather live in a community where there is a community spirit and we like the plan. He stated they have lived there three years and there have been people build in the community who would have preferred ranch type houses, but instead they agreed to go along and build homes to conform with the architecture. He stated: "I therefore, submit to you that I think the Ordinance should stand as it is."
- Mr. Armour... Wellington Drive stated that about eight years ago they moved into their first home in this same area. At that time, a hearing was held and this hall (Council Chamber) was packed with people. As Mr. Armour recalled, there was a request to build double homes on about thirty lots. Mr. Armour was referring to the hearing RE:

 Murrer-Phillips who wanted to erect these double houses. At that time, no change was made in the Ordinance to permit them.

 Mr. Armour then stated he strongly opposed the changing of the Ordinance now.

Councilman Tiernan ... Entered the Meeting at 8:58.

- Mr. Hoffman......Quentin Hoffman, 10 Wellington Drive, stated he built one of the first houses in the plan and has seen this community grow. He stated: "I want to register my objection to any change in the Ordinance."
- Mr. Solari......Stated that next to his home there are three lots. His home is built high and if a ranch type home were built next to his home, he is against changing the Ordinance.
- Mr. Lloyd.......Stated he is a relative newcomer, having been in the Borough a little less than two years. They came to Wellington Heights because they liked the type of homes in the community, and Mr. Lloyd said certainly he wanted to voice his objections to changing the Ordinance to permit ranch type of homes.
- Mr. Armour......Stated the people in the plan have nothing against ranch type houses there are many beautiful ranch types, but they feel they are incongruous with the homes that are there now, and even though it would be at the end of Marquette Road, there are empty lots in three strategic places in Wellington Heights where ranch type homes could be built and two of them Mr. Armour could see.
- Mr. Boyer......Of Montclair Avenue & Marquette Drive, stated he approached the Borough Manager about a year and a half ago about building a ranch type house. The Wellington Heights people contacted me and asked me to go along with the present type homes. I agreed, and it cost me more than \$700.00, but I am glad that I went along. Hr. Boyer said he objects to any change in the Ordinance. He also stated he had two more lots and if he sells them, a ranch type home could be built.

- Mr. Herzberg...Mr. Herzberg stated he has been Secretary of the Wellington Heights Ass'n. under two Presidents and been in contact with the new buildings. He has strongly advocated that they keep to the general type of two-story dwellings throughout the district. It is because of the uniformity of the dwellings that Mr. Herzberg came into the district and if any changes are made in the zoning, it will be the straw that breaks the "Camel's" back and will ruin it.
- Mr. Scholze...Stated he thought some of the remarks made here are allright, and that there are a few who came in originally and built their homes. He stated that when this hearing was posted, there was a letter up until 1945, before this Ordinance was passed, they never had any arguing. What they did then was had a plan submitted and about a half dozen persons were called and talked it over, and if there were any suggestions, Mr. Scholze took it up with the owners they never had this wrangling and still they had nice homes. He stated a lot of these people moved from a neighborhood not as good as this and now they think you should build a 1946 dwelling instead of a 1954.
- Mr. Armour....Stated that what I'r. Scholze said may be correct, excepting that in 1946, we were faced with a movement to put in a number of double dwellings and at that time the Wellington Heights Ass'n. and the Borough of West View took steps to protect from any change of type of homes there.
- Mr. Scholze....Stated that if that were the thing they wanted to correct, then they should have put something in their Ordinance.
- Mr. Brandt....Clarified the Ordinance which describes a two-story single family dwelling. He explained there was a dispute arose as to what a single family dwelling was. As a result, this Council in a series of meetings, amended the Ordinance to include the definition of what a two-story dwelling is.
- Restricted..... There was some discussion about the restrictions in the deeds Deeds minimum costs \$10,000.00, based on 1929 prices, slate roofs, etc.
- is why he is here. If Mr. Scholze had told me to, he would have his ranch type home. He cited that the Courts threw out the whole zoning Ordinance in Ross Township and they had to enact a whole new Ordinance.

Mr. Nash explained he was basing the reduction on the following: It is his understanding the Borough will realize \$37,500 from the Wage Tax which is 1/4 of the \$140,000 expected in real estate taxes or an increase in taxes of 34 mills. The reduction asked is only 2 mills.

Mr. Tiernan pointed out that the \$10,000 set up for Recreation this year is the equivalent of a 1 mill tax.

Manager's Rept... Mr. Deem said he had an inquiry as to the changing of the name of Purdue Avenue to Princeton Avenue. One street leads to the other.

Mr. Deem suggested that bids be obtained for the cost of repairing the roof of the Municipal Building. Also, the roof over the back porch is leaking. He suggests removing the roof and floor and capping it with concrete - this would save the basement under the porch, which is useful.

Mr. Deem suggested that the parking on Chalfonte and Mentworth Avenues be changed to permit parking on both sides of these streets.

Mr. Hurley said he and the Burgess were up in that vicinity, and they realize there should be some changes. Permitting parking on both sides of these two streets may cause requests for parking on both sides of streets all over the Borough. This matter was turned over to the Police Committee and the Burgess.

Finance Committee ... Chairman Tiernan reported that the Finance Committee recommends the following requests received from the Board of Health: A fund of \$200.00 be set up for materials and expenses for 1954, for the Board of Health in the 1954 Budget. To increase the salary of the Secretary of the Board from \$72.00 to \$114.00 and increase the salary of the Health Officer from \$300.00 to \$360.00 annually, both effective as of January 1. Cost, Attorney, representing Phillip Zell, 1401 Center Avenue, said that Mr. Zell has a septic tank, and would like permission to extend a sewer down Yale Avenue to connect into either the sewer which was installed at the time Mr. Marciniak built or into the sewer on Stanford Avenue, and asked for the Borough to help with the expense of the installation. Mr. Cost advised that the owner of the property next door, Mrs. Callahan, has advised she would like to sewer her property into the same sewer and will share the expense.

Mr. Cost requested that the proper committee be appointed to

Mr. Cost requested that the proper committee be appointed to investigate the matter and report their findings to Council. Chairman Kress referred the matter to the Public Works and the Borough Manager.

Linutes of an Adjourned Heeting of The Town Council of the Borough of West View held Tuesday Evening, April 20, 1954, in the Council Chamber.

Meeting was called to order at 8:18 by President A. L. Kress.

Roll Call...... Was answered by the following Members of Council: Messrs.

Guckert, Heil, Hurley, Link, Wash, Tiernan and Kress.

J. L. Gahring - Burgess; Carl Brandt - Solicitor; C. F. Deem
Manager; and Mrs. Guckert - Secretary; were present.

Center Avenue..... The subject of Center Avenue from Norwich to Oakwood Avenues was brought up.

Mr. Heil is of the opinion the grade on the side to be opened should conform to the level of the opposite side of the street up to the hump where it meets the grade of the carline and then follow the carline through to Oakwood Avenue.

Mr. Brandt advised that before the work is started, the site should be viewed by Council and a grade decided upon and referred to him to prepare the necessary Ordinance.

Mr. Heil advised that the Borough will have to take care of the grade as we are not going into a contract with Murrell to take care of our damages. Ir. Heil's object is to take a cut along the grade suggested by him so that traffic can go through.

Mr. Brandt advised that the contract should provide that if at any time Council felt the excavating was not going as it should the work could be stopped. He remarked that Council is dealing with property belonging to the Borough of West View, and if anything is going to be done on the street, there should be a contract covering the proposed work.

Mr. Deem explained the contractor proposes excavating as he needs the fill - using it as a 'borrow-pit'.

Mr. Brandt suggests the matter should be referred back to Mr. Heil and the Borough Manager for study and recommendations as to the contract be reported, and then Council decide on whether or not to do the work.

Mr. Heil suggested a meeting of the people, up here, to see if a majority want the street opened or not. If they do, maybe get some bids and have a contract and get the work done, rather than allow someone to use it as a 'Borrow-pit' and perhaps leave a mudhole.

Mr. Hurley advised if you are going to make this a permanent improvement, you will have to assess the property owners and if, after talking with the owners, that is what they want, then, in that event, have them get a petition signed and present to Council.

Mr. Wash asked why it would be necessary to charge these people for a permanent improvement - some streets were paved last year and the property owners were not assessed.

Page #2 - April 20, 1954.

Mr. Wash was advised the hard-surfacing was not a permanent improvement.

Mr. Tiernan suggests that if no grade has been established, Council may want to hear from the abutting property owners and see what their ideas are.

Mr. Tiernan and Mr. Hurley referred Council back to the following Motion of Council at the March 9 Meeting:

"Motion by Mr. Tiernan, seconded by Mr. Hurley, that the Borough Manager and the Public Works Committee be authorized to get an estimate from an Engineering Company as to what the cost would be to draw up a set of plans for Center Avenue from Morwich Avenue to Cakwood Avenue.

Motion carried and so ordered."

Motion by Mr. Hurley, seconded by Mr. Tiernan, that the Borough Manager and the Public Works Committee be empowered to get an Engineer to run lines to lay out Center Avenue and draw up a plan, Morwich Avenue to Oakwood Avenue, to be submitted to Council, the cost of the same shall not exceed \$750.00. Under Question - Mr. Mash asked if it is Mr. Tiernan's suggestion to get an Engineer to see what the thing is going to cost. The answer was that Council will be able to see what work is involved. Motion carried and so ordered.

The matter is turned over to the Property & Purchase Committee, and Chairman Mr. Guckert requested the Manager to make an inspection of it and if necessary to make emergency repairs, to do so.

Chairman of Fire & Water, Mr. Link, was requested to have the Fire Department make up a list, the cost of which is not to exceed \$750.00, for recommended equipment, presenting same to Council.

Applications for position as Guards at West View Park for the picnic season of 1954 were received from the following:

Mr. Nash inquired as to how many resided in the Borough of West View and was advised. He recommends men from the Borough of West View be given perference for the jobs.

Motion by Mr. Nash, seconded by Mr. Tierman, that Council suspend the rules to hear from the former Guards in the audience. Roll Call - Ayes: Messrs. Guckert, Heil, Hurley, Link, Hash, Tierman and Kress. Nays: Hone. Carried and so ordered.

Mr. Roberts, speaking for the group does not feel they walked off the job, but that they had notified Council by letter dated May 14 that their services were terminated as of 1:00 A.M. the morning of May 20, 1953.

Mr. Hurley said that after two of the former Guards visited him about this matter, he reviewed the matter thoroughly and it is his recommendation that these men not be rehired.

Mr. Heil asked if the rate of wage scale is the same at the present time as it was at the time the men quit their jobs because they did not get an increase and the answer was that it is the same rate now as then.

Chairman Kress, after a discussion, asked what is the wish of Council in the matter, to which it was suggested the matter be held in abeyance until a Special Meeting, and that perhaps it

would be well to invite former Burgess Baker to that meeting.

Motion by Mr. Tiernan, seconded by Mr. Murley, that Council return to the Regular Order of Business. Roll Call - Ayes: Messrs. Guckert, Heil, Hurley, Link, Wash, Tiernan and Kress. Mays: None. (Tentatively set for Monday, April 26.) Carried and so ordered.

Adjourn...... Motion by Mr. Heil, seconded by Mr. Link, that Council adjourn. Carried and so ordered at 11:59 P.M.

THE BOROUGH OF WEST VIEW April 26, 1954.

Minutes of a Special Meeting of the Town Council of the Borough of West View held Monday Evening, April 26, 1954, in the Council Chamber at the Municipal Building.

Meeting called to order at 8:13 by President of Council, A. L. Kress.

Mr. Kress announced the notices were sent for the Special Meeting for the purpose of appointing Guards to serve at West View Park for the coming Season.

Roll Call..... Was answered by the following Members of Council: Messrs. Guckert, Heil, Hurley, Link, Mash, Tiernan and Kress.

Burgess - J. L. Gahring; Manager - C. F. Deem; Solicitor - Carl Brandt; and Secretary - Mrs. Guckert; were present.

Mr. Wash requested that before the matter of hiring Guards is taken up, that Chief Kaesmeier be requested to come into the Council Chamber, and the Chief entered.

The Chair asked if anyone in the Audience had anything to say and Mr. Roberts, a former Guard, said there may be some misinter-pretation in the question of the former Guards and that some clarification in the matter was due. The Former Guards do not feel they 'walked off the job'. Former Burgess, Walter J. Baker was in the audience by request of Council.

Mr. Heil said it should be clearly understood that the wage scale is still the same for the jobs as it had been when these men quit, and if any of the applicants were accepted, they accept the jobs with the understanding they clearly know what the wage scale is.

Mr. Kress stated the wage is set up in the Salary Ordinance at 85ϕ per hour. Mr. Heil asked if he is correct in his understanding that the West View Park Company voluntarily donates 30ϕ per hour toward the wages, to which Mr. Kress replied that it is strictly a voluntary contribution and that the Borough cannot compel West View Park Company to donate 30ϕ for each man hour worked.

After hearing remarks from Mr. Roberts and Mr. Faessel, Mr. Baker was called upon to remark about the former Guards resigning on account of not receiving an increase in salary.

Mr. Baker said that under date of April 24, 1953, a letter was addressed to Council and himself, signed by the Guards who had been sworn in, that they were asking for an increase. This letter was presented to Council at the next Regular Meeting, which was May 12, 1953. A motion was unanimously adopted that the Guards be advised the salary Ordinance was closed for 1953 and could not be opened to allow consideration this year for increases in their wages.

Mr. Baker further advised that a second letter, under date of May 14, 1953, addressed to his attention, stated that the men who were signing the letter were terminating their aidliations with the Borough effective May 20, 1953, at one o'clock A.M. The letter was read at the Regular Council Meeting on June 9, 1953, and Council unanimously adopted a motion to accept the resignations.

Mr. Baker stated that during the interim between May 20 and the Regular Feeting June 9, he used his emergency powers to hire Guards to work the Park. He also stated that on May 20, the date the former Guards were terminating their affiliations, was a day on which a large picnic was scheduled. He called attention that the men were quitting at 1:00 A.M. in the morning of Jay 20, or just after midnight May 19.

He also stated that any of the Guards who had quit and wanted reinstated were given that chance. He stated two men returned to work, one could not stand the gaff and the other remained on the job for the entire Season. The former Guards in the audience took exception to saying they 'walked off the job' or 'struck'. They said they had stated in their letter they would work until 1:00 A.M. the morning of May 20, and they set the time because there was a large dance on the night of May 19. Mr. Roberts said Chief Kaesmeier lifted his badge at five minutes before midnight, and the Chief explained that it was the usual thing for the Guard to only be on the corner until midnight and at that time the Regular Patrolmen took over the corner. Defore lifting the badge, the Chief asked Mr. Moberts if he had signed the letter of resignation and if he were quitting to which Mr. Roberts replied: "Yes", after which the Chief asked for the badge. The corner was not unprotected as the regular patrolman took over.

Mr. Faesel said the Chief lifted his badge about 12:30 and the dance continued until 1:00 A.M. Chief Kaesmeier said he asked Mr. Faesel if he were quitting and Mr. Faesel saidL "Yes". However, Mr. Richardson, who is a Constable, was in the habit of taking over late dances at 12:30, and working them until closing at 1:00, and that the same thing happened on that night. The dance was protected by a man wearing a Constable's badge, and was certainly not left unprotected.

Mr. Baker said Chief Kaesmeier had acted under his, Mr. Baker's instructions in what he had done.

Mr. Mash asked if the 30¢ per hour contribution is legal, to which Mr. Brandt replied: "Yes".

He explained that the Guards received no pay from the Park directly but were paid from Borough Funds and that West View Park Company voluntarily contributed to the Borough a sum equal to 30¢ for each man hour worked.

Mr. Brandt suggested that Ex-Burgess Baker could probably explain more fully about it and Mr. Baker gave the following information:

Back, probably in 1950, while Mr. Baker was out of town, the Park Company asked Members of the Regular Police Force of the Borough to work in the Park while off regular duty, and offered to pay them 30¢ an hour to equalize their wages for this work to their approximate hourly rate on the Borough payroll. Mr. Baker does not know how they arrived at the \$1.15 as paid by the Borough. The idea was that the Borough would pay the men 85¢ per hour and the Park would make a voluntary contribution to the Borough based on 30¢ for each hour worked for each Guard. Mowever, the Guards who were not Regular Police Officers complained to Chief Kaesmeier, who asked them to keep on working and the matter would be taken up when Mr. Baker returned to the Borough.

When Mr. Daker was informed that the Regular Police were offered the additional pay to make their scale \$1.15 per hour, he immediately arranged meeting with the officials of the Park Company, at which time he informed them that if the Regular Patrolmen were to receive the additional pay, then the Guards should receive the same. After much discussion, the Park Officials agreed and said they would make a voluntary contribution to the Borough each month based on 30¢ an hour for each hour worked by each Special Guard. Mr. Baker called their attention that the Guards could not be paid anything by the Park Company but that their entire wages would have to be paid by the Borough, and the Park Company could in turn, if they desired, contribute an amount equivalent to 30¢ per man hour worked, to which the Park Company agreed.

Motion by Mr. Heil, seconded by Mr. Tiernan, that Council go into the appointing of the Guards to work at West View Park this Season.

Under Question - Mr. Wash said that before Council goes into a vote on the hiring of Park Guards. there are numerous applications for the jobs and wanted to know if the citizens of West View Borough would be entitled to preference until such time as the list of the West View Borough residents is exhausted, and until that time, no appointments should be given to outside individuals.

Mr. Heil and Mr. Guckert agreed on the matter.

Motion carried and so ordered.

Mr. Hurley nominated the following Guards be appointed to serve for 5 months and 20 days as Special Guards in West View Park for the Season 1954:

Mr. Wash nominated the following Guards:

W. E. Richardson, who served faithfully 8 years. Regis Faessel, 7 years, George Keller, 4 years, Harry Roberts, 2 years, Mr. Hollenberger, Anthony Kratz, 2 years, Lr. Lenfesty.

He said he nominated these men because of their years' of faithful service to the Borough of West View as Guards.

The matter of how many Guards was discussed and it was the decision to appoint 10 Guards in place of the 9.

Mr. Guckert nominated Mr. Ley to be appointed to serve as a Guard.

Motion by Mr. Hurley, seconded by Mr. Tiernan, that the nominations be closed.

Carried and so ordered.

Under Question - Mr. Tiernan asked if ten men are appointed, does that mean the ten Guards work at different times. The answer was that it is up to the Burgess to work them when and how needed. Mr. Wash suggested they all be appointed to be worked when the Burgess needed them and in that way he would always have enough men. Mr. Heil suggested at least three or four men should be appointed who could work during the day.

Motion to close the nominations was carried.

THE BOROUGH OF WEST VIEW Hearing - May 11, 1954.

Minutes of a Recting of The Town Council of The Borough of West View for the purpose of considering an amendment to Ordinance No. 852, The Zoning Ordinance of the Borough of West View, to change the Use District of Lots 7 and 8 Rochester Road, in the Schwitter Plan of the Borough.

This amendment was requested by Mathew Ruk, asking that the above lots be changed from Residential "B" to Commercial "C" to allow

him to erect a Bowling Alley.

The notice of the amendment was duly published in the Official Paper, The Allegheny Journal, and ten notices were posted in conspicuous places adjacent to the property. Proofs of publication were on file.

Members of Council present were: Messrs. Guckert, Hurley, Link, Nash, Tiernan and Kress. The Burgess - J. L. Gahring; Solicitor - Carl Brandt; Manager - C. F. Deem; Secretary - Mrs. Guckert; were also present.

Mr. Kress, President of Council, announced that the hearing was open for discussion, described what the amendment to be considered was, and asked if anyone in the Audience cared to speak.

Attorney, Mr. Schane and Mr. Reynolds, of the Morth Hills Joint School District, were present to object to the rezoning of the two lots on Rochester Road.

Reason: The zoning in itself is allright so long as it does not affect the morals, welfare and safety of the district.

How it would have this affect: In this particular case, these lots are directly across the road from three lots purchased by the Morth Hills Joint School District to be used as an entrance to the Heim Farm, which has been purchased to be used to erect a secondary school.

When the School will be completed: Sometime before September 1956. Plans are already in Marrisburgh to be approved.

Who owns the property: The North Mills JointSchool District.
Mr. Smiley stated the drawing he had of the lots owned by the North Hills Joint School district is accurate.

Mr. Shane called attention to some of the ways the erection of bowling alleys in this district would affect the new school, one of which is that after the secondary school is built and there are considerable activities in the schools, if there were a bowling alley or pool room there, it will create more night activities and night parking problems in that section. Furthermore, the entrance to the school district will be generally used by youths 13 to 18 years, and the people using the bowling alleys are the 18 to 25 year age group. It may be an enticement for the younger age group to go to this type of entertainment.

Mr. Smiley asked hr. Shane if it were his opinion then that this would affect the morals of the younger group and Mr. Shane said "Yes", as it would be a place to leiter. He stated that while we are all interested in the young folks, this type of entertainment should not be across from the entrance to the school where the younger group coming out of school might go. This would also tend

to mix the 18 to 25 year group with the 13 to 18 year group, which is not desirable.

When asked about traffic, Mr. Shane said he thought it would create

a traffic problem.

He remarked that if the new school is to be a secondary school, it will be for students 13 to 18 years of age and we should not entice them to go to these places of recreation.

Mr. Reynolds said there was not much he could add to what Er. Shane had already said, but did call attention to some of the important points of Mr. Shane's remarks.

Mr. Smiley then submitted, for Council to inspect, their survey to show that the North Hills Joint School District is the owner of the property in question.

Mr. Ruk said he would like to state that the property across from Lots 7 and 8 is owned by Ross Township itself and not by the School Board, and that there is not going to be any parking on their property whatsoever, as he has made provisions for parking on his own property.

Mr. Smiley stated that the property across the road from Lots 7 and 8, as shown on the survey which he submitted, is owned by the North Hills Joint School District, which is Ross Township and West View Schools.

Attorney

James J. Dillon...Representing the residents of Rochester Road and Ashford Avenue asked to be heard. He said the residents there own properties which they have improved at considerable expense and they are proud of their homes. They bought their properties in the belief that it was a "Residential" District and would continue to remain so. Their principal objection is akin, but somewhat different than that of Mr. Shane. The property owners believe that this type of building will be a detriment to their properties. He believes that business establishments should be confined to zones already set up for that purpose in the best interest for the beautification and civic pride of the Borough of West View. The people Mr. Dillon was representing at the Hearing formally protest to Council any change in the Zoning.

Mr. Dillon called the attention of Council to the fact that according to the Borough Code, passed by the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, provides that any change in the zoning of use purposes must be passed by a three-fourths vote of the entire Council if there is a protest filed signed by 20 percent of the owners of properties within a distance of 100 feet or across the highway from the property to be rezoned. Their protest as filed, represents a total of owners of property well over twenty percent, and under the Borough Code, as passed by Legislature requiring three-fourths vote, it would take the affirmative vote of six of the seven Councilmen to pass such a change. With regard to the question raised by Mr. Ruk, it maes no difference if the property is owned by a person living in Wilkinsburg, those people have the right to protest because it affects them.

Mr. Ruk said he has been in the Borough at least twenty years and they have zoning down there for the garage. As he understands it, you actually have to be a taxpayer in the Borough to make any protest. Mr. Ruk thought Mr. Dillon was out of order in making a

statement that any property owners living in Wilkinsburg had a right to protest. Mrs. Danver (Mr. Ruk's daughter) said that these gentlemen who had spoken had said this would be detrimental to their properties, and a place for loafing. There is not going to be any riff-raff or a place to cause harm, but a recreation place that we need. I object to that kind of remarks.

Mrs. Mary Kilian, 256 Ashford Avenue, registered her protest to a bowling alley being built. When they decided to build their new home, they came to the Borough Hall to find out if the properties there were to be used for anything but residential, and was told it was residential and would only be used for that purpose. Mrs. Kilian said they built believing that and had in mind to build another home.

Mr. Ruk introduced Mr. Hines who told of many bowling leagues among the younger groups that were successful for many reasons. The leagues he mentioned were under the supervision of churches, lyceums, YMCA or YWCA organizations. He showed a picture of one group of girls who have a league, under the supervision of one of the churches.

- ... There being no others in the Audience desiring to be heard, the Ordinance was taken up for consideration.
- Ord.. Motion by Mr. Tiernan, seconded by Mr. Guckert, that Ordinance No. 963 be taken #963 up for first reading.

Property & Purchase - Chairman Mr. Guckert, asked about a letter sent in by the Recreation Association regarding the purchase of the Simon property. This letter was received by Council about a year ago and the Secretary will send a copy of it to Mr. Guckert.

Public Relations - Chairman, Mr. Nash, had no report.

Mrs. Stanier. Spoke about the Recreation Association (As Chairman of their Public Relations Committee). She asked if the Ordinance is prepared amending the Recreation Ordinance requiring that when there is an opening on the Board created by the expiration of the term of a Member who is also a Member of the School Board, or caused by the resignation of such a Member, he is to be replaced by a Member of the School Board.

Mr. Pelligrino and Mr. Uffelman asked when Yale Avenue is going to be put in good shape. Matter referred to the Manager.

Motion by Mr. Tiernan, seconded by Mr. Link, that Ordinance No. 951 be passed for third reading and final passage. Under Question:

Mr. Mash asked if it might not be good policy for Mr. McCutcheon to resign, as it was intended that a School Board Member be on the Board.

Mr. Hurley does not think this is necessary, but suggests that Council defeat Ordinance No. 964 and comply with the recommendations of Mr. Tiernan.

Mr. Wash asked if Council will now go on record that Mrs. Urich will be reappointed as per Mr. Tiernan's recommendation and which is satisfactory to the Recreation Board.

Mr. Kress suggested someone in the audience may have something to say on the subject.

Mr. Tiernan said some consideration should be given to the fact that a School Board Member did take the appointment to the Recreation Board and after five months, he wrote a letter to

Council without informing the School Board, that he was resigning, and the Board knew nothing of it until they had their regular meeting, and the School Board allowed a School Board Member, who only served five months on a three year term, to resign. Mr. Tiernan also said he is a Member of the Recreation Board and that the motion recommending the reappointment of Mrs. Urich was unanimous.

After Question, the Roll was called.

Ordinance No. 964 is defeated.

Harrison Constr...Mr. Nash inquired as to who signed the contract with Harrison and who drew the specifications.

He was told that the specifications were drawn by the former Borough Manager and appeared in the advertisement for bids. There were two bidders and they were each asked if the specifications were sufficient for bidding and both bidders said they were. Mr. Ittel, Attorney for Harrison Construction was present. He had called Mr. Brandt and asked if it would be in order for him to be at this Meeting and Mr. Brandt told him Council would have no objection as Mr. Brandt understands the matter is to come up before Council at this Meeting. Mr. Brandt asked if Council would care to hear from Mr. Ittel.

Mr. Ittel advised he has not had an opportunity to study the matter and would ask that if there was anything coming up on it tonight, that it be postponed until he had the opportunity to study the files. He would like to hear from Council when the matter is coming up. Mr. Ittel said the only thing he had the opportunity to look at was the provision of the contract which seems to provide as to how the work was to be done, which seems to be conditioned upon the approval of the Borough Manager. There was something said about additional things that were to be done. These were all done with the exception of Township Road and weather conditions did not allow that to be done.

He also said he was not here to press for payment of the bill.

Conforming with your request to submit proposal for furnishing professional Services, in connection with obtaining

physical measurements to determine quantities of street paving in the Borough of West View, taking cores of paving to determine conformity with the provisions contained in the approved specifications and submitting a certified report of our findings, we propose to do the following:

- (1). Survey and quantities of street paving, based upon approximately 60,000 square yards of paving; (a), if paving is in a continuous run, \$65.00 per day, not to exceed four (4) days. (b), If paving is not in a continuous run and is a combination of several streets, \$65.00 per day, not to exceed six (6) days.
- (2). Obtaining test cores of street paving, one (1) core per thousand square yards of paving, to determine the physical depth of paving, and conformity with the provisions contained in the approved specifications, based upon approximately sixty (60 cores),\$65.00 per day, not to exceed (7) days. Cores to be 3" to 4" square.

 We will not be responsible for the replacement of the paving where cores are taken.
- (3). The above includes a complete certified report.

Thanking you for the opportunity of submitting a proposal, covering the work cited above, I remain

Mr. Deem, Borough Manager, reports he has gone out in the field and measured the work and can take an oath about the square yards on the bills from Harrison.

Upon being asked for expressions from Council Members, Er. Hurley said that as far as he knows, Harrison has complied with the specifications, which did not call for 8-inches of slag after compacting, and it is a waste of money of the taxpayers for the Borough to hire an Engineer.

Mr. Tiernan cited that Harrison Construction had taken out a bond in amount of \$150,000.00 and his question is about the duration of the bond, whether or not it is for a full year after the streets have been laid, to cover any necessary repairs made or does that bond expire one year after the date of completion.

Mr. Brandt said most performance bonds require some proof of loss within a period of one year.

Motion by Mr. Tiernan, seconded by Mr. Hurley, that Mr. Arnold Suba be employed to make a survey of the streets that were laid by Harrison Construction Company, at a total cost of \$225.00, and a report be made to Council of the condition of the said streets.

Under Question - Mr. Nash says he understands the man who is going to be employed is not going to make any cores to determine the depth of the streets, and it is therefore his opinion that the man will be unable to furnish a detailed report as to the nature of the work done as to whether the work has been done in a satisfactory manner.

Mr. Tiernan called attention that Mr. Flood made two proposals; one is a bid without taking cores at an approximate cost of \$260; the other proposal is with taking cores at an approximate cost of \$455.00.

Mr. Nash says Mr. Flood told him it is possible he could do the work without cores in three days, which is a total of \$195.00. Before taking the Roll Call, Mr. Kress says he is going to vote against the motion to hire an Engineer because he thinks it is a waste of the taxpayer's money.

Roll Call - Ayes: Messrs. Hurley, Nash, Tiernan. Nays: Messrs. Link and Kress.

Mr. Kress said he voted against hiring an Engineer for the reason it is a waste of the taxpayer's money.

#3 Fire Truck..... Mr. Link says #3 Company is contemplating the purchase of a new truck for the aerial ladder, they have had a demonstration and have come to an agreement of a price with the Representative from the Interrational "arvester; price \$3405.37, which includes a winch and all the things they want. Ifr. Crawford is the representative.

> Fire Company No.3 have asked Mr. Link to ask Council to authorize someone from the Borough to sign the order for the truck so they

can save about ten percent.

They can get delivery in thirty days and are proposing to pay \$2400.00 upon delivery and the balance within ninety days from delivery. The Borough is to take title of the truck.

They request the Borough to pay the difference between the \$2400.00 and the cost of \$3405.37, approximately \$1100.00, and the No. 3

ompany will repay the \$1100.00 to the Borough.

During the discussion of the matter, Mr. Brandt asked if the Finance Chairman had funds available in case the Company No. 3 defaulted in repaying the Borough the \$1100.00. Mr. Tiernan said there are no funds set up for this equipment.

Mr. Kress suggested that the matter be held over to the July Meeting, and perhaps at that time the Finance Chairman would come up with a report.

However, Lr. Link says the \$1100.00 is to be paid to the Borough and he does not think the Budget enters into it.

Motion by Mr. Link, seconded by Mr. Nash, that the proper Officers of the Borough sign the order for the truck for No. 3 Company with the International Harvester Company.

Under Question - Mr. Tiernan asked if all the Members of Wo.3 were in accord with the purchase of the chassis and was advised that the majority were.

To control whether it is a lor 2 story house, the heighth or size of a building is esthetic, and therefore, going beyond the fundamental purpose of the zoning ordinance which is to protect the general welfare, health and safety of the public. It may be that Council would like to have the matter noted that it was called to Council's attention, and the Wellington Heights association be advised that I received the call and that it is my opinion (Mr. Brandt's) that if the matter is appealed, Council could lose the case and perhaps the whole zoning ordinance, or perhaps a part of it lost.

(Petition signed by about seventy people). Mr. Nash checked the situation from 1:50 P.M to 5:30 P.M. on Saturday afternoon, July 26. He cited several reasons why the people in that section request it be changed back to 2-way traffic.Mr. Tiernan said until such time as the new road (002211) coming from Ohio River Blvd. to Highland Avenue, is completed, and which he feels will take away most of the traffic now using Cornell and Center Avenues, he believes Center Avenue-should be two-way traffic from Harvard to the Borough Line. Mr. Guckert reported he also has had complaints and believes it should be two-way traffic. Mr. Heil is of the opinion Cornell Avenue could not be used for heavy traffic in bad weather. Motion by Mr. Nash, seconded by Mr. Tiernan, that the situation be corrected, by restoring two-way traffic on Center Avenue from Harvard Avenue to the Borough Line, and that the STOP Sign be removed from Center Avenue at that intersection. Under Question - Mr. Tiernan says it is the opinion of the State Engineers who are putting in the extension of the road from the Ohio River Boulevard that the road will take away much of the traffic from Cornell Avenue.

Audience.....Mr. Fred McCune, 304 Ridgewood Avenue, would like an investigation made of Arden Alley to correct the Alley at the entrance to his garage.

Referred to the Manager for study and recommendation at the next

Mr. Traylor, 35 Norwich Avenue, asked about Recreation - Mr. Tiernan explained what may be expected.

Mr. Jackson, Ridgewood Avenue, asked that a speed limit be posted on Ridgewood Avenue.

NOTE - I am attaching a copy of the Traffic Ordinance. Please note the maximum speed limit on any street in the Borough is 25 MPH - therefore, the Ordinance will not have to be amended. Motion carried and so ordered.

The Manager is directed to contact the Pittsburgh Rai lways Company to discuss the speed on the trolley cars in the Borough. If they do not see fit to cooperate, the Borough should then install more STOP signs and enforce them all.

Surfacing

Survey-Hard-.....Mr. Suba, Engineer, submitted his report of the study he had made of the streets in the Borough which were hard-surfaced by the .Harrison Construction Company.

> Mr. Nash stated the Engineer could not make a report unless he takes cores.

Hr. Heil stated, as he understands, there were no specifications and you cannot hold a contractor when there was no definite sized slag specified, etc.

It was stated that a contract was let to cover the streets with a hard surface - if you went to court, the contractor would lick us to a frazzle - nothing said you had to have certain sized slag or certain slag thickness.

Mr. Nash asked what streets which were repaired by Harrison have been improved since the request for a report and to what extent have these repairs been made? Mr. Guckert replied they dug up a space and repaired it on Stanford Avenue.

Mr. Kress stated that some contracts for surfacing of streets were let this year to the same contractor, to which Mr. Nash replied he is not interested in this year, but is interested in last year.

Mr. Brandt said that at the time the contract was let, he told Members of Council that while it called for 8-inches of slag compacted, in his judgment the specifications were not complete. Mr. Gallagher, who was then Borough Manager, insisted the specifications were exactly the same as prepared by other communities, a certain formula code, and he reassured Council that it was a complete and accurate set of specifications. He did assure them it was complete, he was the Engineer, and on that basis the contract was let.

Motion by Mr. Hurley, seconded by Mr. Heil, that the report of Arnold Suba, the Engineer, be received and the bill from the Harrison Construction Company be paid.

Under Question - Mr. Nash stated that under the terms of the Resolution he presented and which Council adopted, this report does not set forth the required report - no Engineer can give a proper report as to the condition of the streets without digging cores.

Roll Call - Ayes: Messrs. Heil, Hurley, Link, Tiernan and Kress. Nays: Guckert and Nash.

Notion carried and so ordered.

Kenyon Ave.... Chairman of Public Relations, Mr. Wash, advised Council he had received a letter from the Township of Ross asking for a meeting with the Public Relations Committee on the following Monday Evening, which was too late to contact Members of his Committee. Council set a date of Wednesday Evening, August 18, 1954, at eight o'clock, at the West View Municipal Building. The Secretary is instructed to advise the Secretary of Ross Township. (The Meeting to include Members of the Public Relations Committee and the President of Council.)

School Guards. Motion by Mr. Murley, seconded by Mr. Guckert, that the rate of wages for Lady-Cops be increased from 85¢ to \$1.10 per hour.

Under Question - Mr. Tiernan said that the figures in the Budget to be presented this evening are exactly the same as the figures in the Budget which Council went over at the informal Meeting.

Without the increase in the wages of the Lady-Cops, there is an average of \$235.65. He said he understands there will be demands for additional lady-cops than the three we now have, so there you get into much more expenditure than an additional \$600.00, which you estimate the increase in wages will cost. If we get to a place where we need two additional Lady-cops, that will run the increase well over 1000 dollars.

Motion carried and so ordered.

The Budget is to be increased by \$600.00.

Kenyon Ave..... Mr. Deem reported there had been a meeting with Ross Township Commissioners and they wanted the Borough to open Kenyon Avenue back to the property line in West View. They want another meeting with the Borough.

Controller..... Mr. Douglas entered the Meeting at 8:50.

Drainage...... Mr. Nash, after a discussion of the drainage in the Lipp Avenue Extension area, felt West View should not accept Ross Township Water. Ross Township was informed we are going to run about ten additional feet on our side of the road in order to take care of some of the water running onto people's property, and Ross Township agreed to take our suggestions under advisement. We have had no action from Ross relative to Ross Township water entering West View property. Mr. Nash feels they have had additional time and no more can be done by West View. He asked our Solicitor to contact the Solicitor for Ross and together they work out an agreement and get the matter cleared up once and for all.

State Rte 02089.. Mr. Brandt advised he had contacted Rhoads, Sinon & Reader, and 02110

Attorneys in Harrisburg, relative to the State Highway Department tearing up Ann Arbor Avenue and changing the surface drainage at the intersection.

He read an opinion based on their investigation, and the opinion advises there is no action that can be taken by the Borough.

Mr. Brandt reviewed the action that had been taken by the Borough in opposing the routing of the road onto Highland Avenue rather than along Center Avenue. Some of the objections were that bringing the increase of traffic onto Highland Avenue, it would create a bottle neck; it was also felt that because of the higher level of vehicular traffic and the sidewalk below, the increase in traffic creates more of a hazard.

Bellevue and Avalon have approved the plan and have agreed to pay a certain amount of the damages because they were the main proponents of the improvement because it is a ready access to Bellevue and a shorter method for their people to get to the Perry Highway; they approved it but The Borough of West View never did.

Mr. Deem called attention that as it now stands, there is no way for water to get out of the inside of the curb — it will be necessary for some of the people to raise their sidewalks.

Mr. Hurley asked if the State changed the grade on Ann Arbor, are they responsible, to which Mr. Brandt replied yes. Mr. Heil said it would probably cost about a hundred dollars to bring the sidewalk up within the curb on the other side.

The above was a general discussion and no action was taken.

Drainage

C.J.Nash Property.... Mr. Brandt presented the following MEMORANDUM OF CONFERENCE between he and Mr. Nash on September 13, 1954. "September 13, 1954.

> Mr. Clarence J. Nash. Mr. Carl Brandt.

Surface Water Drain - 30-36" in diameter. Subject:

We discussed the disposition of the surface water through the drain from Center Avenue upon Mr. Nash's property, and the following conclusions were reached:

(1) That the Borough made a wrongful entry upon his property, since no condemnation was made, nor was any payment given.

> The damage was caused to Mr. Nash's property (2)

by wash-outs.

(3) That the situation was aggravated by the failure of the Borough's employees to correct the condition in a good and workmanlike manner. They permitted the drain to lay upon the surface of the land without burying it.

(4) So long as the drain remains on Mr. Nash's

property it constitutes a charge upon his land.

That the Borough has the following alternatives: (a) To close off the drain and stop the discharge of the surface water from the streets upon his property.

(b) To correct the existing condition by extending the surface water drainage line to the gulley where the water in the drain under Center Avenue from the lands to the north, including the recreation field, flows.

In consideration for which Mr. Nash is willing (a) to grant an easement, in writingm to the Borough to continue the maintenance of the drain through his property, provided it agrees to maintain the same and keep it open and free of impediments, and provided, further, that the grant will not preclude Mr. Nash, his successors or assigns, from making any claim for damages in the future caused by the negligence on the part of the Borough by reason of its failure to properly maintain the same.

Provided, further, that an installation be made at the end of the drain to prevent any small child or children from crawling into the pipe and suffering injuries, since it

would very possibly constitute an "attractive nuisance."

Provided, further, that this matter is resolved within thirty (30) days from the date hereof.

CB:gk Mr. Brandt then review what had been done to correct the situation: -Mr. Nash called the matter to Council's attention $2\frac{1}{2}$ years ago - sections of pipe were placed on the top of the ground and the water would go down and wash out Mr. Nash's yard. From time to time, a load of dirt would be placed on the ground but never spread around. Again, Mr. Nash complained, and Mr. Deem went over with instructions from Council, and the earth was pushed around, and several trees cut down. The question presently before Council is that Mr. Deem maintains the only way the situation can be taken care of to prevent further erosion, is by putting in a catch basin at the present end of the line and putting in more pipe beyond that point. The Borough can correct the condition by (a) closing off the drain to stop the drainage and (b) correct the condition by extending the water to the gulley. Mr. Nash said that in consideration of what the Borough will do to correct the matter, he is willing to grant an easement in writing to continue the maintenance of the drainage. (See Memo of Conference with Mr. Brandt.) Mr. Brandt said another alternative would be for this Council to go in and condemn the property and continue the sewer there, in which event Mr. Nash could ask the Board of Viewers and make a claim for damages. Legally, we are not permitted to avert water from our streets to enter onto anyone's property. When Mr. Deem was questioned as to the probable cost of putting the problem into correct condition, he felt it would probably cost approximately eight or nine hundred dollars. Mr. Nash stated he does not want to be unreasonable but that he feels this matter should be taken care of. Mr. Hurley asked if the job in its present state of repair is acceptable to Mr. Wash and the answer was no. Mr. Nash stated this matter goes back to $2\frac{1}{2}$ years ago - he is not interested in any damages from the Borough. He is giving the Borough permission to carry the water over his property and for that consideration, he feels the water should be taken away from his property. He is willing to give the Borough permission to carry the water over his property for a distance of about 306 feet. Motion by Mr. Hurley, seconded by Mr. Tiernan, that the Borough Manager be authorized to correct the storm water condition

at Mr. Nash's property, as outlined by the Solicitor, and in consideration for which, Mr. Nashwill grant the Borough an

easement with certain provisions. Motion carried and so ordered.

Minutes of a Special Meeting of The Town Council of The Borough of West View held Wednesday Evening, September 29, 1954, in the Council Chamber at the Municipal Building.

Meeting called to order at 8:36 by President of Council, A. L. Kress.

Roll Call.... Was answered by the following Members of Council: Messrs. Guckert, Heil, Hurley, Nash, Tiernan and Kress.

Burgess - J. L. Gahring; Controller - W. H. Douglas; Manager - C. F. Deem; and Secretary - Mrs. Guckert; were present.

Call letter was read.

Recreational ... President of Council announced that the survey report made by the Pittsburgh Regional Planning Association has been prepared. Mr. Survey Tiernan explained that the report pointed out the various recreational facilities in the Borough and is a thorough report. The State Borough Code indicates that a Borough must have a plan of its parks and recreational facilities. He pointed out that at the Meeting at the Ridgewood School, of Members of the School Board, Members of the Recreation Board and Members of Council, each had been given a copy of the survey to read over and study. The Survey had been discussed at the Meeting at the Ridgewood School and Mr. Tiernan did not believe it was necessary to go through the steps again unless Members of Council so desired. He stated that the opinion he was trying to bring up this evening is the fact that the Recreation Board has accepted the plan in total but just the mere acceptance of the entire plan does not

Mr. Tiernan continued that the plan gives an idea of what can be done but does not necessarily mean that it will all be done — it is merely a basis of a plan. The plan is not something you are accepting lock, stock and barrel. There will probably be a lot of adjustments.

Mr. Heil said there were a lot of questions to be answered. Mr. Kress asked to have the matter put before Council and then discuss it.

In RE: the condemnation of properties. Mr. Heil is not in favor of condemning any properties for recreational purposes as long as there are vacant properties throughout the Borough which are available. (Mr. Heil was referring to improved properties).

This was agreed to by all Members of Council - properties should only be condemned for recreational purposes as a last resort.

In answer as to why certain locations were named for sites for recreation, the answer was the Planning Commission recommends having the recreational facilities adjacent to or near schools.

Mr. Hurley pointed out that at the Meeting, and in the report, it was pointed out that the playground or recreational facilities would be for all age groups, and if this is so, the locations should not make any difference.

Mr. Nash asked if it were not true that at the Meeting, Members were given a booklet and were given permission to ask questions about the program and ask if he were right or wrong in asking if it was not decided this program would be discussed with the Recreation Board before we went into any action, and now we are being asked to take action.

It was explained that it would be in order for Council to receive the plan and that action would not make it binding that Council accept the plan or adopt the plan in its entirety.

Mr. Heil pointed out that at the Meeting at Ridgewood School, it was stated that if Council accepts this plan in total, and at a later date Council wanted to condemn any property, from the date of acceptance by this Borough Council any improvements that went on those pieces of property up until such time as the properties were condemned, there could be no claim for damages.

Mr. Brandt explained that the power of eminent domain is a very sacred power which is given to but a few. This Board is one of the few that has been given the power to take private property and no matter whether you accept this plan as acceptance of it or merely decide to receive it, the power of eminent domain can only be exercised by this Council Body by ordinance and the ordinance can only be effective from the date of its adoption. The power of eminent domain only speaks as of the date it is adopted by ordinance. You are entitled to such damages as of the date that condemnation takes place.

If you were told by Mr. KcKane that if you wanted to improve your property after the plan is accepted, while Mr. Brandt respects Mr. McKane, he cannot subscribe to Mr. McKane's conclusion.

After considerable discussion the following motion was put before Council:

Motion by Mr. Hurley, seconded by Mr. Tiernan, that the report prepared by the Pittsburgh Regional Planning Association, which was presented to Council by the Recreation Board of The Borough of West View, be received for further consideration and study with the understanding that it is not binding upon the part of Council to accept the plan in its entirety or in part except by specific action of Council.

Motion carried and so ordered - Mr. Heil voting Nay, stating he is not opposed to playgrounds or other recreation, but he is opposed to the method in which it was brought up before this Council.

Councilman Guckert asked the Members of the Recreation Board where they wanted to start on the program.

This was discussed and Council was informed that the Board had in mind that the first thing would be to acquire the Simon property on which there are no buildings and to endeavor to get it at a negotiated price, and that the Recreation Board would like to have Council take immediate steps to make this action effective so that by next year this particular playground will be available and this does not call for the condemnation of any property, which is the last thing this Council wants to do.

As a second step, the Board has in mind a swimming pool but in RE: a swimming pool, there are a lot of technicalities involved.

After considerable discussion of the Simon property, the following motion was presented to Council:

Motion by Mr. Hurley, seconded by Mr. Tiernan, that the Chairman of the Property & Purchase Committee get in touch with the Simon Estate and try to determine the availability of the property and the price, and that he be given the power to hire an appraiser to appraise the property, report to be made to Council at the next Meeting.

Under Question - Mr. Tiernan asked if Mr. Brandt thought hiring of one appraiser sufficient or should we have more than one. Mr. Brandt felt one appraiser would be sufficient. Also Under Question - Mr. Nash asked Mr. Brandt if he would

Also Under Question - Mr. Nash asked Mr. Brandt if he would lend his assistance to any legal questions the Property & Purchase Chairman may have in carrying out this motion, to which Mr. Brandt replied "yes".

Motion was carried and so ordered.

Drainage..... Municipal Grounds

.... Mr. Heil went over the property at the Municipal Building with the Borough Manager today and observes that the surface water has washed gulleys in the bank. Mr. Heil has had a complaint from Emminger's that the water is entering upon their property. Mr. Heil recommends that the Borough Manager take steps that are necessary to correct this condition.

Center Avenue Mr. Heil reported that he and the Borough Manager had made a thorough examination of the proposed project of opening Center Avenue from Norwich Avenue to Oakwood - in place of a 1-1/2 to 1 cut, a 1 to 1 cut could be made and it can be kept back far enough that no one's property would be affected. Mr. Heil suggests there will not be too much trouble if the opening is approximately 12 foot, wider where feasible, and put down a surface good enough for this winter, replacing with a more permanent surface later. Under this plan, the toe of cut will be eight feet away fron anyone's property. Mr. Kress asked if the toe of the cut will be eight feet away from Martin's property and the answer was yes.

> Mr. Heil pointed out there are three cracks in Martin's Building, one at the porch, one at the back door and one at the back end of the house. (Mr. Kress also observed these cracks.)

Motion by Mr. Hurley, seconded by Mr. Heil, that the Manager be authorized to proceed with the opening of Center Avenue from Norwich Avenue to Brightwood Avenue.

Under question - Some Members of Council felt this would be unfair - it would have to be all or none.

Mr. Tiernan - "In the beginning, when these meters were put in several years ago, I had been under the impression that all of the business men of the Borough came up to a Special Meeting of Council and their request for meters was satisfied by the Borough Council installing the meters. If Council put these meters up and established the times at the request of all of the business men at a Special Meeting, then there should be a Special Meeting again. The business district is necessary to this Borough and should be given every consideration. Every business man should have the right to get up and talk. I certainly think we should take this up at a Special Meeting of Council for that very purpose."

Mr. Nash: After consideration of Mr. Tiernan's recommendation, withdrew his motion and Mr. Guckert withdrew his second. Motion by Mr. Nash, seconded by Mr. Tiernan, that Council call a Special Meeting on a specified date, to determine the solution to this problem, and all of the business men to be notified the date and time.

Motion carried and so ordered. Council will meet on November 17, 1954, at 9:15 o'clock and proper notices will be sent out.

PROPERTY & PURCHASE - Chairman Guckert reports the No. 1 and No. 2 Engine Houses have been repaired and look very nice. Suggests Councilmen stop in to see them.

Audience...... James Nudi announced a meeting of the "50th Anniversary Committee" at 8:30 Wednesday Evening, November 9th, in Room 3 at the High School.

D.M.Simon..... The offer of \$6,000.00 for the D. M. Simon property at Bronx,

Center & Highland Avenues, for Recreation Purposes, was rejected.

Mr. Tiernan stated that the matter of acquiring this property

was discussed at the meeting of the Recreation Board and it

was passed in the form of a motion by the Recreation Board, that

in the event that all negotiations broke down and no actual

offer is made by the present owners, that the Borough Council

ought to take steps, and only in that event, to condemn the

property for use for recreation.

It is Mr. Guckert's opinion that Council should have Walter Simon appear at a meeting before taking condemnation action, and that possibly Council could negotiate and get a better price.

Mr. Tiernan asked the Solicitor if, in the event condemnation proceedings are instituted, it is necessary to have three appraisers by both sides. The answer was "no".

Mr. Brandt advised he has prepared the Ordinance ready to submit to Council this evening. If the Ordinance is enacted this evening, it still does not preclude Council from further negotiating for a better price for the property.

In the event we cannot make a satisfactory agreement, we will then petition the Board of Viewers to fix a fair amount for this property. The appraisers will offer advice to help determine the value and the Viewers will probably listen to it.

Mr. Tiernan asked if the condemnation proceedings are instituted and the case goes to the Board of Viewers, are there any charges to the owners or the Borough.

Mr. Brandt stated the only costs you could have would be the cost of filing the petition to the Court, cost of testimony, and cost of expert testimony which would run from fifty to one Hundred fifty dollars per day.

In addition, under the law, since a person cannot be deprived of his property without due process of the law, the owner, if not satisfied with the decision of the Viewers, can take it to the Court of Common Pleas.

He also stated that as soon as the Ordinance is ordained it becomes law and the property becomes Borough property and the only question then is to fix a figure for the cost of the property. You can take possession of the property when the Ordinance is enacted. If neither side is satisfied with the price, then you go before the Court of Common Pleas to decide what is a fair market value of the property.

Mr. Tiernan asked if Mr. Brandt would say the costs would be negligable, say to the extent of Three Hundred Dollars.
Mr. Brandt thought perhaps Five Hundred Dollars.

Mr. Tiernan thought that since the owners have not willingly set a price in writing to us, it may be given to Mr. Guckert and even with the enactment of the Ordinance tonight, and even though we have a real estate appraisal of Six Thousand, it is a question in his mind whether it would not be fair for both the Borough and the owner of the property to have the Board of Viewers set a price. As it is now, we have no price from the owner to negotiate to.

Mr. Tiernan also suggests that the condemnation proceedings go through and if it would be the wish of this Council to make another offer to the owner of \$7500.00.

Motion by Mr. Tiernan, that an offer of \$8000.00 be made for the property with a time limit of the offer to November 30th. No Second.

Mr. Link suggests asking Walter Simon to make an offer.

Mr. Tiernan said that the appraisal to the State, for Income purposes, was Wine Thousand Dollars, and that if the Borough and buy it at Eight Thousand, the ground is suitable to use for the purpose for which we intend to put it, and he would like the motion to go to a vote - offer Eight Thousand, then condemn. No Second.

Minutes of a Special Meeting of The Town Council of The Borough of West View, held Wednesday Evening, November 17, in the Council Chamber. Meeting called to order at 9:23 by President of Council, A. L. Kress.

The following Members of Council were present: Messrs. Guckert, Hurley, Nash and Kress.

Mr. Link entered at 9:25 and Mr. Tiernan at 9:27 P. M. The Burgess - J. L. Gahring; Manager - C. F. Deem; Secretary - Mrs. Guckert; were present.

Mr. Kress read the Call Letter which stated the Meeting is for the purpose of discussing and taking action on regulations for parking meters. Business Men were also notified.

Mr. Kress asked if anyone in the audience had anything to say. Mr. Kress read the petition.

Mr. Phillip Peifer, West View Hardware Company, wanted his name removed from the petition because when he signed it, he thought

the request was only for a trial period, instead of on a perman-

ent basis.

Mr. Weigand suggests the meters be in effect until six o'clock excepting when the park is opened - then ten o'clock.

Dave Chillcoth of Dave & Betty's Dairy Store, would like to have meters re-installed at his place of business.

Bernhardt Realty also would like the meters re-installed in front of their place of business.

Mr. Nash, owner of the Gerard Theatre, would like to have the meters shut off at six o'clock as his business opens up at six-thirty. Mr. Jerry Chany asked why the Borough has parking meters and was told to provide parking space for business people and their customers.

Mr. Arlo, representing Bard's Dairy Store stated after the meters were installed, they noticed an increase in business in their store. He asks they be retained and the time as it now is.

Mr. Stuver believes the meters should be taken out and one or two hour parking signs installed. (Mr. Stuver's place of business is on Center Avenue above Hawthorne.)

Mr. Berkley stated that with the metered parking, customers have a better chance of parking - prior to that, the business men themselves parked their cars there - and their employees also did the same, leaving no room for customers.

Mr. Berkley thought that a trial perhaps could be made, based on eight o'clock limit with a strict check at eight o'clock, might be a worthwhile experiment. Eight o'clock restriction actually means a 7:00 o'clock privilege.

He also believes that the greatest factor in this case is not the meters. Most of the objection I have heard from the public and the merchants is the fact you get a ticket - then if you get a summons, there is a five dollar cost plus the one dollar ticket, or six dollars. The thing Mr. Berkley would like to suggest is a reduction in the costs when there is no contable sent out on the case. The Borough should not get the reputation that they 'burn' you, and there is poor publicity on the five dollar summons fee. The City of Pittsburgh is only fifty cents.

Dominik, Barber, 452 Perrysville Avenue, expressed his opinions on the parking situation in the Borough but did not indicate if he were in favor of parking meters.

Mrs. Corbet of the Bell Drapery Shops, thinks the meters should be shut off at six o'clock.

Mr. Foster, Foster Upholstering Company, believes one-hour parking signs, without meters, the police chalking tires and checking so that no one violates the one-hour time limit, would be better than the meters.

Mr. Kirk, 350 Center Avenue, says his wife has a beauty shop and he feels without the parking meters, she would do more business. Frank I. Gollmar, Attorney, representing Mr. Nash, said that he can heartily agree with what Mr. Nash has said about his business falling off and Council should consider shutting the meters off at six-thirty.

Mr. Carl Bahm, Gary Auto Stores, said that at the last meeting he asked that for a trial period the parking meters be shut off at six o'clock, but the petition does not state that this would be for a trial period. Therefore, he requested that his name be removed from the Petition.

Mr. Bahm does not know whether shutting the meters off at six o'clock is the answer. For that reason he is in favor of only a trial period for ninety days.

Mr. Catanzaro objects to shutting the meters off at six o'clock as the bulk of his business is in the evening. He suggests a trial period of shutting the meters off at eight o'clock, the period to be sixty days.

John Thomson, Stag Shop says the merchants in the Shopping Center have a problem that no one else has in the Borough. When we did not have the parking meters in the Shopping Center, the business men on the other side of the Highway parked in front of our doors all day, leaving no room for our customers. He said the parking meters are needed.

Burgess Gahring said he has been getting calls since January 1st about the meters being on until ten o'clock, and that it was driving business out of the Borough. He feels that for a trial period of ninety days, the meters should be shut off at seven-thirty to see if that helps.

Mr. Tiernan asked Members of the Audience in favor of shutting the meters off at seven-thirty to raise their hands, (the meters to remain on until nine o'clock Friday and Saturday nights.) Only three raised their hands.

Mr. Hurley said, in order to bring Council up to date, at the time of the installation of the meters, consideration was given first to the business men of this Borough and the time of the meters is what they suggested having. Now, they call for a sixthirty shut off. That is all right for the merchant who closes at six-thirty but penalizes the man who is open until nine o'clock. For a sixty day trial period, if you shut the meters off at eight o'clock, that will give the merchant time up until nine o'clock. One thing I think is being overlocked and that is changing of the time at this particular time. It might be confusing to make the change before the holidays. Perhaps it would be better to wait until after the holidays.

Page #3 - November 17, 1954.

Motion by Mr. Hurley that meters be shut off at eight o'clock P. M. for a trial period of sixty days with the exception of Fridays and Saturdays, beginning as of December 1, 1954.

Motion by Mr. Link, that the matter be turned over to the Police and Public Works for further study.

Motion by Mr. Tiernan, seconded by Mr. Nash, that where existing meter parking regulations are established at ten o'clock, that the hours of parking be limited in those areas to 7:30 for week days and nine o'clock on Friday and Saturdays, for a trial period of ninety days beginning December 1, 1954. Carried and so ordered.

Wage Tax..... The Solicitor explained that in the event Council does not pass an Ordinance taxing earned incomes for the year 1955, then the entire tax from January 1, 1955, on, will be payable to the School District, at least until July 1. What happens then depends on what the School Board does.

In the event the School Board does not enact a wage tax for the year 1955 and 1956, and the Borough does not enact a Wag Tax for the year 1955, the entire tax imposed for persons living in the Borough employed in the City will be required to be paid to the City who have indicated their tax will be at the rate of 1/2 of 1 percent.

In the event Council imposes a Wage Tax at the rate of 1/2 of 1% and in the event the School Board did not enact a tax of 1/2 of 1% effective as of July 1, 1955, a tax of 1/2 of 1% would be paid by residents of the Borough to the Borough and a tax of 1/2 of 1% would be paid to the City of Pittsburgh by residents working in the City.

If Council imposes a tax at the rate of 1% effective January 1, 1955, and in the event the School Board does not re-enact its tax, then the Borough will collect the entire 1% for the calendar year of 1955.

In other words, the municipality of domicile has the first claim on the payment of the Wage Tax, the limit of rate being 1%.

A. L. Kress, President of Council, West View, Pa. Dear Mr. Kress:

At the request of Members of the Police & Public Safety Committee, a Special Meeting of The Town Council of The Borough of West View is called by the President of Council, A. L. Kress, to be held Tuesday Evening, December 7, 1954, at nine o'clock in the Council Chamber.

The purpose of the Special Meeting is to take up for discussion and action any Borough Business which might come before Council.

The Committee requested the meeting due to the repercussions resulting from fines and costs on violations of the l-way traffic on Wellington Drive.

Mr. Kress explained that the notion making Wellington Drive l-way Traffic was adopted on November 9, the signs to control the l-way traffic were installed on November 17th. For five days after the signs were erected the Police were warning motorists but did not start to enforce the regulation until Monday, November 22, 1954.

Mr. Hurley said it has been called to his attention that about 300 or more summons were given, each calling for a \$2.00 fine and \$5.00 costs. He believes the motorists should have been given a tag carrying a fine of a dollar or two dollars, whatever the fine might be, and given a chance to pay for the tag without getting a summons. He stated Council had nothing to do with setting penalties (costs) for violations, that it comes under the Burgess as head of the Department.

Mr. Link said that being a business man in the Borough, the matter

has affected him because of the number of people coming into the store protesting the costs.

Mr. Heil said he has been having complaints about the matter.

Burgess Gahring said the cost is set up at \$5.00 by the Borough Code and that the Borough parking tag does not provide for a penalty on a 1-way street. Legally it is necessary to send a summary notice. He quoted the following:

Under Act No. 492, approved January 7, 1952)
"SECTION 2. CRIMINAL CASES. (a) The fees to be charged by the minor judiciary in every criminal case, except as hereinafter provided, shall be as follows:

(1) Summary conviction Motor Vehicle cases.... \$ 5.00."

Mr. Hurley asked Mr. Brandt if it is necessary to charge the maximum penalty. In other words, he wanted to know if we have to use the maximum amount required by the State Code for a violation of l-way traffic.

Mr. Brandt said he did not know if he could answer the question with a "yes" or "no".

He said that as Council knows, the Burgess of the Borough can sit as a magistrate and he can be paid in one or two ways. He can either receive the costs he is entitled to under law or be paid on a salary basis. Burgess Gahring is on a salary and all of the fines and costs collected by him go into the General Fund. With respect to the question of costs, we have to try to find the answer in the Act of 1951 which states the fines to be charged by the minor judiciary in every case shall be as follows:

"Summary Convictions Motor Violations.... \$5.00".

It is the Burgess' interpretation and understanding of this Act that this is a violation of our Ordinance which regulates the use of motor vehicles. We have the authority under the law that the Legislature gives the Boroughs to designate a 1-way street.

As Nr. Brandt understands the matter, Council made Wellington Drive a 1-way street as a result of a petition signed by a large number of persons living on that street over the protests of some others.

Mr. Hurley asked that since, according to the Burgess, that violation does not appear on the back of our tag, could a tag be issued at the time of the violation to regulate the payment of the fine.

Mr. Brandt answered that frankly, he does not know. He said he feels as he thinks the Members of Council do, as well as the Burgess, that the costs are excessive considering the amount of the fine. Mr. Hurley said that is why he asked the question — why could not the offender have an opportunity to pay one or two dollar fines instead of a total of \$7.00.

Mr. Brandt said that if an offender is prosecuted only under a violation of the Ordinance, I think that you can fix the costs at whatever you wish provided they do not exceed the five dollars. In other words, if you resort solely to the Borough Ordinance, the Burgess, to make sure, the persons are charged under the motor code and the Ordinance - it is a double barrelled charge.

Mr. Hurley asked if he would be in order if he were to recommend a \$2.50 charge, i. e., \$2.10 penalty and \$40¢ for the expense of a letter sent out.

Mr. Brandt said Mr. Hurley would be in order, but so far as the costs are concerned, a form must be prepared, it must be sworn to and mailed out. It would seem to Mr. Brandt that the costs should be at least \$1.00.

Mr. Hurley asked if a tag could be issued at the time of the violation. Mr. Kress asked if a tag is issued at the time of the violation and the defendant wanted to take it into court, would that jeopardize us in court.

Mr. Brandt said he liked the form because then your groundwork is laid if the violator does not come in and pay. If a tag is issued, you can still turn it over to the Constable.

Controller.... entered the meeting at 9:57.

Mr. Hurley said he wanted to eliminate the \$7.00 charge as he feels it is in excess of the violation, and Mr. Brandt says he thinks it can be done, but in view of the Burgess being on a salary, he thinks Council can set the fine at \$2.00 and the costs at \$1.00 providing they pay within ten days and if not paid in ten days, then they pay the \$7.00.

The Burgess feels the \$5.00 cost is fixed by the Act in the Borough

Code.

Audience.... Mr. Frank Fisher of the West View Building & Loan Association spoke from the audience and asked if Council were going to discuss or consider removing the l-way on Wellington Drive entirely. He was informed "No." (The people who had requested, by petition, that the street be made l-way, should be advised and be heard from before anything is done about removing the restriction as it is their understanding the trial period is for sixty days.)

Mr. Donohue, who resides on Montclair Avenue in Wellington Heights, presented a petition requesting that the 1-way restriction be lifted, stating he was presenting the petition with the understanding that it could add additional lists of names to the petition when he secures them.

Mr. Harry Schane, Georgetown Avenue, from the audience, opposed the l-way traffic on Wellington Drive.

Page #4 - December 7, 1954.

Mr. Nash stated that on December 6, a call letter was delivered to his home, the letter stating: "At the request of Members of the Police & Public Safety Committee." He did not know there was going to be a discussion about Wellington Drive and Mr. Guckert, who is not at this meeting, and with whom Mr. Mash talked, did not know anything about the matter.

Mr. Nash feels we have a problem to solve, the problem being, are we going to keep Wellington Drive a 1-way street or change it back to its original form of traffic. The Burgess acted as he saw fit in enforcing the Ordinance which this council passed.

Mr. Kress felt that if we are to take any action on the matter, the people who presented the request by petition should have an opportunity to be heard.

Burgess Gahring stated there had not been more than four or five violations on the street since December 1.

Mr. Hurley says he believes the worst of offending is over. Wellington Drive had been a speedway for traffic going both ways and so far as he can see, it looks like the l-way traffic is the answer to the speeding problem.

Mr. Link says he is willing to let the trial period stand for the sixty days.

Motion by Mr. Link, seconded by Mr. Hurley, that the fines collected remain in the Borough but that the costs which were paid, and which seemed to him to be in excess and unjust, be returned to the ones who have paid and the ones on the books that have not been collected, they be let off with the fine.

Under Question, Mr. Brandt was asked if this is legal and replied that Council could vote on the motion and it would indicate how Council feels, but he did not want to take the responsibility of ruling it out of order, but that it is a question of law.

Roll Call - Ir. Heil wanted to be certain of the legality

Mr. Nash defers voting until a ruling is given by the Solicitor.

Mr. Donahu withdrew his request of making Wellington Drive two-way providing consideration is given to it at the next Meeting.

Christmas..... Mr. Deem, Borough Manager, explained a plan for lighting the business Lights section for Christmas.

Motion by Mr. Hurley, seconded by Mr. Link, that Christmas Lights be installed on Perrysville Avenue from Center Avenue to Chalfonte Avenue After discussion, Mr. Hurley withdrew his motion and Mr. Link withdrew his second.

Wellington Dr

Audience..... Mr. Frank Donahue had additional names to be added to the Petition requesting that Wellington Drive be 2-way traffic, and asked that action be taken with respect to the request.

> Protests to 1-way traffic were verbally given by Mr. Donahue, Mr. Dorgan, Mr. Frank Fischer and Mr. Skillen. Also hrs. J. F. Henry. Mr. Norman Daniels, Wellington Drive, spoke in favor of the 1-way traffic and set forth his reasons, the main one being "safety".

Mr. Ransick - Marquette Drive, favors the 1-way.

Mr. Mertz- Wellington Drive asks that Council continues the 1-way traffic.

Mr. Harbaugh Miller - Wellington Drive, also asks that the 1-way be continued for the safety of the people having driveways on Wellington Drive as well as the school children.

(Mr. Daniels advised that he was the originator of the petition which was presented to Council requesting the 1-way regulation.) A letter received from Mr, Lloyd of Wellington Drive, compliments Council for the 1-way regulation.

Councilman Heil suggested that possibly some changes in the traffic signs may help the situation in restoring 1-way traffic. One sign in particular would be placed on Highland Avenue before the approach to Wellington Drive, and would read "Route 19 Straight Ahead." to help divert traffic away from Wellington Drive. Another would be "Stop" signs at the intersection along the Drive. Councilman Hurley recommends the problem be turned over to the Public Safety Committee and make a thorough study of it.

Solicitor Brandt advised there are Traffic Engineers in the City of Pittsburgh who are available for consultation who will make a study based on the amount of travel, the topography, and other factors and make recommendations. He does not know if Council wants to incur the expense but he did want Council to know there is such an expert available.

Mr. Dorgan said to lift the restriction and then make the study.

Councilman Heil wants it on record that in the first place, he thinks when this petition was taken up, no one knew it was going to create such a problem. He says that he, for one, when a potition comes in to make a radical change, will vote to take it under consideration rather than vote on the spur of the moment. He stated Council had sixteen names when they took action and now have a petition on which we have a hundred signatures. He thinks we had better give it some consideration.

Mr. Brandt explained that three or four years ago, upon request or petition, Wellington Drive was made a "Through Stop" street at the intersection of Montclair, and the Pittsburgh Newspapers

gave it publicity and the wrath of the people fell upon the heads. Consequently, the regulation was removed.

Mr. Donahue stated that the President had not asked for any other motion and he, representing the signers of the petition objecting to 1-way, asks immediate action in recinding the 1-way street, removing the ban and then take all the time Council likes at arriving at a conclusion.

Mr. Kress said no motion has been made, it was a recommendation. He then asked what was Council's pleasure. After an interval and no response, Mr. Kress amounced:

"There being no objection from Council, it will remain 1-way traffic on Wellington Drive for another thirty days, (or the full sixty day trial period) and then the Ordinance will either have to be amended or the ban lifted."

Payroll...... Motion by Mr. Guckert, seconded by Mr. Tiernan, that the Payroll for Novembee be approved.

Carried and so ordered.

North Hills.... The following letter was received from the North Hills Joint Joint School Schools:

"West View, Pa., Nov. 29, 1954.

West View Borough Council, c/o Mrs. Naomi Guckert, Secretary, Municipal Building, Perry Hiway, Pittsourgh 29, Pa. Gentlemen:

In November 1953 the West View Borough Council was contacted with regard to approving the financing of a building program of the North Hills Joint Schools (Ross Township School District and West View Boro School District) through the West View Authority.

The financing was to cover a new secondary school building on the Heim Farn property, owned by the Ross School District, of approximately \$2,500,000.00.

Since that time we have added to the program an addition to the Evergreen School estimated to cost approx. \$100,000.00 and a new elementary school in the Gass Plan of Lots to cost approx. \$180,000.00.

As we have had no answer regarding previous request, we would ask that West View Council consider official approval of this program for financing by the West View Authority as soon as possible.

Very truly yours, s/ Harry G. Calming, Secretary."

Mr. Kress announced there is no copy of a letter dated November, 1953, regarding the above matter in the files of the North Hills Joint School files nor in the Borough's files. According to the way the Authority was created, they cannot go into a building program unless Council gives approval.

Mr. Kress recommends that he appoint a Committee of three Councilmen to meet with the Authority, then in turn, the Authority and

the Members of Council meet with the Joint School Board, after which a report is to be made to Council for action.

Mr. Kress asked that all Councilmen study the matter to learn the answers to the many problems and what it would involve for the Authority to finance this building program.

Councilmen answered as follows when Mr. Kress called on them:
Mr. Link thinks there is so much involved and inasmuch as we have been criticized for doing things too fast, we should have a meeting with the Authority and see what their opinion is, and have a meeting with Members of the School Board to find out what it is all about.

Councilman Hurley thinks too much involved. Councilman Guckert agrees with Mr. Hurley.

Councilman Heil is of the opinion there are many things within the Borough needed rather than going outside of the Borough and

spending our money.

Councilman Tiernan is of the opinion that since our Authority is a General Authority, it can go into any phase of operation, like building this school as well as grade schools, and the reason the School Board is coming to the West View Borough Authority is because the Authority of West View has been a very successful one. Ross Township has an Authority created by the Ross Township Commissioners but they have no one to operate it. The problem would be for our Authority to actually construct the schools and issue bonds which would pay for the school buildings and the improvements therein. I think our own Authority has a big enough problem at the time running our own building and water authority. I still think the Members of the Authority Board, as you mentioned, should be talked with as well as the School Board, to see what is involved. The Water Authority itself is a continuing operation. These schools would be built in Ross Township. The money would be raised by our own Authority and the West View Authority has an AA rating for its bonds outstanding because of its growth and management. There is a feeling among the School Board Members that with this management, they may be able to float a bond issue at a very reasonable rate of interest.

However, the burden then will be placed upon our present Board to go through with this entire construction program, which puts an

added burden upon them.

Once the schools are built, the burden is gone because it is just a matter of West View and Ross Township paying rent to the Authority, which goes toward the bonds.

However, it is a question whether or not Council wants to tax the Authority Board with this additional problem.

Mr. Link thinks that these meetings with the various Boards may bring to light a lot of questions people would like to know and they should be held.

Chairman, Mr. Kress, appointed a Special Committee, as he described in his opening remarks, as follows: Councilman Link, Councilman Tiernan and Councilman Nash. Any other Councilman who cares to, may attend these Meetings. The Committee is to report back to Council, but Mr. Kress requests that every Councilman give this his consideration.

Councilman Wash asked if his understanding that the Authority is asking to do this is correct, The answer is no. (Each Councilman will receive a copy of the letter.)

Manager's Rpt.. Mr. Deem had a Representative out from the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Mirror at Horse Company to discuss the placing of a mirror at Horse Shoe Bend but they would not recommend it.

Magnolia Steps. Mr. Deem made a study of the matter of erecting steps as an outlet for Magnolia Avenue. His estimate is \$200.00 for material plus the cost of labor. He did not think a path feasible. The matter is referred to the Public Works Committee and Lr. Heil suggests that the Manager and the Members of his Committee go over this as there are only five or six houses to be served by this path, or steps. Councilman Nash says those people want an out — and would be satisfied with a path.

Steps at..... Mr. Deem has been investigating the condition of the excavation Magnolia made by Wright, adjacent to the Borough Steps, but it is a question now of who owns the land. Wright dug out the land without any survey but he is definitely on property now his own.

Scotti Lot.... Mr. Deem reports the building material and rubbish has been removed from the Scotti Lot on Beechmont Avenue.

Costs - Welling.Mr. Brandt presented his opinion regarding the refunding of the ton Drive l-Way costs which were collected from violators of the l-way traffic on Wellington Drive. The following is his conclusion, being a part of the written opinion:

"It would, therefore, follow that Council, since the costs along with the fine become a part of the Borough funds, would have the power to remit the costs so collected. However, the pursuit of such a course, in our judgment, notwithstanding the fact that we personally feel that the costs are excessive in this case, would constitute an unwise precedent. We understand that another street in the Borough was made a one-way street during the summer of 1954, on a 60-day trial basis, in accordance with the provisions of the Traffic Ordinance, and that thereafter it was restored to its status of a two-way street; that during the time when it was a one-way street numerous persons were fined and were required to pay the costs."

"It would appear to us, should this motion be adopted, that it would form a basis for the other persons to make demands for the costs paid by them, notwithstanding the fact that they have become a part of the general funds of the Borough and probably have been spent."

Motion by Mr.Link, seconded by Mr. Hurley, that the Borough of West View refund the amount of \$5.00, which was the excessive costs which was imposed on the people for violating 1-way traffic on Wellington Drive, and to those who have not yet paid, the \$5.00 costs be set aside, the \$2.00 fine to stand as is, as of December 7th.

Under Question, Mr. Kress advised that the Burgess has called his attorney, and in turn, they were in conference with one of the Judges of Allegheny County, and the attorney has the Judge's opinion. If this is done, it is the attorney's opinion that the taxpayers can sue the Burgess for surcharge. In our opinion from our Solicitor, did he not say, referring to the the refund, it would be detrimental to us to set a precedent of making any refund.

Mr. Tiernan suggested that under this motion, probably what we should do is make a motion to set charges, rather than go back and refund charges already paid, making the costs enough

to cover the expenses.

According to the opinion of the Solicitor, the Borough Council would have the right to set the amount of charges on a violation of an Ordinance where a hearing is to be held, and we can set charges up to a maximum of \$5.00. He thinks at this time, it should be in the nature of an Ordinance to limit the costs rather than to attempt to make refunds.

Mr. Guckert thinks people will be back and want refunds of costs

if we set up an Ordinance for \$2.00.

Councilman Wash does not think there was anything in the Solicitor's opinion stating the costs were unjust and even though in our judgment costs were excessive. I do not think this Council should be in contradiction to State Legislation. Mr. Brandt says it is interesting in passing to note that this ACT makes no reference to our fixing the costs in Ordinance violations.

Councilman Tiernan asked the Burgess if he had a written legal

opinion on the matter.

Burgess Gahring's answer was "No", but he feels he will have to take legal action if this motion is adopted by Council. He says it cannot be an excessive charge. The law says you have the right to charge \$5.00. Mr. Gahring is on a salary basis, (costs all go into the Borough Treasury), and feels that if he charges less than the law states, he is subject to surcharge. Chairman Kress asked if there were any other questions on the motion, and if not, the Secretary is directed to call the Roll. Persons favoring the refund of the costs, as set forth in the motion, are to respond "yes" - in favor of not refunding the costs, respond "no".

Roll Call - Ayes: Messrs. Hurley and Link. Nays: Messrs. Guckert. Heil, Nash, Tiernan and Kress.

5 Mays and 2 Ayes. Motion defeated by a 5 to 2 vote.

Wilt's Sewer..... Mr. Deem explained the sewer condition at the property of Alvin Wilt on Perrysville Avenue was due to the faulty way the line to Mr. Wilt's house was installed and the tree having been planted directly over the connection to the trunk sewer line. He also stated he had directed the plumber who was working on the job at the time to make a correction in the Borough's Sewer because the excavation was so deep, the Borough Employees could not do it.

The matter was referred to the Public Works Committee and the Manager to meet with the property owner.

Mr. Deem has not received a bill from the plumber for the work

authorized by the Borough.

After discussion, Motion by Mr. Hurley, seconded by Mr. Heil, that authority be given to the Public Works Committee to effect a compromise with Mr. Wilt to the extent of an amount not to exceed one-third of the cost to Mr. Wilt, the Committee to have power to act.

Mr. Deem is to ascertain the cost of the bill to the Borough before settlement is made.

Motion carried and so ordered.

Simon Property....

Mr. Tiernan stated that in view of the fact that our Solicitor has been negotiating with the owners of the Simon Property, which we have condemned, and which for which we had tried to get an offer when we had made a bid, and had never received an offer, and that now we have a proposal from the Simon Estate to sell the property for nine thousand dollars, I would make a motion to the effect that the Borough acquire the entire acreage for the sum of nine thousand dollars, the terms to be made that the money set aside in escrow be paid as a down payment and the balance to be paid next year.

Motion by Mr. Tiernan, seconded by Mr. Hurley, that the Solicitor proceed with entering into agreement to acquire the acreage of the Simon property (situated on Highland, Bronx and Center Avenues in The Borough of West View) at a cost not to exceed Nine Thousand Dollars, the agreement to be referred to the proper

officers for signature.

Motion carried and so ordered.

Motion by Mr. Tiernan, seconded by Mr. Heil, that Ordinance No. 973 be taken up for first reading.
