Officers' Rpts Manager's verbal report:

Malone Corner At the time of the granting of the building permit to Mr. Malone for alterations of property at corner of Perrysville Avenue and Center Avenue, formerly occupied by the Thorofare, Mr. Deem discussed with Mr. Malone the rounding of the corner and Mr. Malone indicated he will dedicate enough property there to take care of rounding the corner to widen the approach when going up Center Avenue. In the meantime, Mr. Deem contacted the State Highway Department and they agree the Traffic Signal light can be moved. The cost to move the light will be thirty to thirty five dollars and to widen the corner, the entire cost will be about three hundred dollars. Solicitor, Mr. Brandt, advised that proper Deed of Dedication would have to be prepared and signed by Mr. Malone and recorded so that it will be a matter of record.

Devlin F. H....Mr. Brandt reports the twenty days have elapsed, the time for Devlin's to appeal the Courts in RE: the matter of using the premises at the corner of Perrysville Avenue and Schwitter Avenue as a Funeral Home. He feels Mr. Armstrong and Mr. Eckert are to be commended for the way they handled the matter and preparing the papers in excellent form. The matter was brought to the attention of the Burgess and the Burgess imposed a fine saying he was enforcing the laws of this Borough. Apparently the Devlins feel it would be a useless matter to make an appeal to the Court. That means the fine is due and payment of the fine must be made. In addition, it means the Borough proceed under their Zoning Ordinance to secure the discontuance of such of the property.

Mr. Eckert will give notice to Devlin's Lawyer to proceed with having Mr. Devlin remove the sign.

Wright..... Public Works - Chairman, Mr. Freese, asks if the Borough ever got a Property decision in RE: the steps at the Wright property.

Mr. Brandt said it was his understanding it would have to be determined who owned the property and asked about the Engineer's Report.

Mr. Deem advised Mr. Tait expected to have a report soon.

Mr. Freese feels it is a hazard and it would not surprise him if the whole thing came down in the case of a thaw.

Mr. Brandt says it should be decided who owns what, but in the meantime, we should go in and put in something for the prevention of accident.

Mr. Deem believes if we could move the sidewalk, it would hold for sometime. Mr. Freese asks should we go to the expense of doing that, or maybe it should be closed off. If it is not our property, it will be Mr. Wright's responsibility, but something should be done. Mr. Wright claims ownership.

Mr. Brandt advised the way to get the thing started is to bring suit against Mr. Wright claiming he took away the lateral support causing damage in amount not known, and ask that the Court require him to remedy the situation.

Mr. Armstrong asked if it should not be clarified on the point - Does Wright or the Borough own the property.

Mr. Brandt replied that Mr. Wright took away the lateral support.

Mr. Freese thinks we should get some action.

Mr. Brandt is directed to take whatever action is necessary to bring a decision in the matter.

Chief of Police Police & Public Safety - Chairman, Mr. Richey, absent due to illness.

Mr. Hurley advised the Burgess that Council feels the Chief of Police
should be on call twenty four hours a day.

Fire & Water ... Requests that his report be deferred until later in this meeting.

Property & Purchase.....No report.

Pub. Relations Mr. Nash, reports he attended a meeting at No. 1 Company and that Chairman — the Department Meeting will be January 10.

F. I. Gollmar. Mr. Nash paid tribute to Frank I. Gollmar, who passed away January 1 by saying that West View lost a fine outstanding citizen, a man of supreme and splendid practice in law, he was a man of unquestioned integrity - Mr. Gollmar was a 'Gentlemen's Gentleman'.

Mr. Brandt said he would feel remiss if he did not say something at this time. He recalled he has known Mr. Gollmar many years, even as

far back as 1928, when he ran for re-election for judge and came to see Mr. Brandt's father. Through the years, Mr. Brandt came to know Mr. Gollmar better. In frequent instances, they were on opposite sides of the fence (in court), but Mr. Gollmar was always fair and a gentlemen.

Mr. Armstrong believes this is a good offer. It does not cost the taxpayers any more and it puts us in position where it is not the highest price piece of equipment. It is not the lowest bid but close to the lowest considering the fact that it has the bronze pump and the savings on the Mack with the bronze pump is not so great. Mr. Brandt said Mr. Farley called him about their letter. The letter is a sequal to a meeting with the Fire Company, about which Mr. Armstrong called Mr. Brandt and asked if this proposal is sufficient. Committees.....Finance Committee - Mr. Duncan, Chairman, reports that the finances of the Borough look pretty healthy, that so far we have not had to borrow on temporary notes, and may get through March.

Public Works Committee - Mr. Freese, Chairman, reports a request has been received from Mr. Eardley, 471 Highland Avenue, about putting the Alley in condition. This will be taken care of.
Mr. Freese also reports that, since we have not heard from Mr. Maier about the strip of ground for use as an outlet from Lipp Avenue, he and Mr. Deem thought of talking with the Bell Telephone Company to see about running a street through a strip of ground adjacent to their building, if we can get them to dedicate it to the Borough. Mr. Nash reports that Mr. Hintermayer consulted with Mr. Maier and Mr. Maier has given his attorney the power to proceed to dedicate the 30' strip to the Borough of West View.
Mr. Nash also reports that when trucks (Borough) go over to cinder, they use Mr. Siano's driveway to trun around, and have torn it up. Mr. Siano requests that the Borough take some slag over to fix up the driveway.

Police & Public Safety Committee - Mr. Richey, Chairman, reports that he and Mr. Gahring were in conference with West View Park Co. and we're lead to believe the Park Company would give a decision on the proposal given to them. So far, Mr. Richey has not heard. The Police and Public Safety Committee had a Meeting last Thursday. March 7, at the request of the Burgess, in fact we had comments from several firemen. They presented a problem they had. They felt that the call they had last week on the fire in Avalon was mishandled and request some consideration to manning the switchboard with a person other than the man who was on duty at that time. Mr. Richey understands the man has since resigned, and in talking with the Borough Manager, Tr. Richey finds he has manned the board and the building is being manned on a temporary basis. It will be up to Council to decide what is to be done on a permanent basis, and at this time, Mr. Richey has no recommendation to make at this time. Mr. Guckert suggests we may have to get desk sergeants to handle this board correctly as there was a delay of twenty minutes and the firemen had to drive up to the Hall. Mr. Freese, speaking in defense of the man on duty, said the signal was 5, which means the firemen are to go to their Fire Company. They did not go but instead called in, jamming up the board. Dear Carl:

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of February 25, 1957, with reference to your inquiry to me as Solicitor for the Fraternal Order of Police.

You state that the members of your police force declined to qualify for Social Security several years ago when that opportunity was made available to them and on several occasions you directed inquiries to the State to determine whether or not the members of the police force could now join, and you were informed that having declined in the first instance, they are not eligible. You have quoted me as giving an opinion that they can now qualify.

I wish to state at the outset that the police as a whole throughout the United States have lobbied to keep themselves from being brought within the scope of the Social Security Act and that except for the States of Florida, North Carolina, Oregon, South Carolina and South Dakota, benefits of Social Security are not available to policemen.

I call your attention to Paragraph 5(a) and Paragraph (p), 42 USCA 418, pages 174, 176 and 178 of the pocket part. Police have never been eligible under this act and I cannot understand how the State could have advised you that they are available for the benefits.

I realize that some municipalities in Allegheny County are making payroll deductions for their police and remitting their names on their returns. However, there is no authorization for the payment of any benefits to these men. Evidently they are certifying these as municipal employes rather than police officers. Purchase

Property & The Municipal Building has been painted, new shades, etc., Mr. Guckert understands we will hold off until fall for the new building to house Borough equipment, but hopes it will be built to protect the equipment.

Building

Recreation On the topic of the new building at the Recreation Field, Mr. Brandt advises Council is required to advertise for the wiring and plumbing. Mr. Nash asked if the material is to cost \$1300 and if there are to be bids taken.

He is not in favor of the building without advertising for bids in the usual proceedure and also, he wants to see specifications.

Pub Relations.....Mr. Nash sais that at the Meeting in March, a letter was to be sent to three firemen, namely, Messrs Hoerner, Schwab and Jackson - so far he has not seen the letters. These men were in the hospital. The Secretary advised she had been informed they were home. She is directed to send the letters.

Vassar Ave..... Mr. Nash reports he had a call from Mr. Vogel, who resides on Vassar Avenue, during a rain, requesting Mr. Nash to come to Mr. Vogel's home, which Mr. Nash did.

He advises there was a considerable amount of water washing down over Mr. Vogel's property.

Mr. Nash asked if the Manager has made any effort to correct this situation.

Several of the Councilmen have visited this place and Mr. Guckert reports there are a number of springs back of Mr. Vogel's property. Mr. Vogel does not want a drainage ditch down along his property and Council is not permitted to authorize a ditch on other peoples! property which will carry the water.

Mr. Deem reports the alley in the rear is an unopened alley and he does not know if a ditch down the alley would take care of the water or not.

After considerable discussion, Mr. Nash suggests that it be looked at and if any relief can be given, the matter should be considered.

Mr. Nash received a call from Mr. Siano, who requests his driveway be repaired with slag and not cinders.

Mr. Richey suggests the Manager and Chairman of Public Works look at this driveway, and if the Borough has caused the damage, and there was slag on the driveway before the damage, the Borough should replace the cinders with slag.

Mr. Louis Vogel, 29 Vassar Aveneu, brought up the matter of drainage Audience on his property. (Mr. Nash referred to this in his report). After discussion, Mr. Brandt advised as follows: First - determine if the spring is on private property, and if it is, the Borough has no authority to go into private property to take care of the spring. The lower property is the servient property for water that originates on higher ground. It has been a natural drainage. Before Council can take any action, they would have to have a definate finding, by Mr. Deem, that the spring originates on Borough property. The fact that a street or alley is dedicated by the people who lay out the plan, it does not become a street or alley until it is accepted and opened by the Borough. Until the Borough does accept it by action of acceptance or by going in and opening it, it is only a paper alley. It is still not the Borough's responsibility until the Borough accepts the street or alley. Mr. Brandt suggests Council direct the Manager to go over again and try to locate the source of the spring, put it on a plan to show Council what is happening, and call for an opinion from the Solicitor. The Manager was so directed.

Rec. Com.....Mr. Emery Shaffer read a letter in regards to the "After-Prom" entertainment, advising a meeting of a Committee to be held on April 16. Mr. Shaffer is of the opinion the Committee will request a contribution. Councilman Armstrong asked if we are within our legal rights to donate to the After Prom Affair, calling attention that Ross Twp. has students. Mr. Richey suggests the thing to do is for Mr. Shaffer to attent the meeting and come back to Council and let us know such things as to what the Township may be donating, etc. Mr. Hurley asks for an expression as to what amount Council is willing to contribute so that Mr. Shaffer can attend the meeting knowing what will happen.

Mr. Nash remarked he has read about "After Prom" tragedies, and if a donation from the Council will help to stop some of these things from happening, and since a student only graduates once and want to have a good time, he is for giving a donation.

Mr. Armstrong feels it is not a question of whether it is a worth while cause, but a recommendation as to what amount is requested. Mr. Richey suggests Mr. Shaffer attend the Meeting knowing that Council is in favor of going along with a reasonable amount of contribution.

A request has been received from the School District for the use of the field five days a week from June 15 to August 15. Mr. Nash asked if Dr. Rice made any suggestion as to who is to supervise during that period.

Mr. Hurley suggests these arrangements fall under the direction of the Recreation Board, who will work out plans whereby everyone can use the field.

Mr. Duncan said one thought occurred to him - i.e., Bellevue found out they had people who were not residents of Bellevue going to their swimming pool. They had to set up some regulation so that only

Bellevue people could go there. He wonders if we are going to have to have some identification for West View children so there will not be more outsiders than West View children.

Authority....

Mrs. Borland, 367 Stanford Ave., directing her question to Mr. Brandt, asked if legislation now before the Assembly regarding Authorities would affect West View Authority. Mr. Brandt said not so far as the Shopping Center Project, but that it would affect future projects of the Building Department of the Authority if there were to be lease backs, such as the lease back now with the Borough. The Water Department does not have any lease backs. Mr. Nash said that it is his understanding that after the Members of the Authority are appointed by Council, there is no longer any control by Council over the Authority. Mr. Brandt advised the Authority is controlled by the Members of the Board, but Council is entitled to have an audit made; however, not more frequently than annually. If in such an audit, Council finds that by the extension of water lines, there is financial unproduction, or operation at a loss, or that by the extension of the lines, that the debentures originally issued would have a life

Under Question - Mr. Nash approves all salaries and wages excepting for services of employees at the Recreational Building at the Simon Playground.

Mr. Nash asked the Manager what the building is to cost. Mr. Deem answered that without roof studs, shingles, wiring, sewer or plumbing, the cost has been almost \$900.00.

It was commented that it cost \$318.00 for laying 800 block at this building, which seems a lot of money for that work. Mr. Nash feels the building could have been built more reasonably by a contractor, than by the Borough.

The Manager advised it was estimated the building would cost \$2500 to \$3000 without the plumbing and electric.

These are the reasons Mr. Nash approves the Payroll with the exception of labor used at the Recreational Building.

Motion by Mr. Freese, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that the reports of the Burgess, Treasurer, Chief of Police, Fire Chief and Secretary and the verbal report of the Manager, be received and filed. Carried and so ordered.

Manager's verbal report follows:

Roof Municipal The Roof at the Municipal Building has been repaired and Mr. Deem Bldg. reports is in satisfactory condition.

(NOTE - The repairs are unconditionally guaranteed for a period of l year and the new work is unconditionally guaranteed for a period of five years.)

No. Park Rd. Mr. Downes has requested that the Borough ahandon the old Perry Road. This is in the vicinity of North Park Road entrance. It was Mr. Deem's recommendation that the Borough retain the road and request the State Highway Department to remove their cinder pile. The Borough could then make a wider entrance to North Park Road. The State Highway Department replied to our letter in RE: removing cinders and are going to meet with the Borough.

Mr. Downes asked the Manager what the Borough has in mind, and Mr. Deem explained. Mr. Downes wants to attend the Meeting with the State.

The fences at the Tennis Courts and the Simon Playground have been installed with the exception of the ornaments. Also the back-stop has been moved. Also the 16' of fence taken care of at the walk.

Drainage -Vassar

Mr. Deem reports he made an inspection of the drainage condition at Vassar Avenue and it is evident that the Alley, from which the drainage runs off, was graded at one time.

He explained the water does not come from any springs on the alley but from springs on the bank on private property.

Mr. Hurley asked what could be done to correct the condition.

Mr. Deem said he believes if a ditch were dug for 100 feet beyond the property in question it would help remedy the problem.

Mr. Hurley suggests, and Mr. Armstrong is in accord, that the Borough remedy the situation if it is coming from our alley onto private

Mr. Nash thinks we should have an opinion from the Solicitor Mr. Armstrong called attention there were people who only own 25 feet on either side of their houses, but have the use of a 20 ft. alley. He referred this remark to the Solicitor.

Malone Property Mr. Deem reports Mr. Malone has the deed, which he turned over to his attorney who is in the process of getting releases from the Mellon Bank and the American Oil Company.

Wright Property Mr. Deem referred to the letter sent to him by Mr. Brandt in RE: Mr. Wright purchasing the triangular parcel of ground, 92 x 20 x 36, which is owned by the Borough, and also showed Council the drawing. He suggests the Councilmen look at this site and decide what is to be done.

The question of whether Mr. Wright will accept the responsibility of the walk and maintenance of the steps was discussed. The Solicitor suggests that this matter be cleared up, and after some decision is reached, the matter be cleaned up.

& Perry Hwy

Traffic, Center Mr. Deem reports that the traffic at Center & Perrysville Avenues, (at park) can be handled by hand switch excepting the treadle at the park entrance, and that can only be controlled by turning off the light and then it takes two policemen to control traffic. The factory, who make the traffic signals, has come up with a new signal system, the same type as is used at the southern end of the Liberty Tubes, and which can be operated manually or automatically. The cost of this system, if we want to keep the present cycle, will be \$666.75, with an allowance of \$150.00 for the old equipment. If the Borough wants to increase the cycles, it will be necessary to add a third phase, at \$75.00 additional.

Mr. Deem discussed with Mr. Ed. Vettel, the matter of the Park paying a share of this cost as it is for their benefit.

Mr. Hurley suggests that the Park creates the traffic condition and it may be well to approach them in terms of their paying a part of that cost. Public Safety Chairman, Mr. Richey, the Burgess and the Manager are requested to talk with the Park about the matter.

Drainage Rec Field Mr. Deem reports it is necessary to install 136' of 8" drain pipe for the Recreation Field.

He inquired for bids and only received one, i.e., Edward Bairhalter for \$3.50 per foot for 8" sewer.

Mr. Duncan brought up the question of doing away with septic tanks in the Borough; referring to the tanks above the Playground which are used by the residents facing Highland Avenue.

Solicitor Rpt. Deferred until later in the Meeting.

Committees ... Finance Committee - Motion by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Nash, that the sum of \$500 be transferred from the General Fund to the Sinking Fund for June 1 obligations.

Carried and so ordered.

Public Works.. Will report under new business.

Police & Public Mr. Richey reports in RE: Police Pension - he has talked with Mr. Mockenhaupt, who is an actuarian who sets up these pension plans for Safety municipalities, but he has not had too much opportunity to talk with the Committee. He does not know whether we want to act on this matter as yet as we have until the end of the year to get into operation. Mr. Richey has a copy of Act 600 and it looks like, as there are seven men on our police force, it is not necessary but sooner or later we will have to go into it and there is no time like the present. He further comments that what we have to do is to set up a fund so that the police who retire at the age of 60 will have fifty percent of their last year's salary or 60 percent of their last five years' salary. If the existing fund is turned over, it gives a starting basis for the pension fund. Our force has a nice sizeable fund. it exceeds any funds I have heard of in any other communities. Mr. Richey reports there seems to be a flat rate of seven hundred dollars for setting the system up and the amount increases with a larger force.

Mr. Duncan asked if set up by State or actuary.

Mr. Richey says you can set it up at the minimum of the law or you can have it administered by a bank or trust company or self administered. Mr. Richey adds it is going to cost a lot more money to the Police because they are not in Social Security.

Mr. Richey asked if Council wants the matter referred back to Committee and Mr. Hurley suggests it be referred back since there are many things we will want to do before taking any action.

Mr. Richey also said some of the Boroughs have extended the coverage back to all employees.

He asks if we are ready to hire Mr. Mockenhaupt.

Mr. Brandt advised that Louis Polacheck makes no charge, and Hayden Wilson does make a charge, but they have experience on these funds. He also suggests Norbert Weidner, former resident of the Borough, and who carries the Pension Fund Insurance for our Police, has had experience.

Mr. Freese asks that if the Officers desire to take one half of the amount he is to receive and allow one half for the widow. Mr. Richey does not know the answer.

Page 5 - May 14, 1957

Mr. Brandt said most plans provide that when a man reaches the age of sixty, he has the right of election as to what he wants to do. Mr. Richey says the law stipulates the minimum you must do and gives you the choice as to how much more you want to go.

Mr. Duncan asks if Council doesn't think we should hold this matter over for another month and have some suggestions from insurance companies, and then decide whether we want to get Mr. Mockenhaupf, or what would be the best plan. This was agreed.

Fire & Water

Chairman, Mr. Armstrong, reports the Leece Neville system has been installed on No. 3 truck which will take current into cellars for light, during an emergency.

He also reports he has a letter from the Fire Department reporting some of the fire hydrants are not functioning property.

The matter is referred to Council, by the Firemen, to get in touch with the Authority.

Property & Pur-Chairman, Mr. Guckert, no report.

Public Relations Chairman, Mr. Nash, reports Benj. Moore in Hospital and also Albert Hoerner - would like cards sent.

He also reports that Pete Smith, former Chief of Police, passed away and asks that this meeting adjourn in memory or him.

Motion by Mr. Armstrong, seconded by Mr. Richey that Resolution No. 703 be adopted as read.

Solicitor RE: Spring water coming from alley onto property on Vasser Avenue, asks who owns the land where the springs are located.

Councilman Freese answered three or four people.

Councilman Armstrong said the water runs to the alley and to private property.

Mr. Freese asked what is to be done to open the alley, or can we open it. You can see where it has been graded.

Mr. Brandt said that ordinarily speaking, it would be the responsibility of the owner of the land where the springs are to dispose of the water. Once the Borough assumes the responsibility, you must dispose of it. The Borough should find out who the owners of the property are and give them notice to make some disposition of the water so as to stop the damage. Generally speaking, when you buy a piece of property, you know the conditions that exist. These springs are north of Harvard Avenue in that wooded section and it is possible that property is owned by people who have not paid the taxes.

Mr. Armstrong called attention the people on either side of the alley have $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet of land, but they have developed the alley as their land and are using 20 feet of Borough property. He asks if they can acquire ownership over a period of twenty years. He also said that all that has to be done is the water carried down the alley and the man (Mr. Vogel) would not have to put up with the condition.

Mr. Brandt asked what could you do with the water.

Mr. Freese said it would be carried down through the woods.

Mr. Brandt asked if you take it to Kenyon Avenue, is there drainage there.

Mr. Armstrong said it would take two men two days' time to run a ditch about 100 feet and give the man relief.

Mr. Brandt said if, as Mr. Armstrong says, two men two days' time, it might be cheaper to put the drainage down the street and assume the street was opened, the expense of the law suit may be more than the cost of the ditch.

Mr. Freese asked what we could do about the spring between the alley and the lots on Vassar Avenue.

Mr. Brandt said when you have an inspection and have concluded the alley was opened, and in the absence of any record in the Borough, you feel it was opened by the Borough, and if it is a public alley, then it is our duty to dispose of the water. He further said, you have the power to condemn for grading, paving and drainage and you have the power to condemn the land to take care of the drainage. I will say you can do it.

If there was evidence that it had never been opened or is a public street, then I would say it is not your responsibility.

Mr. Brandt also said if you can define it an alley or right of way, you are all right, but do not go onto private property.

Mr. Deem said it will be necessary to dig up shrubs and trees that have been placed on the alley.

Mr. Hurley said the proper thing to do is to ask those people about their shrubs and trees and perhaps they will want to move them. The matter is referred back to the Public Works and Public Relations Committees to investigate and to come up with recommendations for solution.

Audience...

Mr. Bonn, Westfield Avenue, asked about the improvement of Westfield Avenue and was told it is on the agenda.

Mr. Safarik called on an inspection on Norwich Avenue at Curtis Avenue. It seems there is a lot of water goes down over. There is a pipe where it was washed out and I was asked to mention it to Council.

Mr. Nash asked about State Act 507. In RE: the problem of septic tanks adjacent to the Playground, Mr. Nash recalled this matter was brought up two years ago and nothing done at that time. Mr. Safarik said the minute a sewer is available, you can compel the owner who has a septic tank to go into the sewer.

Mr. Nash remarked that he thinks the County Health Bill is a big thing and when he sees the names of prominent doctors in the department, he feels perhaps we should just wait a little while before we decide what we are going to do. He asked how can we make a decision until we are familiar with it.

Recreation

Hurley, President, and Naomi Guckert, Secretary of the Borough of West View, be and they are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to enter into a written contract with Lawrence McKee, of 274 Bellevue Road, Pittsburgh 29, Allegheny County, Pennsylvania, for the collection of rubbish within the limits of the Borough of West View, for a term of three (3) years, for the total sum of Eleven Thousand Seven Hundred (\$11,700.00) Dollars.

SECOND: That all resolutions or parts of resolutions inconsistent with the terms hereof, by and the same are hereby repealed.

Wright Property Mr. Brandt will have the Title Man investigate as to where the property is (vicinity of Wright Used Car Lot) that the Borough owns.

Devlin Property Mr. Brandt reports the Court handed down a decision in favor of the Borough in RE: the Devlin Funeral Home. The sign will be taken down and Mr. Brandt suggest perhaps Mr. Deem should give notice to Mr. Devlin to desist using the property as a Funeral Home, or perhaps he should call Mr. Armstrong (Attorney) as to the notice or advice as to what to do in the matter, and to advise Mr. Gahring, as Burgess.

Grigsby Property Mr. Brandt read a letter addressed to him by Mr. Larimer, attorney for Mr. Grigsby, Cornell Avenue. Mr. Deem gave Mr. Brandt a drawing showing elevations in the Alley to the rear of Mr. Grigsby's property and also a report of the condition.

Mr. Brandt is authorized to advise Mr. Larimer of this report and drawing.

Wage Tax ...

Mr. Hurley referred to the matter of whether a manufacturer was required to pay wage tax. This question was brought about by an inquiry from a resident of the Borough, who feels that we cannot impose a wage tax on him because he is a manufacturer. Mr. Brandt has checked the Philadelphia Act and also the City of Pittsburgh Act, and can find no definite cases on denture manufacturers. Mr. Brandt suggests deferring the matter to see if the City of Pittsburgh has a ruling on the matter.

Plumber's License

The Board of Health have asked that Ordinance No. 921, Plumbing Ordinance to provide that if a plumber does not have a license to work in the Borough the current year, that he not be issued a license for the next year without an examination. To explain, if a plumber had a license in the Borough, and then for two or three years did not secure his license, he would have to have an examination (according to regulations) to procure another license. Motion by Mr. Freese, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that the matter be referred to the Solicitor to draw up an ordinance amending Ordinance No. 921, to the above effect, to be presented at the regular meeting of Council in June. Carried and so ordered.

Street Improv- Mr. Deem called attention that all Councilmen had received a list ements - 1957 of streets we plan to do.

> Councilman Armstrong had asked that the specifications also include "hot mix" as well as otherwise, and asked if Mr. Deem had made the changes. Mr. Armstrong referred to all of the streets that were put in under the \$76,000 Bond Issue and said he understands a "hot mix" street is a better street. He suggests we want six inch base, #4 slag, 2" I D 2 choked with lime dust and a ten ton roller. After much discussion, Mr. Armstrong suggests it would be well for Council to meet several times a month during this period and have round-table discussions so we do not have to do all this discussing at our regular meetings.

Mr. Armstrong also asked if, since we have equipment, some of this work could be done by our own men.

Mr. Nash thinks we should have 8" base pressed, either limestone or six inch slag and 2 inch "hot mix".

Mr. Duncan suggests that Westfield Avenue is different from all of the other streets for the reason we will use Gasoline funds to defray the costs, or part of costs, and the specifications must be approved by the State, and that perhaps we could act on that. (no action taken).

Mr. Armstrong suggests the use of a Vibrator for compacting.

Sheriff Sale Lots

Mr. Duncan said he believes the year is up for some of our lots taken at Sheriff Sale and could be sold. He thinks it would be well to get them started so we could use the receipts to put some more lots up.

Mr. Nash asked about the list of lots to be sold at Sheriff Sale which was prepared by Mr. Link.

Mr. Brandt advised he will have the list sent to each Councilman.

Wall - Welling- Mr. Duncan has had complaints about the heighth of the wall at ton Drive

Wellington Drive and Highland Avenue. It is too high for proper vision of drivers. He suggests perhaps we should find out where the street right of way is and if we have the power, have the owner move the wall back so as not to obstruct view.

Parking Henchars Mr. Hurley has been approached about the parking situation at the Henchar Tavern. It is the consensus of opinion of Council that the traffic is working out much better since the parking is prohibited.

Streets

Mr. Nash said, referring back to the streets that he notices about a street in conjunction with Ross Township. He says there are streets in West View that have not been paved, calling attention to Yale Avenue that runs off Carlisle Avenue. Mr. Nash thinks we should think first about the streets in West View that we are going to have paved instead of the streets that abutt Ross Township. Mr. Freese explained about the Borough considering paving Schwitter Avenue, which is a boundry street, in return for the improvement Ross Township made on Princeton and Kenyon Avenues, which are also boundry streets.

Mr. Nash said Yale Avenue is a Borough street and a man has asked for improvement for three different years.

Recreation Board

Mr. Richey in RE: the Recreation Board, reports that at the last meeting the Board had that either he or Mr. Schafer were going to bring before Council.

One thing was the dedication of the playground and another was for a name.

At the time of the meeting, they were pretty much in accord that since the Little League were going to dedicate their season, perhaps we would dedicate the field at the same time. Since then, I have talked with Mr. Schaefer and have tried to contact a couple of Members of Council, and it seems to me that we do not have enough time to work up a dedication for May 26. (This was a quote from Mr. Richey). He also said there was a question of whether we should dedicate it when it is not finished, but it was agreed to present it to Council and leave it up to Council.

The Board did not decide on any name. Several were mentioned -West View Recreation Field, Highland Recreation Field or Bronx Avenue Field.

Mr. Hurley suggest perhaps we should wait until the completion. Mr. Duncan suggests Fourth of July.

Mr. Armstrong recalls projects have been dedicated before they are finished.

Mrs. Roberts asked to speak about it and indicates preference for May 26, when the Little League are having their dedication. After discussion, motion by Mr. Richey, seconded by Mr. Freese, that the dedication of the Recreation Field be May 26, 1957, the program to be handled by the Recreation Board.

Motion carried and so ordered.

Motion by Mr. Richey, seconded by Mr. Freese, that the name of the Field be West View Recreation Field #1. Carried and so ordered.

Mr. Hurley advised there is a meeting on Thursday Evening, in Judge Duff's Office, in RE: the damages as claimed by residents of Shaler, caused by Girtys Run Sewer during storms, and he requests that all Councilmen be present. Mr. Brandt advises he will not be present, but Mr. Leonard Kane will be there.

Motion by Mr. Richey, seconded by Mr. Freese, that Council adver-Police Car .. tise for bids for a new police car, to be opened at the regular meeting, June 11, 1957. Carried and so ordered.

Sewer Tap

Motion by Mr. Armstrong, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that the sewer Recreation Field tap to service the Recreation Field be installed as per bid received from Bairhalter. Carried and so ordered.

Septic Tanks

In RE: Septic Tanks used by residents of Highland Avenue, directly above the Recreation Field, Mr. Deem is directed as follows: Motion by Mr. Armstrong, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that the Borough Manager be instructed to contact the residents of Georgetown and also Highland Avenues, who are using Septic Tanks, in an effort to secure a petition for a sewer to be installed to service these homes.

The purpose of the Special Meeting was to discuss the street improvements to be made during the year 1957.

(Call letter read by Mr. Hurley).

Prior to this meeting, specifications for street work proposed were sent to each Member of Council, Westfield Avenue being a separate specification because funds from the Gasoline Allocation are to be used toward the cost.

Councilman Nash asked if the cost would be much more if an eight inch base were to be used rather and a six inch base. Mr. Deem answered it would be about 20¢ per square yard.

Mr. Armstrong remarked that if we are going to put a street on West-field Avenue, we will get the cost of that street back in taxes in the next five years. From then on, we can count on the taxes, so if we put the right street down and have a right job, it is going to carry the traffic and it is not going to be necessary to go back in five years from now to do it over.

Mr. Armstrong asked if the Borough could do any of this work with the Borough help and equipment, speaking of base, etc., and then have the I D-2 placed on it.

He also said the specifications call for "Vibrator" to be used on the grades and asks why only on the grades, why not on all of it. Councilman Nash thinks the vibrator should be used on all of the base and also limestone. He asked about the number of size of limestone as compared with slag aggregate.

Mr. Deem advised that the State Highway Department specifies the size.

Mr. Nash thinks 4" should be included in the specifications and bids should be taken on six and also eight inch base. Councilman Nash also said he was told to use a vibrator all over the street it makes a better job.

After discussing this method, it was suggested alternate bids be taken, one using the vibrator all over the streets, the other using the vibrator on the hills and roller on the level.

Motion by Mr. Freese, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that Council advertise for bids for the street work as per the specifications, bids to be opened at the Regular Meeting of Council, June 11, 1957.

Motion carried and so ordered.

. Councilman Nash suggests that on Wexford Alley, an eight inch base with #4 Slag or stone aggregate, with lime choke and two inch surface be used.

Mr. Nash also asked for a list of the streets that were done under the Bond Issue. (This was sent to all Members of Council).

In this situation, since the land is of little or no value and is subject to the rights of the public in the use of steps and the walk leading to the North Park Road and because it is important to the Borough of West View in order to better assure its residents of ingress and regress to the Parkwood Acres Plan from the Perry Highway at or near West View Park, it would be our suggestion that Council authorize the undersigned, as Solicitor, to present the facts to the Allegheny Bellevue Land Company and to call upon them to give the Borough a Quit-Claim Deed for the same. However, before this can be done, an accurate survey must be made.

Once the Borough acquires title to the said parcel, then it can convey a portion of the premises to the Wrights and secure an agreement from him with respect to the maintenance of the walks and the steps.

Fr. Brandt's answer is no, if there are five, or any number, they could but would be required to take an examination. The West View Board of Health also recognizes a lecense in the City of Pittsburgh.

Mr. Safarik advises that this amendment, which the Board of Realth requested, reads the same as the requirement in the City of Pittsburgh. The Board desires that anybody who has a West View license come and renew it each year. If you are a plumber in the City of Pittsburgh, you have to renew your license every year or else lose it.

Councilman Nash asked if this ordinance is passed, with it be necessary to advertise the whole ordinance.

At the sale, the Deputy Sheriff offers the lot for sale, saying this is a tax sale instituted by the Borough of West View, the cost of the sale is \$214.50, the minimum bid price over and above the cost is \$1200.00. Mr. Armstrong inquired as to when the settlements are made, how does our interest show compared to the cost of the sale, and Mr. Brandt advised, that with slight exception, we have done very well.

Councilman Armstrong asked if the contract could be changed so that the Company will recognize anyone else, as Mr. Deem's name is mentioned, would his successor in office have the same powers and duties. Mr. Armstrong says he has no idea with respect to the appointment of any person.

It would seem it would be to the advantage to the people of the Borough of West View because of any delay for a Borough Manager.

Mr. Hurley remarked that the mere fact that an engineer or cheif in the City of Pittsburgh resigns does not mean the work shall stop.

Councilman Nash says he does not believe this work ought to be done until we have someone in authority to see that this work is done and supervised. Here we have a contract for some twenty thousand dollars and we should have someone to supervise it.

The Motion to take up resolution No. 707 was carried, Mr. Mash voting "No".

OFFICIAL - THE BOROUGH OF WEST VIEW RESOLUTION NO. 707

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE BORQUGH, OF WEST VIEW, IN REGULAR SESSION ASSEMBLED, AND IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED BY AND WITH THE AUTHORITY OF THE SAME:

FIRST: That E. M. Hurley, President, Naomi Guckert, Secretary, and J. L. Gahring, Burgess of the Borough of West View, be and they are hereby authorized, directed and empowered to enter into a written contract with LAMPL ASPHALT PAVING COMPANY, INC., for the improvement of various streets in the Borough of West View, commencing June 20, 1957, and to be completed on or before August 1, 1957, for the total sum of FOURTEEN THOUSAND SEVEN NUNDRED NINETY-SEVEN & NO/100 (\$14,797.00) DOLLARS, in response to its advertisement for sealed proposals for such work.

SECOND: That all resolutions or parts of resolutions inconsistent with this resolution be and the same are hereby repealed insofar as the same affect this resolution.

Motion by Mr. Richey, seconded by Mr. Freese, that Resolution No. 707 be adopted. Carried and so ordered, Councilmen Armstrong and Nash voting "No".

Mr. Nash wants it recorded that this negative vote does not mean we are not in favor of paving the streets, but a different situation has arisen since we last talked about it. He thinks we should have some idea of who is going to supervise this work.

Mr. Hurley advises that will be taken care of before this meeting is adjourned. Mr. Wash replied he thinks, as a Hember of Council, we should know who the man is.

Westfield Ave.. The drawing of Westfield Avenue was to have been presented to Council at this Meeting, but was not delivered.

As soon as the drawing is delivered, the Secretary is to notify Council and a Special Meeting is to be called.

North Hill Real. ... Mr. Brandt advised Council that he has prepared a resolution providing that the rent from Lenny's Auto Stores be paid direct to the Borough. However, he also advises that if the North Hills Real Estate demand that they be paid the commission on the rents for the duration of the Gary Auto Lease, it is his opinion it must be paid to them.

Devlin Sign..........The subject of the sign in front of the Devlin Funeral Home was discussed. The present sign reads "Devlins" and is lighted at night. Councilman Nash thinks we should have a written opinion from the Attorney on how to handle the case about the sign. Councilman Armstrong remarked the Borough has accomplished our point and he does not think we should persecute the man and make him remove the name sign.

Mr. Duncan and Mr. Guckert agree to the extent they believe the sign should remain but the light removed.

Mr. Freese has : had complaints about the lighted sign.

Mr. Duncan remarks that so long as Devlin does not have a funeral there, he believes the sign should be allowed to stand. We have achieved our goal.

Mr. Richey and Mr. Hurley recommend that the matter be tabled until the next meeting.

Westfield Ave....

Again referring to the drawing for Westfield Avenue, the Secretary is directed to contact Mr. Tait daily to get the plan for this street. If he is not available in the next few days, it is suggested that someone else be called in. .

Lenny's Auto Stores. Motion by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Armstrong, that the Borough collect the rent on the Lenny's Auto Stores Lease, (Lenny's are occupying the store formerly occupied by Gary Auto Stores.) Carried and so ordered. (See Solicitor's opinion above).

Civil Service Motion by Mr. Freese, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that Clarence Stroje be appointed as a Nember to the Civil Service Committee for a period of six years, to succeed himself, as of July 31, 1957. Under question - Councilman Nash asked if Mr. Stroje has a public position. Mr. Brandt replied it is his understanding hr. Stroje is a committeeman, but that the two offices are not incompatable. There being no other nominations, Motion by Mr. Richey, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that the Secretary be instructed to cast a ballot naming Mr. Stroje as a Member to the Civil Service Committee. Motion carried and so ordered. Councilman Nash voted NO because if it is true Mr. Stroje is a committeeman, he does not feel a committeeman should be a member of this Committee.

Bd. of Adjust - Motion by Mr. Guckert, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that Mr. Albert VanVlack ment be appointed a Member of the Board of Adjustment, to succeed himself, for a period of three years, as of August 31, 1957.

There being no other nominations, Motion by Mr. Freese, seconded by Mr. Armstrong, that the Secretary be instructed to case a ballot appointing Mr. VanVlack to the Board of Adjustment to succeed himself. Carried and so ordered.

Cosmo Catanazzaro.A letter of resignation was received from Mr. Cosmo Catanazzaro, Bd of Recreation from the Board of Recreation, due to the fact that he has moved from the Borough.

Notion by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Nash, that the resignation be accepted and a letter be sent to him thanking him for the work he has done on the Board in the past years.

New Business...

Councilman Nash asked if Council is going to make an appointment to the Board this evening. The answer is "yes".

Motion by Mr. Nash, seconded by Mr. Guckert, that the name of Mrs. Jensen be placed for a nomination as a Member to the Recreation Board to fill the unexpired term of Cosmo Catanazzaro, which term expires September 22, 1958.

Councilman Richey said, as a member of the Recreation Board, he would

like to hold it over, but if it is coming to a vote this evening, he has a name of a person he would like to present.

Motion by Mr. Richey, that the name of Mr. Laurence Gaertner be placed in nomination to fill the vacancy of the unexpired term of Cosmo Catanazzaro. Mr. Nash remarked there is only one lady representing the ladies of the Borough of West View on that Board and that is one reason he presents her name; also she has served as the Recording Secretary since the beginning and he feels the ladies should have a voice on the Board, making two ladies and three men.

Councilman Duncan askes if it is necessary to take any action on the resignation.

Mr. Hurley remarked the Borough has a good Foreman and he would recommend that Mr. Tresky be made superintendent of Public Works. Mr. Brandt advised as follows:

If you are going to create the office of superintendent, it will be up to Council to decide. The ordinance provides for a Borough manager and if you are not going to have a manager, then he suggests that Council talk this matter over and if the majority wish to vacate the office of Borough Manager, then he thinks we must enact an ordinance recinding the position of Borough Manager, and if you are going to creat another job, there will have to be an ordinance. You have this resignation and you have no choice but to adopt it. Mr. Brandt thinks each Councilman should be furnished with a copy of the Ordinance creating the office of Borough Manager, setting forth the duties and qualifications.

Then Council should decide whether we are going to keep the borough manager type of government, and if you are, then you are going to have to fill the vacancy. In the meantime, Mr. Brandt sees nothing wrong for Council to decide to appoint someone to handle the work, to tell the men what their duties are to be. Something he did recommend to be done tonight is to appoint of delagate to someone the authority and power to supervise and perform the inspection and approval on the contract with Lampl.

Councilman Nash asks that the letter of resignation be recorded in the Minutes of this Meeting.

Mr. Nash would like to whether Mr. Deem explained any reason for leaving the Borough, suggesting he must have one, and he believes we should ask Mr. Deem to furnish this Council in writing the reasons for leaving so abruptly.

Mr. Freese advised Mr. Deem showed him letters of two offers, one in West Virginia, one from McSorley and one from the State, each offering more money.

Mr. Hurley advised that Mr. Deem told him that at the time he started to work for the Borough, he was given about \$6400 and he mentioned that he was promised \$7500 in a short time.

Motion by Mr. Nash, that a letter be sent to Mr. Deem requesting him to advise this Council in writing what his reasons were for leaving the Borough. No second to this motion. Motion lost.

Mr. Frandt said he supposed Council is going to have someone appointed to supervise the work on a temporary basis.

Mr. Hurley said the Foreman is the logical man to carry on under the supervision of the Public Works Committee.

Pending the appointment of a successor to Mr. Deem, the matter of Public Works is vested in the control of the Public Works Committee, and they are to report to Council.

Sinking Fund..... Motion by Councilman Duncan, seconded by Councilman Nash, that \$2500 be transferred from the General Fund to the Sinking Fund for August 1 obligations.

Carried and so ordered.

Inspector.....The Secretary is instructed to contact Mr. Richardson, Hoff Engineers, who inspected the two bridges in 1956 when the work was being done, to see if they will inspect the street work to be done.

There is to be a meeting on Saturday Morning, July 13 of the Members of the Public Works Committee - 1.3. Freese, Armstrong and Duncan and report will be made at the Special Meeting which is to be held when the plan for West View Avenue is received, if possible, to be July 16. Motion by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Richey, that Council adjourn. Carried and so ordered.

CORRECTION - Just before adjournment, motion by Mr. Armstrong, seconded by Mr. Richey, that the Check in amoung of \$150.00 which accompanied Mr. Stanger's bid for plumbing at the Recreation Bldg. be returned. Carried and so ordered.

Minutes of a Special Meeting of The Council of The Borough of West View, held Tuesday Evening, July 16, 1957. Meeting called to order at 8:08, by President of Council, E. M. Hurley.

Roll Call......Was answered by the following Member of Council: Messrs Armstrong, Duncan, Guckert, Nash, Richey and Hurley. Burgess - JL Gahring; Treasurer - DH Peet; Solicitor - Carl Brandt; and Secretary - Naomi Guckert; were present.

The purpose of the Special Meeting was to discuss and take action on any Borough business which maght come before Council.

Westfield Ave... The Plan for Westfield Avenue has been submitted by Mr. Tait. Mr. Brandt advised he has prepared the Ordinance establishing the grade on Westfield Avenue with the understanding it has been told to him that the records of the Borough fail to disclose that a grade of the center line of Westfield Avenue from a point 496' from the intersection of the Center line of Bellevue Avenue has been set. The grade from Bellevue Avenue to this point was established when that section of the street was improved. Mr. Brandt also calls attention that, according to Mr. Tait, you are going to have a grade of 22% which is the steepest grade in the Borough. Mr. Tait has followed the travelled grade substantially.

Councilman Nash "When the contractor laid out this plan, and it was submitted to the Borough, was any grade established at that time. The answer is no.

Councilman Armstrong advises Council should be sure that we are remaining within our 10' right of way even though there are places where the roadway may be 20' from the Center Line or 30! from the Center Line.

Mr. Brandt advises there are four things that should be done in RE: the improvement of Westfield Avenue:

1. - Establish a grade

2. - Appoint someone to do the inspecting

3. - Advertise

4. Have the person who is going to inspect the job visit the site with the Members of the Public Works, and go over the plan.

Councilman Nash thinks this is the correct procedure.
Councilman Duncan wants stakes drived on the right-of-way,
Councilman Richey askes why this street is being built differently
than any other streets and points out that the people have built
there as the street is now.

Mr. Brandt advised that all of the streets which have been improved had the grades established before.

Councilman Richey recommends improving at the level the street is now. The Secretary was directed to call Mr. Tait in RE: pins, etc. Mr. Tait advised there are some pins placed now at curves or rough places and when the actual work is to be started, he, Mr. Tait, will put in the pins.

Ordinance No. 1004. Motion by Mr. Armstron, seconded by Mr. Guckert, that Ordinance No. 1004 be taken up for first.reading.

Roll Call - Ayes: Messrs Armstrong, Duncan, Guckert, Nash, Richey and Hurley. Nays: None.

Carried and so ordered.

Third reading is held in abeyance until the arrival of Councilman Freese.

Refund Clara Brennan. Motion by Mr. Armstrong, seconded by Mr. Guckert, that a refund in amount of \$14.23, paid in earned income tax, be refunded to Clara B. Brennan, a resident of the City of Pittsburgh.

Carried andso ordered.

Street Work..... Councilman Nash asked about the meeting of Members of the Public Works Committee in RE: Street Improvement Work.

Mr. Duncan reported it is the Committee's intention to have an engineer inspect the work and they are in the process of selecting an inspector and the work will be witheld until they know who that person is.

Motion by Mr. Richey seconded by Mr. Guckert, that at this Special Heeting of the Town Council of The Borough of West View, the PublicWorks Committee was to have reported and recommended an engineer to handle the inspection on the street work; the Committee reported it had not yet been able to locate an engineer, Mr. Richardson of Hoff Engineering not being available, and that they are going to continue their efforts, the Committee is authorized and empowered to select that person, notice of the selection to be given to Lampl paving Company, the successful bidder. Motion carried and so ordered.

The Secretary is directed to notify Lampl Paving Company to advise the Borough of West View at least seventy two hours before they propose to start the work, so that arrangements can be made to have the Engineer prepared to make inspections.

Councilman Freese Entered the Meeting at 9:07 P M., and was briefed on the provisions of Ordinance No. 1004.

Motion by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Freese, that Council suspend the Regular Order of Business to take up Ordinance No. 1004 for third reading and final passage.

Roll Call - Ayes: Messrs Armstrong, Duncan, Freese, Guckert, Nash, Richey and Hurley. Nays: None.

Carried and so ordered.

Motion by Mr. Freese, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that Ordinance No. 1004 be taken up for third reading and final passage.

Under question - Councilman Nash asked if there is going to be any paving out of the 40ft, to which Mr. Brandt replied "No, you cannot do that. Mr. Nash wants to see the stakes and Mr. Brandt advised that the enactment of this ordinance is not going to change the sidelines of that street. Those lines were fixed forty years ago and we cannot change them. All we are doing is extablishing a grade to the travelled grade and what is important is where that 18' is going to be. When you advertise for bids you will determine where the 18ft. of travelled road is to be within the forty foot limit. That is the important thing.

Councilman Nash asked if Mr. Brandt feels this is the proper grade and Mr. Brandt replied that the Engineer has recommended it and Council is perfectly proper in accepting his recommendation and Council is proper in doing that.

Councilman Nash remarks that if that is the Solicitor's recommendation, he is satisfied.

Roll Call - Ayes: Messrs Armstrong, Duncan, Freese, Guckert, Nash, Richey and Hurley. Nays: None

Carried and so ordered.

Motion by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Freese, that Ordinance No. 1004 be passed for third reading and final passage.

Roll Call - Ayes: Messr Armstrong, Duncan, Freese, Guckert, Nash, Richey and Hurley. Nays: Mone.

Carried and so ordered.

Motion by Mr. Richey and seconded by Mr. Armstrong, that Council return to the Regular Order of Business.

Roll Call - Ayes: Messrs Armstrong, Duncan, Freese, Guckert, Nash, Richey and Hurley. Nays: None. Carried and so ordered.

Motion by Mr. Freese, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that Ordinance No. 1004 be advertised one time in the Official Paper, the Allegheny Journal.

Carried and so ordered.

Mr. Nash wants it recorded that he is not in favor of passing Ordinances for third reading at the same meeting as first and second readings, but due to the emergency, he voted in favor of Ordinance No. 1004.

Gulf Refining Mr. Brandt reported on the Building Permit issued to the Gulf Refining Company as follows:

> The late Ralph Smith, Judge, ruled that our former Zoning Ordinance was void because it failed to make specific references in the bodyof the Ordinance that the zoning map was a part of the ordinance. That was long before the time Mr. Brandt was Borough Solicitor. On his findings, he directed that a building permit be granted to Vickerman so he could erect a gas station there.

A new zoning ordinance was enzcted which makes specific reference to the zoning map and clarifies the defect.

As told to me, Mr. Kelly lives on the lot immediately to the east of the third lot at that point. As I understand, these lots face on Highland Avenue rather than on Perrysville Avenue.

I understand further that Mr. Kelly and Mr. Freese viewed the premises and concluded the proposed location of this new building would be at a point to the south of the present building, that it would occupy an entirely new location. They were under the impression that the new building would be on lot no. 523 and Mr. Kelly is objecting to it for the reason that it would be using a part of a lot for a non-conforming use, which is not now presently being used as a gasoline service station. We understand further, not knowing the facts but only from heresay, that the location of this new building was made at the suggestion of the former Borough Manager. There are a number of legal questions involved to which Mr. Brandt does not have the answer. Mr. Brandt and Mrs. Guckert discussed the matter with Mr. Morecroft, attorney for the owner. Mr. Brandt recommended to Mrs. Guckert that, until this matter is resolved, a letter be written to Gulf Oil Company and Mr. Vickerman suspending the building permit until all of the questions with respect to the location of the building are resolved. The granting of a Building Permit does not grant a property right. Therefore, it is possible to revoke the permit for cause. Those are Mr. Brandt's observations. Mr. Morecroft called Mr. Brandt and conveyed the following information to Mr. Brandt, who had no knowledge of it and it dame to him as a surprise; that

Mr. Vickerman was in his, (Mr. Morecroft's) Office at the time of the call, and that Mr. Vickerman had a duplicate of an order, # 25 September Session Court of Quarter Sessions, 1939 term, in which the Court rezoned all of lots 25 and 26 and one Half of 24 for commercial use. The general rule of law is that if a person builds a building and then after that an ordinance is enacted which makes that building for the purpose of this explanation, in a zone that it was built, and the zoning ordinance zones it residential, that building is a "Nonconforming" use and the owner of that building can make reasonable extentions and additions to it even though it is zoned "Residential". The question to which Mr. Brandt does not have the answer is if you have a situation like this one, a non-conforming use, does that permit the owner to demolish the old building and erect a new building

within the area now in use.

Motion by Mr. Nash, seconded by Mr. Freese, on recommendation of Mr. Brandt that the Building Permit be revoked until the problems are resolved. Carried and so ordered.

Westfield Ave...Motion by Mr. Freese, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that Council advertise for bids for the improvement of Westfield Avenue, in accordance with specification which have been approved by the State Highway Department, bids to be opened at the Regular Meeting, August, 13, 1957. Carried and so ordered.

Officers'..... Motion by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Freese, that the reports of the Burgess, Treasurer, Chief of Police and Secretary be received and filed.

Carried and so ordered.

The Solicitor deferred his report until later in the Meeting.

Committee..... Motion by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Nash, that the amount of \$3500
Reports be transferred from the General Fund to the Sinking Fund for September
Finance lst bond and interest obligations.

Carried and so ordered.

Public Works... Mr. Freese, Chairman of Public Works, reports his Committee would like permission of Council to continue the base on Park Avenue from approximately 150 feet south of Center Avenue to Martsolf Avenue. Mr. Brandt advised that surely the Lampl Bros. in making their bid, examined the streets before they started the work. There probably will be an extra charge, but in no event, can their price exceed that of the next highest bidder by making this extension.

Mr. Freese reports that his Committee would like permission to have the section of Park Avenue from Orlando Avenue to Fairview Avenue surfaced at an approximate cost of \$750.00. This section is not included in the specifications under contract with Lampl Company. Mr. Brandt suggested that because Council saw fit to delegate to the Public Works Committee the authority to proceed to have the street work done, and since the power to act has been vested in the Public Works Committee, that the thing to do is to ratify the action of the Public Works Committee to have the surfacing from Orlando Avenue to Fairview Avenue, on Park Avenue, with ID-2, compacted

to a 2" surface, in accordance with specifications and subject to the approval of the Supervisor and the Committee, at an approximate cost of \$750.00. Councilman Nash remarked that whenever Council spoke about the surfacing of Park Avenue, and we did not have any Borough Manager, we delegated to the Public Works, to appoint or secure the services of an engineer, which they did (Mr. Wade Winner), and he was to give them a recommendation as to what was to be done, and asks if he is in favor of this work. The answer is "yes". Motion by Mr. Freese, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that the action of the Public Works Committee in authorizing the surfacting of Park Avenue from Orlando Avenue to Fairview Avenue with 2" ID-2 be ratified, at an approximate cost of \$750.00.

Carried and so ordered.

The Chairman of Public Works, Mr. Freese, informed Council that because of the resignation of C. F. Deem as Borough Manager, and in accordance with the authority delegated to the Public Works Committee, they have secured the services of Wade Winner to discharge the functions as set forth in the specifications for the improvement of Borough Streets, who will be charged with the duty of making the inspections and supervising as was required of the Borough Manager in the specifications. While Mr. Winner has expressed the willingness to serve gratuitously, Council reserves the right to fix a fee for the discharging of this work. Motion by Mr. Richey. seconded by Mr. Freese, that the action of the Public Works Committee in appointing Wade Winner to inspect the street work be ratified. Carried and so ordered.

Motion by Mr. Guckert, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that Council ratify the action of the Public Works Committee in authorizing Lampl Bros. Asphalt Paving Company to prepare the base on Park Avenue from approximately 150 feet south of Center Avenue to Martsolf Avenue. Motion carried and so ordered.

Solicitor, Mr. Brandt, wants the records to show that the motion to install a new base on Park Avenue from approximately 150 feet south of Center Avenue to Martsolf Avenue, of #4 Limestone compacted to a depth of 8 inches, with a limestone choke, with vibrator treatment, with a finish coat compacted to a depth of 2 inches of ID-2, on the travelled surface, upon the condition that the total amount of the Lampl Asphalt Paving Company cost for all the work under the contract shall in no event exceed the sum of \$17,578.46, exclusive of any extra work Council might direct to be done.

Lumber, etc Chairman of Public Works advised Council there is need for quite a quantity of lumber for building of barricades, steps, etc., hot patch for sidewalks, etc., and he requests permission from Council to order these materials.

He would like us to set some evening and give him a week's notice any evening will do except Monday or Friday - Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday evening will suit.

Mr. Richey thinks that so much money is involved, we should give it the time even though it takes three meetings.

Fire & Water

Chairman, Mr. Armstrong, advises the Firemen are leaving for the Convention (at Albion, Pennsylvania).

Mr. Armstrong also advises that all of the Fire Trucks are now in service.

Mr. Armstrong also asked the Chairman of Finance, Mr. Duncan, if Council is in position to pay the first payment on the new Fire Truck for No. 2 Company.

Motion by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Armstrong, that the first installment, in amount of \$11,000.00, be paid to the Seagrave Corp, \$4,000.00 of which is to be received from No. 2 Fire Company. Carried and so ordered.

The Certification of the Underwriters is to become a part of the records.

Property &..Chairman, Mr. Guckert, reports that to meet requirements of the State, Purchase it will be necessary to enclose each of the toilets in booths in the Building at the Recreation Field.

Motion by Mr. Freese, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that the booths be installed, together with the necessary screens, at a total cost of \$325.00, to meet State Requirements.

Carried and so ordered.

Mr. Guckert also reports that because of lack of room, it is necessary that one toilet be removed from the girls' room, and was advised to have it done.

Councilman Nash voted "no" on the above motion for the reason he was not in favor of the way the building was set up and he cannot be in accord with the corrections.

Public Relations.Mr. Nash, Chairman of Public Relations, called attention to a letter which had been received by Council requesting cooperation in securing a hospital in this area. Council has already sent in their request for this service.

Councilman Nash also reports that on July 23, his Committee had a meeting with a Committee from Ross Township, i.e., Messrs Kroll, Campbell and Herky, in RE: the fireworks at West View Park. They have received numerous complaints from the citizens of Ross Township relative to these fireworks. Mr. Nash's Committee informed the Commissioners that West View had received complaints. They were very much amazed when they were told the fireworks are being fired in Ross Township.

It was resolved at this Meeting, that the representatives would ask the Park Representatives to meet the Ross Township and West View sometime in the month of September to determine how many nights they were going to use the fireworks and we, (the Committee) will have to have the approval of the entire Council. He advises it is necessary to meet in September to look ahead to next year and he understands the Park places the order for fireworks in advance.

Mr. Nash says the question is now, "Does this Council want to meet with these people."

President of Council, Mr. Hurley, feels the fireworks displays should be kept to as few evenings as possible.

Councilman Richey feels we are in better position to meet with the Park Company since we now have the backing of Ross Township. Heretofore, they could tell us the fireworks were being put off in Ross Township.

Councilmen Hurley and Duncan again remarked they are not in favor of having the fireworks too often.

Councilman Nash remarked that a few years ago he wanted to meet with the Park but Council did not go along, but now Ross Township brings it up, and we are ready to go along.

President of Council, Mr. Hurley, advised the fireworks used to be set off in West View, but now, they are being fired from Ross Township. Councilman Duncan suggests the Chairman of Public Relations, Mr. Nash, set a night for the meeting.

Councilman Hurley advises Mr. Nash he thinks all Members of Council will go along with the recommendation of the Public Relations Committee, and also on whatever date they set for the meeting.

The date for the Meeting is tentatively set for the evening of September 17, the Secretary shall be instructed to so advise all Members of Council and the entire body of the Commissioners of Ross Township. However, Councilman Armstrong believes it should include only the Members of the Public Relations Committee of Ross Township, the President of the Board and the Township Manager.

Audience.......Mr. Zink inquired as to whether or not Mr. Winner is an engineer and if he is qualified to make the inspections on the street work.

The answer is "Yes".

Widening Intersection at Chalfonte Ave.

Mr. Brandt, Solicitor, advised that the matter of widening the intersection at Chalfonte Avenue and Perrysville Avenue and also Chalfonte Avenue and Bellevue Avenue, was referred to the Solicitor for the School District and the Solicitor for the Borough.

Council authorized the Public Works Committee, with power to act, to widen the intersection with the understanding that it is necessary to have the permission of the State to widen the intersection and to move the traffic light, and the Bell Telephone Company to move the manhole they own, the Borough to move the manhole for storm water, and upon the further condition that the cost be divided equally between the School District and the Borough.

The School District was to inform Council before this Meeting, of its intention with regarding to financing the project, and in view of the fact that we have no report from the School Board, the matter is tabled until Council hears from the School Board.

Carried and so ordered.

Committee Rpts......Chairman, Mr. Duncan, absent due to illness. Finance

Public Works.........Mr. Freese called attention that the bill for repairing the Ford
Dump Truck amounts to \$446.61

Motion by Mr. Armstrong, seconded by Mr. Guckert, that the bill be paid.

Carried and so ordered.

Mr. Freese advises Mr. Zinkell, Wellington Drive and Highland Avenue, will change the grade of their terrace to provide better vision for motorists. Mr. Freese will call on Mr. Zinkell to determine what is necessary.

Mr. Freese reports all cross walks for pedestrians are lined throughout the Borough.

Mr. Freese advises that on some of the streets, the Lampl Company is not doing a good job and that there are nine or ten men, who are residents of Lakewood Avenue, in the audience to complain about the street.

The stone on Lakewood was to be 'imbedded' but that has not been done. The complaints from the group from Lakewood Avenue were because of dust and stones being thrown from the street over the sidewalks. Mr. Freese advises that on Chalfonte Avenue, the specifications call for $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches ID-2 but it is less than $\frac{1}{2}$ inches

Council digressed from the Regular Order of Business to hear from the representatives from Lakewood Avenue.

Mr. Freese advised that the Borough Public Works Dept. would sweep the street tomorrow, Wednesday morning.

Mr. Joseph R. Love, 111 Lakewood Avenue, was the spokesman. (During the discussion by Councilmen, it is recommended that Lampl not be paid for these streets that are not satisfactory until they are put in proper condition, in accordance with specifications.)

Mr. Freese asked about the Release from Mr. Malone for the corner of property at Perrysville Avenue and Center Avenue, to be used for widening the approach to Center Avenue.

The Secretary is directed to check into the Release from the East Park Building & Loan Ass'n. for the deed to the corner property at Brightwood Avenue and State Alley, owned by Louis & Clara Zoller. NOTE - The Release is received and both Deed and Release are in the hands of the Solicitor to be recorded.

Mr. Freese is going to check with the State Highway Department about the fill they are placing at North Park Road and Perrysville Avenue.

Police & Public Chairman, Mr. Richey, reports it will be necessary to appoint two Safety Guards for the dances at West View Park this year, one for the regular dances and one for the 'teen agers' dances, and recommends Harold Watkins and Roy Keller. Motion by Mr. Guckert, seconded by Mr. Nash, that Harold Watkins and Roy Keller be appointed as Guards for a period of five months and 28 days. Carried and so ordered.

> RE: Police Pension Fund. Councilman Richey advises his Committee met, but due to the fact he could not contact Councilman Guckert until the last minute, Mr. Guckert was unable to attend. Mr. Richey and Mr. Duncan talked with two different representatives about the pension plan, trying to get some idea of what we are going to do, but we do: not know much more than we did before. Mr. Richey has an idea that it will cost approximately a certain figure, but no one could come to agreement as to whether we can get the police under Social Security. Mr. Richey was led to believe by the two men, who both thought we could get the police under Social Security, which would save the Borough about fifty percent of cost. Later, Mr. Mockenhaupt called and he is quite sure we cannot get the police under Social Security.

Mr. Richey gave a brief report of some of the high points of the discussion, such as the rate of each individual on the force, the time he has worked with the Borough, the time he will work, the amount to be paid will be 50% of his last five years' average, that according to statistics, he will live fourteen years after he retires and will be drawing that amount of pension.

Chairman Hurley suggests the Committee secure information from insurance men and Acturarians and, if necessary, pay a fee to find out which of the plans is the better for our men, but he is inclined to believe we will end up with an annuity plan.

Motion by Mr. Armstrong, seconded by Mr. Nash that, as time is short and we must come to some conclusion in the matter, that it be referred back to the Police Committee to secure the information, including the power if they so desire to hire an acturarian, and bring back the information to Council for report.

Carried and so ordered.

Motion by Mr. Nash, seconded by Mr. Guckert, that in accordance with the request of Chief Farley, a CO-2 Fire Extinguisher be purchased for the Police Car.

Carried and so ordered.

Chairman, Mr. Armstrong, said that last May, the Water Authority was requested to make an inspection of the fire hydrants. To date, that has not been done.

(NOTE- a letter was sent to the Water Authority, 9/11/57, and an answer was received advising that the hydrants are to be inspected very soon. In the meantime, if any are found to be not functioning, the Fire Chief is to report it and it will be taken care of at once.

Property & Purchase...Mr. Guckert, Chairman - no report.

Public Relations Mr. Nash, Chairman, wants to know if Council is going to have a meeting with the Officials of West View Park, Council as a whole to be at the meeting. Mr. Nash wanted to bring this to the attention of Council and asked if Council thinks we ought to wait until we hear from Mr. Kroll as to what Ross Township wants to do. Councilman Richey remarked that he has lived on North Park Road all his life and has been bothered, but he is still of the opinion the Park is in business and he does not think we ought to go about making regulations that will tie their hands. From the time Mr. Richey has been in Council, he has called on the Park with the Burgess and each time they have shown a willingness to go along with the Borough. He feels if we make it known we had good cooperation in the cutting down of the fireworks, no one will be hurt and the people who are complaining will be satisfied. Councilman Hurley remarked that with the revenue we are getting from the Park, he does not believe we want to tie their hands. Councilman Nash remarked we certainly do not want to impose any undue hardship on the Park but we also feel the residents should have some consideration.

Mr. Nash understands the Park orders the fireworks this fall for next year.

Mr. Nash does not have in mind abolishing the fireworks but to ask the Park to cut down the number of nights. Mr. Richey suggests that if Mr. Gahring would arrange to go down to the Park, Mr. Nash and Mr. Richey to go along, perhaps that would be the thing to do.

After some discussion, it was planned to do that.

THOMAS B. DEVLIN. Mr. Wm. C. Smith. Attorney for Thomas B. Devlin. said he had a petition to present to Council which had signatures of five hundred property owners of The Borough of West View asking that the zoning of Mr. Devlin's property be changed so that it can be used for a funeral home. He said they request a hearing date to be set. Councilman Hurley asked if there were not a petition presented heretofore and the answer is no, it was assumed several years ago that Mr. Devlin was going to have a petition to have the property rezoned, and at that time the people from Wellington Heights came up but no petition was presented.

Councilman Armstrong remarked that it is his understanding that the people within a certain area, say within five hundred or a thousand feet, are the people affected and not people in other sections of

the Borough.

Mr. Brandt said that in the event 60 percent of the people living within the fixed number of feet of the proposed site object, then it requires a two thirds majority vote of Council to rezone it. The last time we had that situation was when Council was petitioned for the rezoning of the Ruk property. More than 50 percent of the people within two hundred feet objected. Mr. Brandt then ruled it would take two thirds of a majority of the vote of Council to rezone the Ruk property.

Mr. Duncan asked about the sale of lots at Sheriff Sale and Mr. Brandt said he was advised that this last sale, 15 lots, had been successful. Mr. Brandt will get a list of the lots sold, together with prices.

Shelter for Equip....Mr. Duncan asked about the erection of shelter to house the Borough Equipment. The matter was discussed and a plan, which is on file in the Borough Office, will be examined.

Motion by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Guckert, that the amount of \$3,916.25 be transferred from Item 1553 to Item 1555, in the Budget of the Gasoline Funds allocated to the Borough of West View for the year 1957.

Carried and so ordered.

Devlin-Eckert. .. . Mr. Brandt is recommending that Mr. Wm. Eckert, Attorney who represented the Borough of West View at the hearing in RE: the Devlin Funeral Home, be paid. He is of the opinion he may be able to settle the bill in amount of \$1500.00. Mr. Brandt feels the expense could have been avoided if Mr. Devlin had come up to Council and made application in the first instance. As Council knows, Judge O'Connor filed in favor of remitting the fire, but he felt that Mr. Devlin had acted on the advice of others and produced the hardship for himself. The Burgess, under the ordinance, felt he had no other choice but to impose the fine. In RE: Mr. Eckert's Bill, Mr. Brandt continued "Often times, people do not realize the tremendous expense of office maintenance. When you consider the matter of a fee for a lawyer, you have to consider what it costs to maintain an office. Mr. Eckert has a well established office, gave us the finest type of advice and represented us most adequately, and I think the time has lapsed

well established office; gave us the finest type of advice and represented us most adequately, and I think the time has lapsed and we should pay. If you men want me, I will explain it has exceeded the amount Council anticipated and we would appreciate very much if he would accept \$1500.00".

Councilman Freese recalled that the resolution appointing Mr.

Councilman Freese recalled that the resolution appointing Mr. Eckert to represent the Borough called that we would pay the bill. Councilman Armstrong recalled "It is Taxpayers' money we are spending".

Councilman Guckert asked Mr. Brandt that supposing he, Mr. Brandt, had represented the Borough, would he have considered \$1500.00 proper and Mr. Brandt thought he would.

Councilman Duncan had thought that \$2,000.00 was excessive but if Mr. Eckert is in favor of accepting \$1500.00, he would say to pay it and get rid of the obligation.

Councilman Richey said that if Mr. Brandt can graciously have it reduced to \$1500.00 without pleading poverty, and he believes Mr. Brandt will know how Mr. Eckert will feel about it, that will be well, but if the price is \$2,000.00, he believes we should pay the bill.

Councilman Duncan based his opinion on the fact that a young fellow did the work and being young, with less experience, in order to be sure of the details, may have taken an extra amount of time.

Councilman Nash explained the younger man would have to collect the facts for the Attorney to present at the hearing. Burgess Gahring feels the young man did a splendid and thorough job. Motion by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Armstrong, that the bill be paid and the Solicitor be given authority to negotiate with Mr. Eckert.

Carried and so ordered.

Devlin...

Mr. Brandt recalled that Devlin brought into Council a petition to amend the Zoning Ordinance. Two of the lawyers in Mr. Brandt's office, who are Solicitors for municipalities, feel there is nothing obligatory on the part of Council to set a date for a hearing on the request. Our Zoning Ordinance does not provide on how it is to be amended other than it is to be amended as any other ordinance would be amended.

Perhaps some Members of Council have talked with someone about it, Lawyer Smith said he is going to bring a mandamus to compel you men to set a date for a hearing to rezone this property. It may be you would be subject to lesser criticism if you did have a

date for a hearing.

The point you must remember is you are not permitted to do "Spot Zoning". You cannot take the land in the middle of a block or a corner of a block to use for industry, etc. The situation is different when you run into a situation like you did at Highland Avenue. Some of you men remember that an application was made to the Building Inspector for a Gasoline Station, and it was referred to the Board of Adjustment. The Board issued the permit. Mr. McDonald took an appeal. (Mr. McDonald lived in the house next to the site being discussed.) The Judge ruled the Board of Adjustment had no power to rezone, that power is with Members of Council. It would be Mr. Brandt's thought that if Council did rezone this Devlin property to Commercial, that the taxpayers or residents of the Borough would take an appeal to court and the Court would rule it is "Spot Zoning." The only thing is that it is a corner lot and that would be the only reason. You do not have to have a hearing, but Mr. Brandt is wondering if it would not be wise for Council to have a hearing and let the people decide. In the past, Council has always fixed a date for hearing. You remember we had one on the Ruk property. Council did not have a hearing on the Kilian property as it would spot zone the property, and as it is near the approach to the new school, it would open up to other stores, etc., that would not be desireable. We have had cases both ways, first when you had no hearing and second on the Ruk case.

Mr. Brandt said he would conclude by saying that legally Council does not have to have a hearing date. Mr. Smith says that under the constitution of Pennsylvania, on a petition you have to have a hearing. You will recall that we felt those petitions were not under affidavit. It is a matter Council is going to have to decide on what you are going to do. Some of you Members of Council feel that Council has been put to so much expense and that had it been handled correctly, it would not have put Council to that expense. If Council does not have a hearing, they would have the right to appeal.

When you fix a date for a hearing, and assuming you have a hearing, you can rezone it or you can refuse to rezone it. If you refuse, they would have the right to appeal but it is my opinion the Courts will never substitute their decision against Council's decision unless there is a clear abuse of Council's rights.

Councilman Armstrong recalled there was no motion on the petition.

Benj. B. Moore...Councilman Nash asks that this Meeting adjourn in memory of Benj. B. Moore and that a resolution be sent to his family. Motion by Mr. Guckert, seconded by Mr. Nash that Council adjourn in accordance with Mr. Nash's request.

A Special Meeting of The Town Council of The Borough of West View is called by President of Council, to be held Thursday Evening, December 12, 1957, at eight o'clock, in the Council Chamber at the Municipal Building.

The purpose of the Special Meeting is to discuss and take action on the Police Pension Fund.

Mr. Hurley announced that from time to time, he sat in meetings with reference to the Police Pension Fund, and that Mr. Richey and Mr. Duncan have spent quite a lot of time on it, and called upon Mr. Richey and Mr. Duncan to bring Council up to date.

Mr. Richey said there have been quite a few meetings, he has attended Allegheny County Borough Association's Meetings where the Pension plan was the topic of the Meeting, has heard, the Township Manager at Mt. Lebanon, who is an authority on insurance.

At these meetings, it was outlined what the law requires of the municipalities, and as Mr. Richey understands it, under Act 600, the municipalities set up a pension fund that will retire the Police Officers, when eligible, at one half of the last sixty months' average rate when the Officer has attained twenty years' service and sixty years' of age. At this time, the Borough of West View has two Officers eligible to retire as of the first of the year, Chief Kaesmeier and Officer Jones. The rest of the Police have a varying number of years anywhere from nine years to twenty five years before they reach the age of sixty and some of whom would have more than twenty years' of service. Mr. Richey says they have proposals from about eight different insurance people and actuarians. His Committee met, (Mr. Guckert could not make it but Mr. Armstrong and the Burgess were present), with Mr. Aupteker and Mr. Muetzel on behalf

of Mr. Mockenhaupt. They then attended a meeting at Webster Hall, after which they had a meeting with the Police Committee, President of Council, Solicitor, Mr. Armstrong and the Burgess. Mr. Mockenhaupt was at that meeting and outlined the plan and most of the Members of Council have seen this plan. There were proposals from:

Mr. Bragdon Green & Company, Wm. Penn Hotel Penn Mutual, Mr. Merrimann Representative Pacific Mutual, Mr. Shannon Representative

NOTE - Their figures would be binding

Mr. Schoemaker, Butler

Mr. Schoemaker now has the insurance policies under the present plan. His representative had contacted Mr. Richey two or three times and advised he would have a figure, but he never put anything in writing until just last week.

Also proposal from

Hosick, Sprecht, Muetzel & Wood. Under comments on the proposals, the proposal from Green & Co. is rejected on advice of the Solicitor.

Penn Mutual has a pretty fair plan and Pacific Mutual has a little

better plan.

Mr. Mockenhaupt has worked out two plans, one self administered and the other a combination of self administered and insured plan. This plan calls for a \$10,000 insurance policy, to be purchased when a man retires, and it carries a five year 'certain' payment plan, which is a compromise between the ten year 'certain' plan some companies offer and what the Act requires. The Act provides that if a man dies prior to five years after he retires, only the difference between what he has paid into the fund and what he has drawn is paid to his beneficiary, i.e., if a man paid in \$2,000 and had drawn \$200, his beneficiary would receive \$1800.

Mr. Duncan advised Mr. Mockenhaupt is not interested with what company the insurance is placed, he is simply setting up a plan for a fee. He has set up plans for Mt. Lebanon and Ross Township, among other municipalities in the County.

Mr. Schoemaker has taken into consideration only the five younger men and set it up so they would retire at the age specified by law, and their pension paid under insurance, the total cost of \$9200. The Borough would pick up an additional cost of approximately \$4800 per year to pay for Officers Jones and Kaesmeier when they go on pension. In other words, when these two men go on pension, the cost per year would go up to \$14,000.00.

The Police now have a policy in amount of \$1,000 under which, when they retire, they would receive payments of ten dollars per month for life. The age of retirement is 65 years. If they should die before the \$1,000 runs out, the balance between what they received and the \$1,000 would be paid to their beneficiary.

The Penn Mutual would handle the whole thing so far as setting it up and handling the money. All the Borough would do is pay the money to them and when the time comes for a man to retire, they pay the money back to the Borough and it is administered by the Borough.

Cost \$18,789.00. When Mr. Richey told Mr. Merriman that was a little high, he said it would be reduced by dividends to \$17,365.00 net less monies from the State and the Police Contributions would be a little over \$9,000.

This plan included insurance of 100 times monthly retirement rate

and 120 month 'certain' payment.

Mr. Richey's greatest objection to Mr. Merriman's plan is that the figures quoted were for the five younger officers to retire at sixty, but the figures did not include retiring the two older men at that age. The Borough would have to pay the two older men until they reach the age of seventy, at which time they would draw benefits under the plan.

The Pacific Mutual seems to have a very good plan. It is a plan that would pay \$10,000 insurance to the Officer if he died before retirement. For the two older men, it would only reach the \$10,000 after they had been in the plan for ten years. The Borough would have to make twenty annual payments of \$10,264, for twenty years, less about five thousand dollars made up of money received from the State and contributions of the police. This plan also includes 120 months 'certain' payment.

Mr. Farley asked if the Borough could operate their own fund and meet the conditions of the law. Mr. Richey pointed out the disadvantages of trying to do this and remarked that the Officials at Mt. Lebanon advised "You may as well forget the Self Administered Plan."

Mr. Richey also advised if the employes of the Public Works were to be covered, it would reduce the cost per man.

Mr. Mockenhaupt said he will act as the Actuarian. He would not carry the insurance but would recommend a modified administered plan. When a man retires, the Borough will buy a policy for him to pay him his pension. The Money is kept in the Borough Fund and can be invested in certain types of bonds and be earning money for the Borough.

This, generally, works out a little better for the Borough but it does not give the Police quite as much as the other policies for it is worked up on a 'five year certain' plan. The insurance policy of \$10,000 would pay fifty percent of their regular monthly salary, based on the rate for the last five years before retirement, with a five year 'certain' payment.

This plan would cost \$7,653 per year for the five younger men, and an additional \$4,500 per year for the two older men, which would be \$12,000, reduced to about \$7,000 at the end of ten years, and when you deduct the State contribution and the contribution from the Officers, it would not cost any more than we would now be paying on Social Security.

Mr. Duncan remarked that under this plan, the Borough controls it. Mr. Richey thinks this plan is the most practical and feasible for the Police and the Borough.

The five year 'certain' is a compromise between the ten year 'certain' some give and the State requirement, which is no 'certain'.

It is a flexible plan, you do not buy the insurance until a man retires and then you buy a policy to cover him the rest of his life. It is going to be more fair to the younger men.

Mr. Hurley suggests the Police go over the policy and come back next Thursday evening and give Council some idea of what they think of it. (A Special Meeting is to be set for either Wednesday or Thursday Evening, depending on which evening Mr. Mockenhaupt can be here. Notices will be sent out to Members of Council, the Burgess and the Police as soon as Mr. Richey receives the information.)

Chief Kaesmeier said he thinks the efforts Mr. Richey has put into it enables him to know about it and he, Mr. Kaesmeier, is very much satisfied with the plan of Mr. Mockenhaupt.

However, Mr. Richey wants Mr. Mockenhaupt to come to the Special Meeting and explain it to the Police.

Officers Clogan, Jones, Obermeier, Maguire and Farley agree to this. (Officer Freedman was not present.)

Motion by Mr. Freese, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that we accept the proposal of Mr. Mockenhaupt to set up the Pension Plan at a fee of \$750.00.
Carried and so ordered.

Motion by Mr. Richey, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that the Meeting adjourn.

Mr. Mockenhaupt read the agreement and answered questions regarding the plan he proposes to be set up.

Mr. Richey called attention this is the sixty month 'certain' payment, i.e., when a man retires, he is assured payment for life, or his beneficiary sixty months 'certain'. In other words, if a man only lives for two months after he retires, his beneficiary will be paid for fifty eight months.

Mr. Mockenhaupt answered questions that were asked of him in RE: the plan.

When the Members of the Board to govern the plan was discussed, Mr. Farley and Mr. Obermeier asked about having a Member of the Police Force on the Board.

Mr. Richey asked Mr. Mockenhaupt if any plan that Mr. Mockenhaupt has set up has the provision that a member of the Police Force must be on the Board and the answer was "No".

Mr. Mockenhaupt said before a Member of the Police Force is placed on the Board, Council should check with the Solicitor to clear as to whether it is the thing to do.

Mr. Mockenhaupt presented to Members of Council, an alternate plan which would include the two older officers.

(A copy of this letter is attached.)

Mr. Duncan advised the alternate plan, to his way of thinking, is something that is away over our head and not what we have been talking about.

Mr. Duncan asked Mr. Mockenhaupt what the Borough would be able to do by spending approximately \$5,000 the first of the year on the plan.

Mr. Mockenhaupt advised the Borough could pay the \$5,000 and then would owe the fund the difference of \$2,653, on which the Borough should pay the interest

should pay the interest.

When the alternate plan was discussed, it was agreed it would be more than the Borough could handle at this time. It was recalled the Police have the \$1,000 insurance policies, and they are to become a part of the Pension set-up.

Mr. Duncan asked if there were some kind of an annuity plan could be had for the two older men, but was advised an annuity would not take care of it.

Mr. Richey advised that when he discussed the plans with the different men who submitted bids, they all backed down when it came to insuring the two older officers or else they talked big money.

Mr. Hurley asked if the plan, as explained, meets the approval of Members of Council and was advised in the affirmative.

Mr. Mockenhaupt advised the following steps to be taken: lst. You pass the ordinance. You advertise it for two weeks and then the fund has to be dissolved.

2nd. The Erust agreement has to be filed with the Internal Revenue Department, and Mr. Mockenhaupt will take care of this.

Mr. Mockenhaupt assumes the effective date is January 1, and was advised yes.

He advises Exhibit "A" should have the date retroactive to Jan. 1 Thereafter, he advises the transfer of the funds, Mr. Brandt to guide Council in this matter.

Then, the Board is selected and you set up an account which you will call "The Borough of West View Police Pension Plan Account." If the Borough goes to the Peoples First National Bank & Trust Co., Mr. Judson Brooks is the new account man to see.

The Trustee, as well as Council, will sign the document and from then on, the three Board Members are in charge.

They will make to Council periodically a detailed report, a copy to be given to the Police.

Mr. Mockenhaupt believes this is an actuarily sound plan.

Motion by Mr. Armstrong, seconded by Mr. Guckert, that the plan as presented by Mr. Mockenhaupt be accepted. Carried and so ordered.

Gentlemen: .

We are writing this supplement to our report to you dated October 24, 1957 to provide alternate methods of funding the pension liability for the two employees eligible for immediate retirement as of January 1, 1958.

Further consideration of an alternate method of funding the liabilities of these two employees is necessary as a result of our understanding that neither of them actually plans to retire on January 1, 1958. Under our previous approach which assumed immediate retirement on that date, no life insurance coverage was provided for. However, in view of the assumption that they are not to retire, a special problem exists with regard to the absence of life insurance protection on an equal basis with the other active employees of the Police Department.

Therefore, we have based our revised approach to funding on a method which would provide equal treatment insofar as life insurance coverage is concerned—that is, providing \$500 of life insurance protection for each \$10 of monthly pension provided by the plan. In view of the immediate prospect of their actual retirement, however, it is not practical to accumulate supplemental funds needed to convert to an annuity basis, as the funds would have to be accumulated in too short a period, which would require substantial deposits at this time. Accordingly, we have employed a special retirement income at age 65 contract, which will amortize the cost of providing the pensions over a ten-year period.

The following is a brief summary of the funding costs under this approach.

The total annual cost of \$15,108.70 shown is subject to reduction by whatever contributions are realized from Officers Jones and Kaesmeier prior to their actual retirement.

With regard to the present balance in the existing Police Pension Fund, which amounts to \$35,118.96, we suggest that this balance be deposited at interest in the Fund and held as a reserve against the contingency of the retirement of either Officer Jones or Officer Kaesmeier prior to age 65. If neither of these two employees should retire prior to age 65, the above method of funding totally discharges the Borough's liability for their pensions. In this event, the total balance of the present Police Pension Fund, plus accumulated interest, could then be applied to reduce the supplemental fund required to convert to an annuity basis at retirement for the remaining employees. It is estimated that the annual payment to this fund could be reduced by \$1,660.33 if this fund were so applied.

On the other hand, if either Officer Jones or Officer Kaesmeier were to elect retirement prior to age 65, the accumulated values in the contracts as of the date of their retirement would be used to produce a reduced retirement income. This contingency is provided for in such contracts. The pensions thus provided would have to be supplemented in a sufficient amount to provide the total required pension, and we propose that in this event the required amount of additional pension be provided by the purchase of a single premium immediate annuity, the cost of which could be withdrawn from the deposited funds which constitute the balance of the present Police Pension Fund. In the interin, however, assuming a realized interest rate of 4%, the present balance of \$35,118.96 would produce a yield of \$1,404.76 subject to increase by compounded interest.

In consideration of all the factors involved, we believe that this is the most practical and economically sound method of funding the pensions for these two employees, as it takes into consideration the fact that although they are both eligible for immediate retirement, they may continue in active employment indefinitely, and this method would provide life insurance protection during the remaining years of their active service, and at the same time, undertake the present funding of the Borough's liability for their retirement benefit.

Before taking Ordinance No. 1009 up for final passage, Mr. Nash asked the Solicitor, Mr. Brandt, his opinion of the Ordinance. (Mr. Nash had been unable to attend either of the two previous special meetings to hear the plan discussed in detail).
