the halls between classes moving quickly and smoothly.

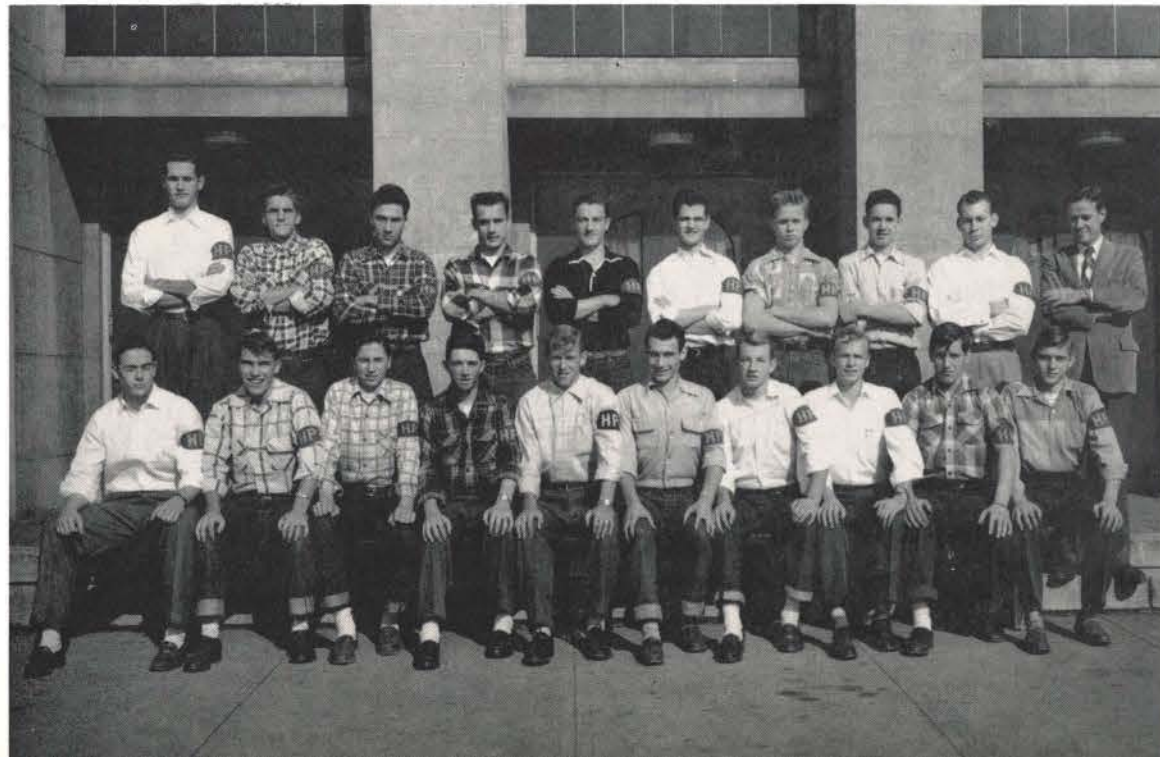

Mr. Craig, the capable sponsor of the Hall Patrol, has helped to make the rose and gold armbands the boys proudly wore the symbols of a job well done.

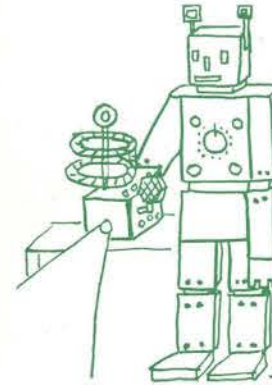

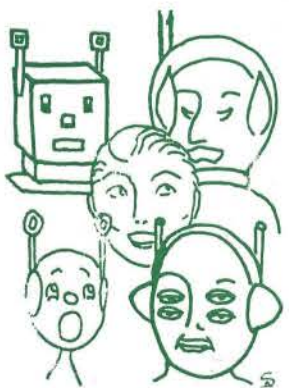

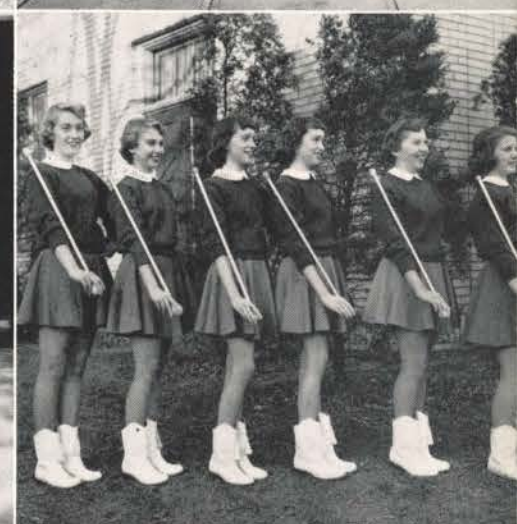
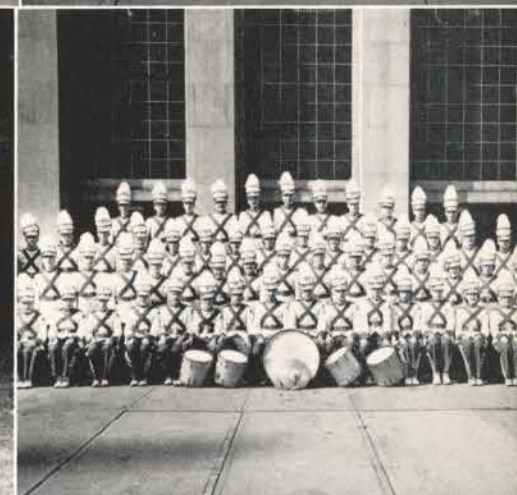
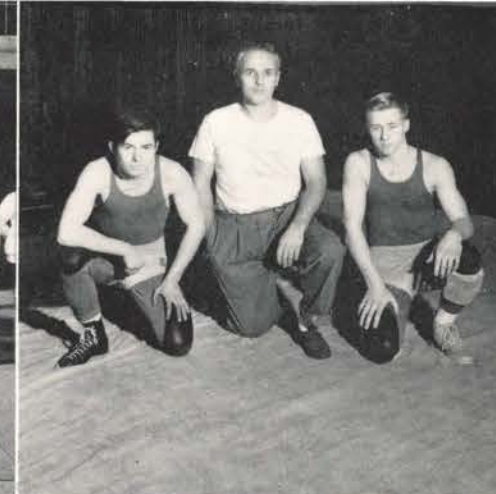
The Junior Class Play was the beginning of a series of public appearances. Deep Purple and Tchaikovsky's Fifth Symphony were highlights of the evening.

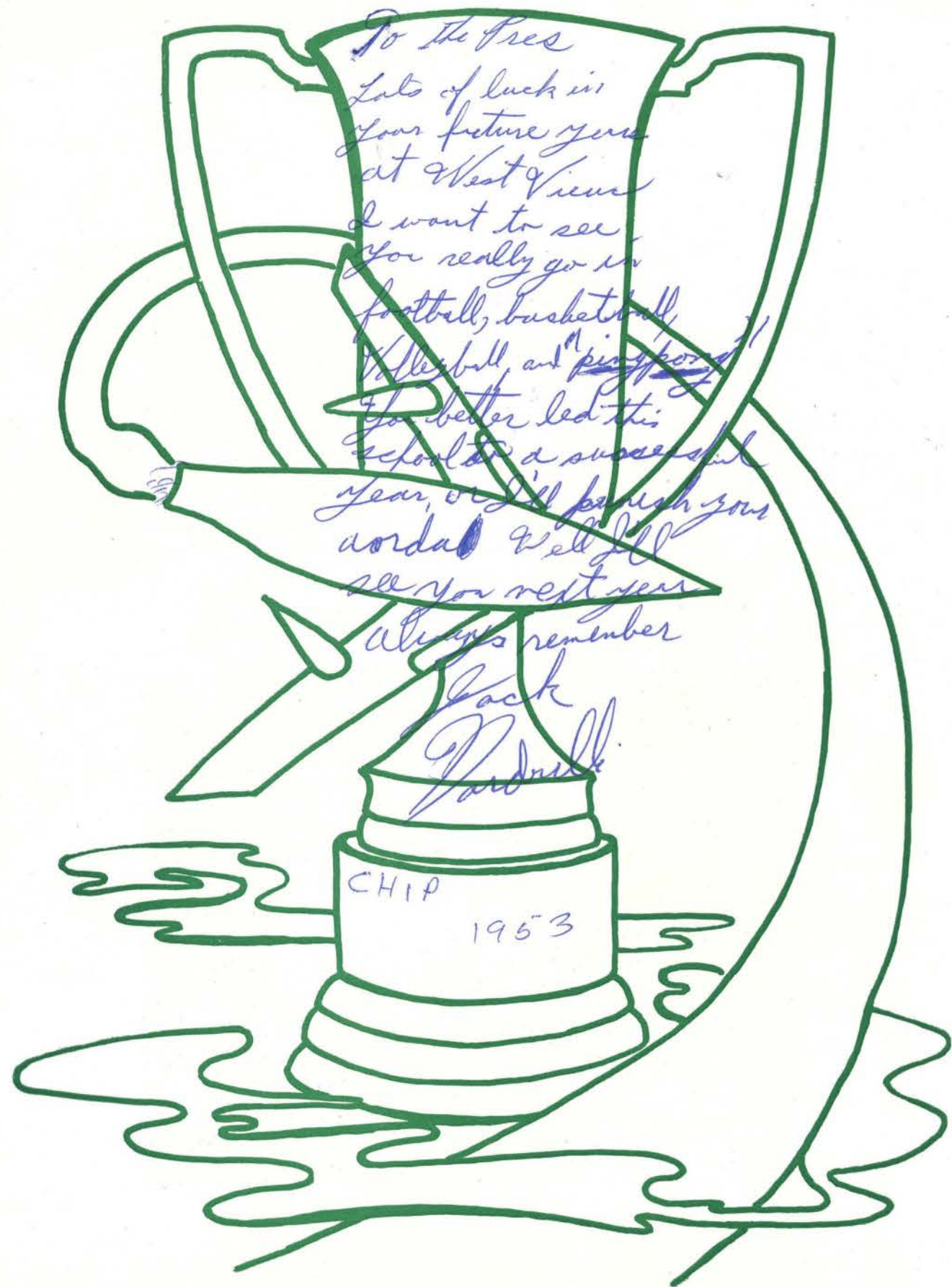

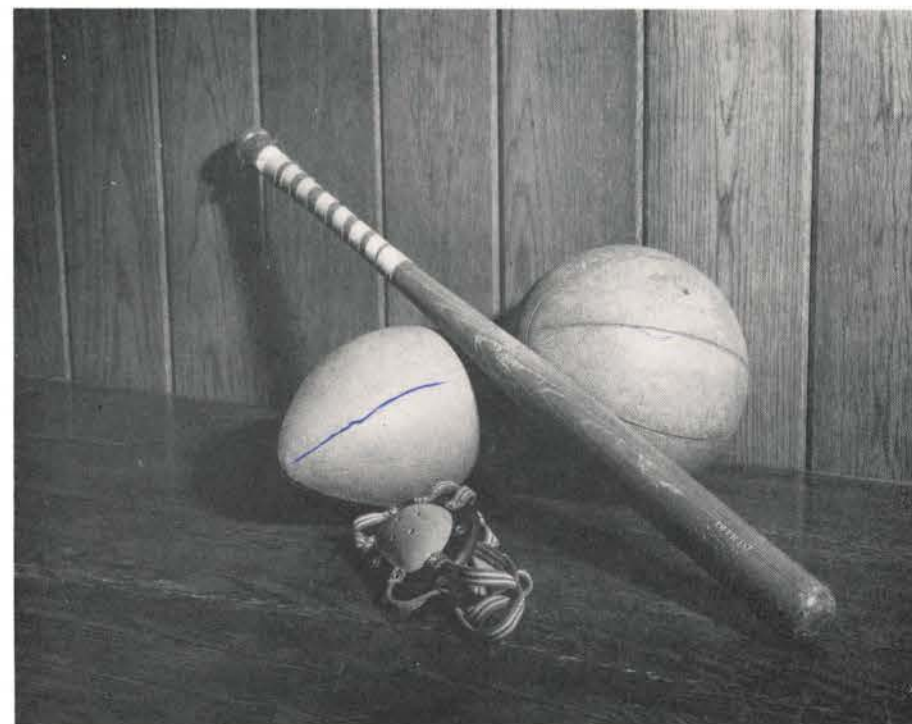

VARSITY FOOTBALL



As the 1952 football season opened, Coaches Mario Martorelli and Guy Guadagnino found a squad containing nine lettermen returning. Seniors Ed Naumann and Whitey Rebel were our co-captains.

Jerry Mattys, the only junior in the starting line-up, played the left end spot on both offense and defense. Senior

letterman, Chuck Beck, a sure-fingered pass receiver and a defensive stand-out, held down the right end position.

Tackles Karl Schiget and Reed Vickerman were the power on the West View line. The timely blocking of guards Don Smith and Bob Larson helped the West View ballcarriers to long gains. Wingback Ron Nelson sparkled on kickoff and punt returns, and also called the plays. Quarterback Ron Eaton, a dependable blocker and a fine pass receiver, doubled as a linebacker on defense. John Burnham rounded out the backfield, filling the fullback position and also serving as a regular on defense.

Fay Miller punted, kicked off, and booted our crucial extra points. "Toe" had a record of 15 conversions in 23 attempts.

Allan Kaiser was a standout defensive lineman. Harry Medsger, injured at camp, came through as a tackle on offense and defense as did Martin Mikulas, who also suffered an early season injury. Frank Cuda played a defensive guard spot and Milt Heim was a capable end replacement. Juniors Jack Nardulli and Ted Bowser will be returning as lettermen next year.

The Indians opened a winning season on September 12 by defeating Penn Township, a double A school, with a score of 20-7. In a second half comeback, Rebel, Nelson, and Eaton scored, and Miller added two extra points.

West View's drive for the class A championship began with a hard-fought 13-6 victory over Swissvale, a class A school, followed by a 34-6 victory over Oliver, West View's rival from the city league. The Indians winning streak carried over into the second home game, when Bellmar High School was outscored 20-12.

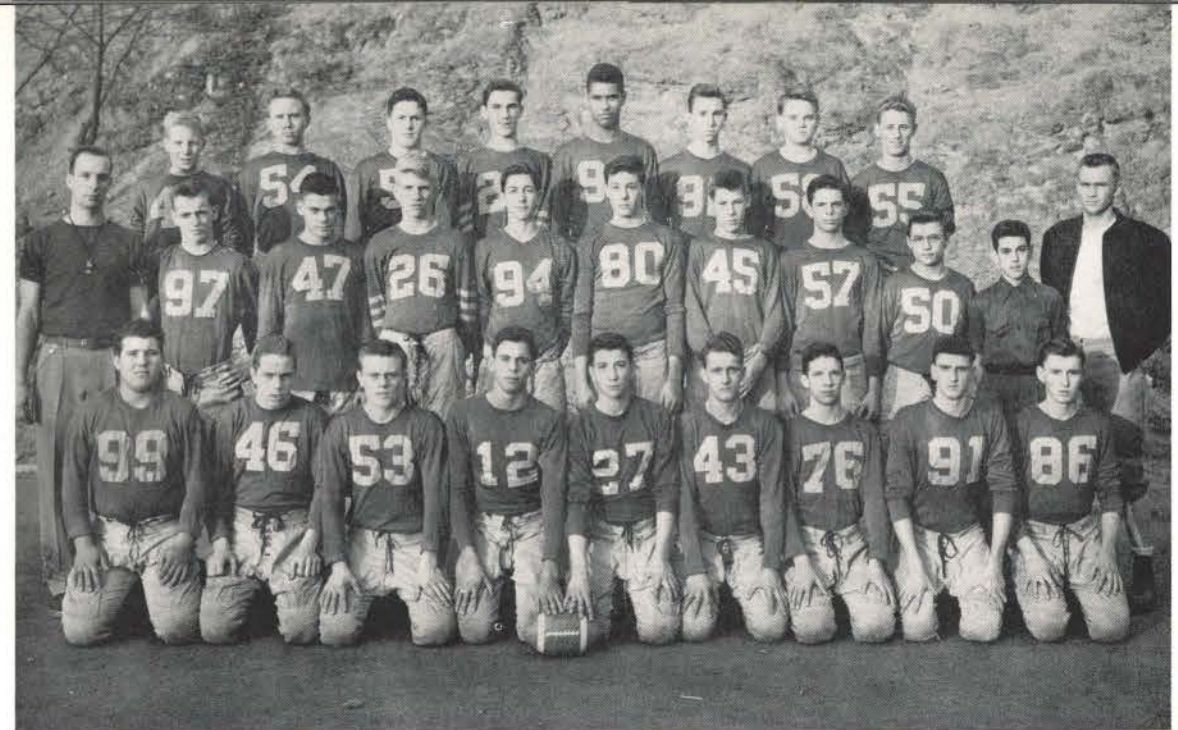
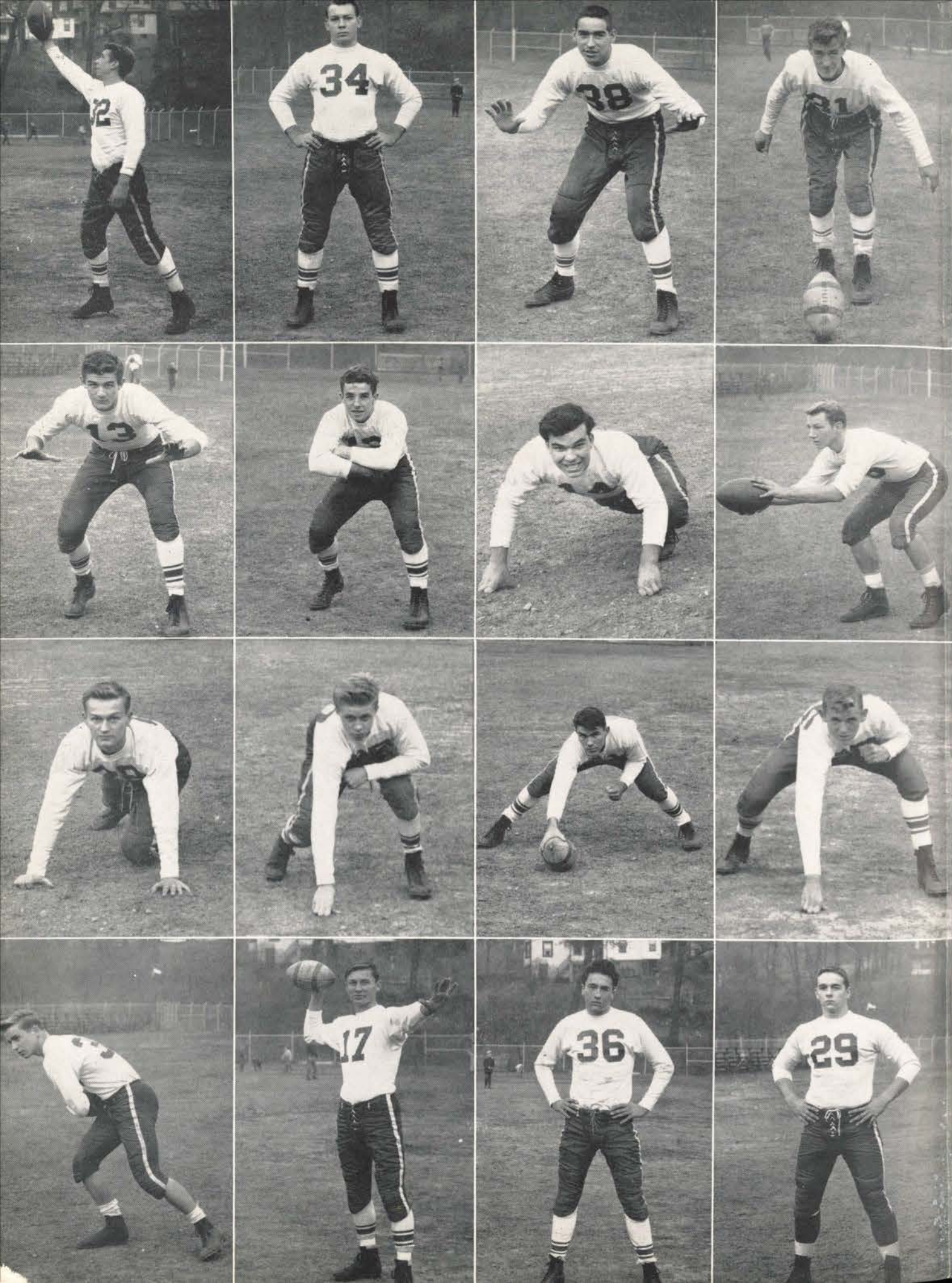
Arch-rival Bellevue was sent home with a 28-0 defeat on touchdowns by Rebel, Nelson, and two by Eaton. West View remained in contention for the class A crown by defeating McKees Rocks with two touchdowns.

The Indians traveled to Shaler for what proved to be the most thrilling game of the year. Tight defensive play stopped all scoring in the first half, but the fast play during the second half enabled the Indians to leave the field a 13-12 victor with their fourth class A victory and record-setting seventh consecutive triumph.

The following Friday, we were knocked from the class A title race when Bethel handed us a score of 7-7. A hard-fought game with Clark gave the Indians their only defeat of the season. The final score was 20-6, with the lone West View touchdown coming on a pass to Nelson in the end zone.

Congratulations are in order for the coaches, managers, and players of the 1952 West View High School football team which turned in the best record in the school history—seven wins, one loss, and one tie.

VARSITY BASKETBALL



Soon after the end of football season, the West View hoopsters took over. Coach Martorelli had three returning lettermen—Barry Brautigam, Ron Nelson, and Whitey Rebel—plus five seniors from last year's squad around which to build his team. Juniors up from the Junior Varsity completed the squad.

High-scoring Barry Brautigam again held down the pivot position while racking up a total of 510 points, 392 in section play, to set a W. P. I. A. L. record. Set-shooting Whitey Rebel held down a guard position and was runner-up in the scoring department with 281 points. Letterman Ron Nelson, who was noted for his passing and outstanding defensive work, dumped in a total of 159 points. The fourth senior in the starting lineup was Al Urich, who scored 183 points during the season. The only junior of the starting five was Jerry Mattys, a good scorer and dependable rebounder, who added 243 points

to the team's total. Senior substitutes Don Smith and Chuck Beck often stepped into the lineup and saved many a game with their timely shooting and rebounding. Tall Charley Carter and speedy Ron Eaton also saw considerable action.

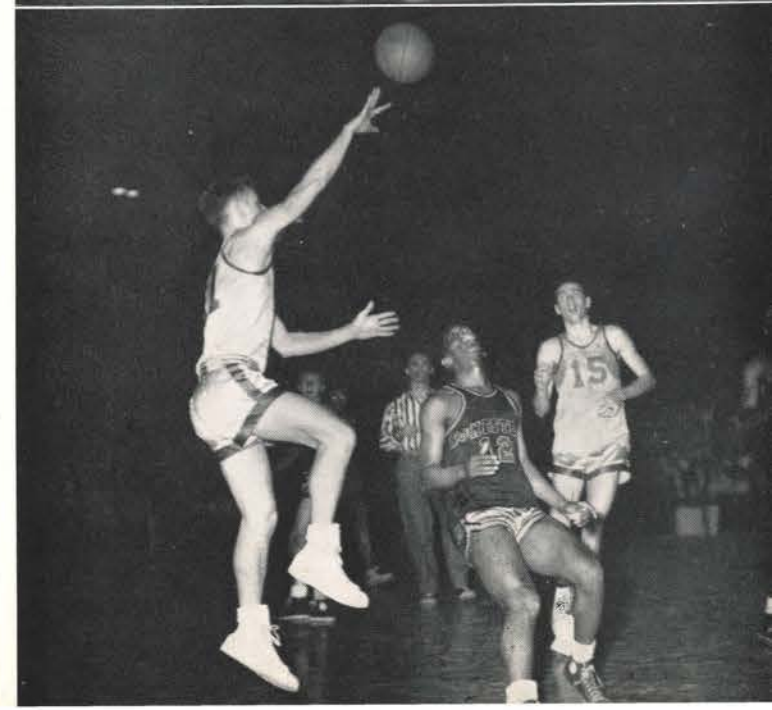
The Indians really got down to business in their section games. Successive wins over Coraopolis, Crafton, McKees Rocks, Clark, West Allegheny and Stowe gave the Viewers the section lead. Then Shaler scored a 75-56 victory over the Indians to throw the race into a tie. In the second half of the league schedule, West View got hot. A second victory over the Rox brought the lead back to West View; then disaster almost struck. In the closest game of the year at Crafton, the Indians were 14 points behind with but five minutes left to play. A last ditch rally led by Whitey Rebel and Brautigam's 16 points in the last quarter squeezed out a 70-69 victory and after that there was no stopping the high-flying Braves. Completing the league schedule without a defeat including a 64-45 revenge victory over Shaler gave West View the Section IX crown. On February 25 the Indians lost to a big Homestead team in the opening round of the W. P. I. A. L. tournament at the Pitt field house, 58-46.

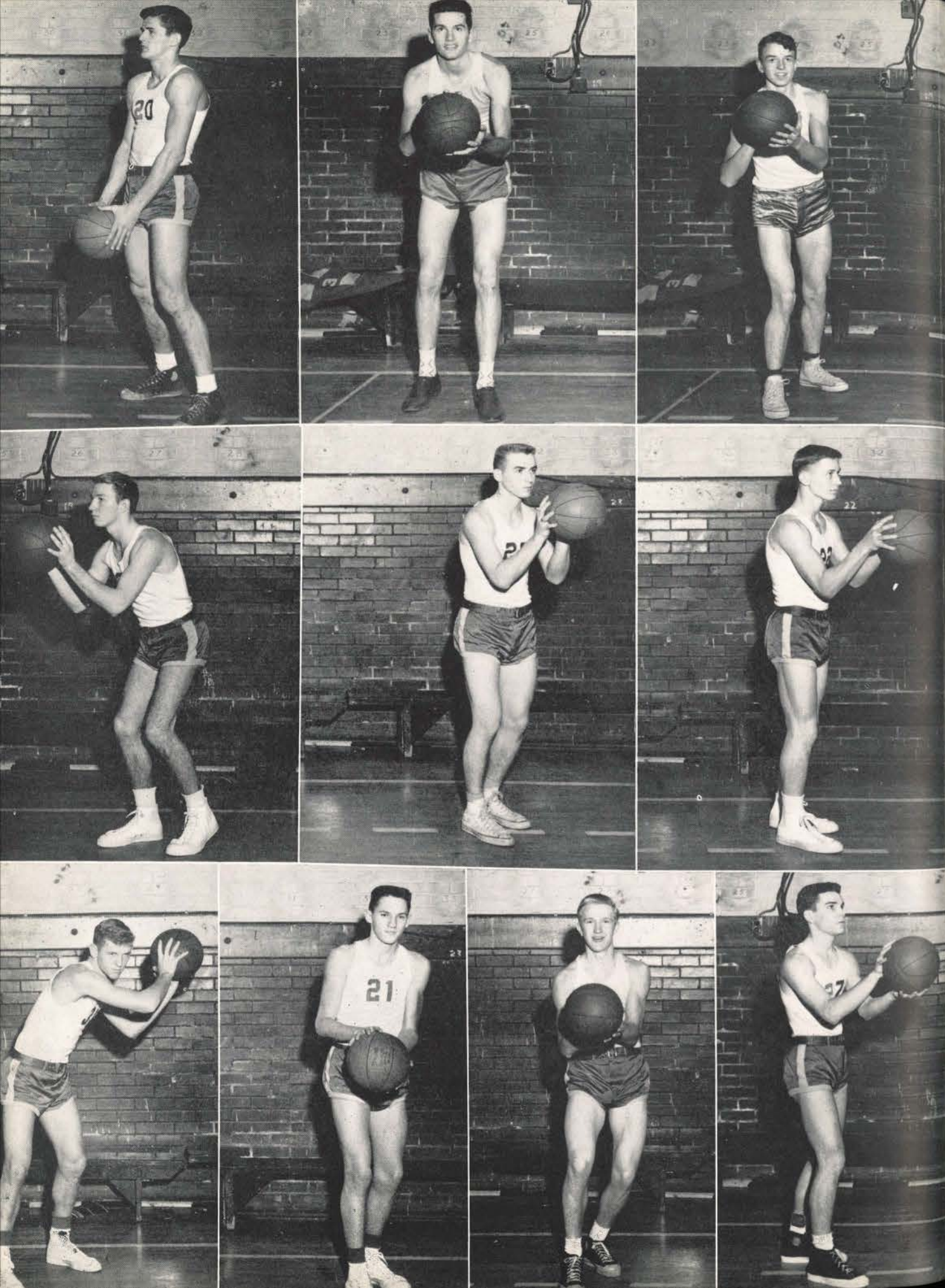

JUNIOR VARSITY BASKETBALL

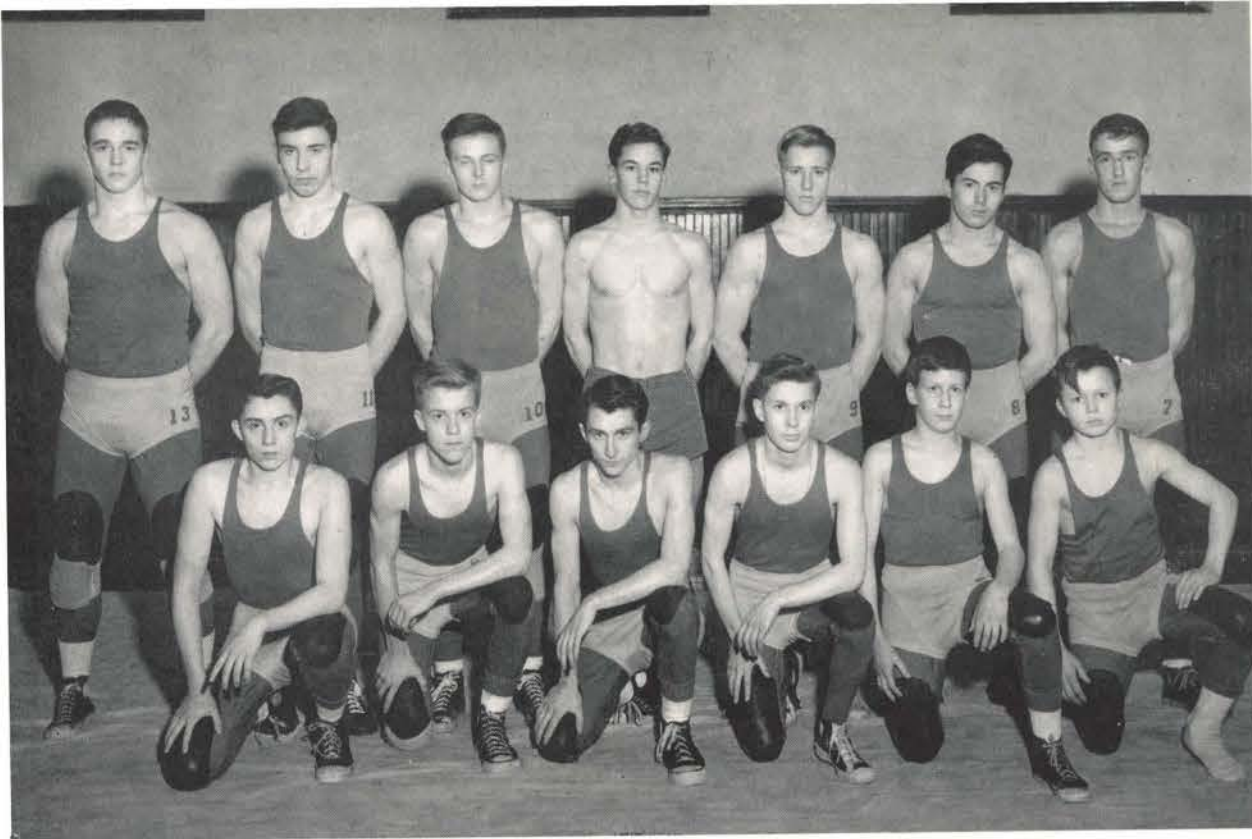

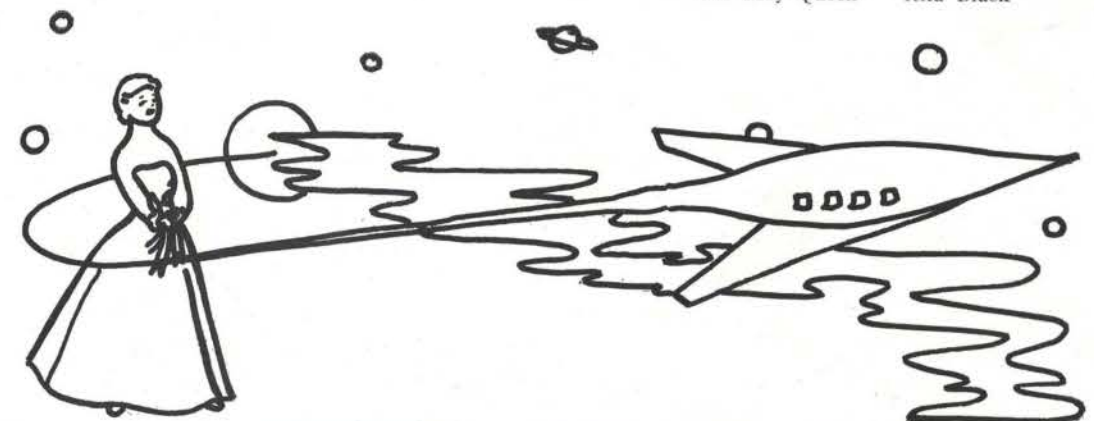
MAY FESTIVAL our "Miss Universe"

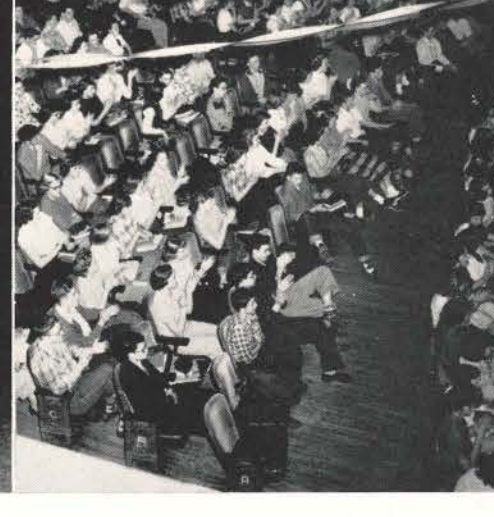
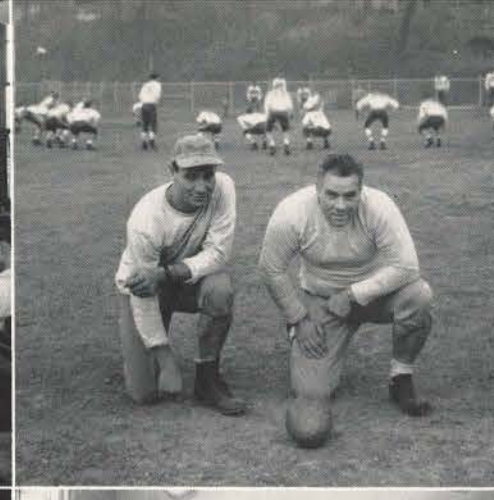
Records were played for those couples who wanted to dance during intermission. Non-dancers played ping-pong and shuffle board in Room 1.
