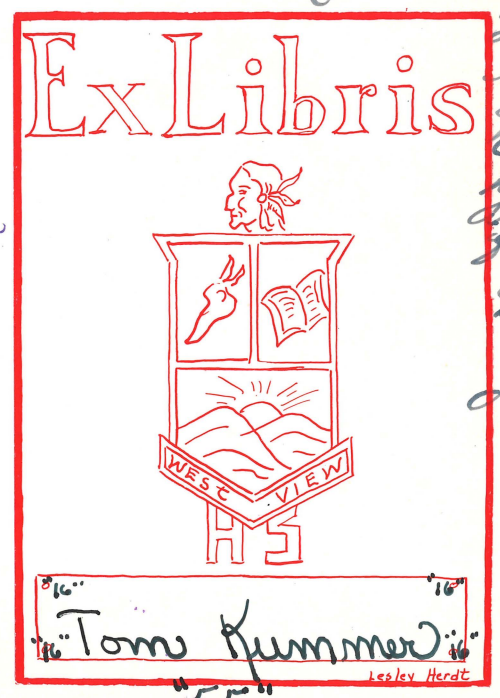

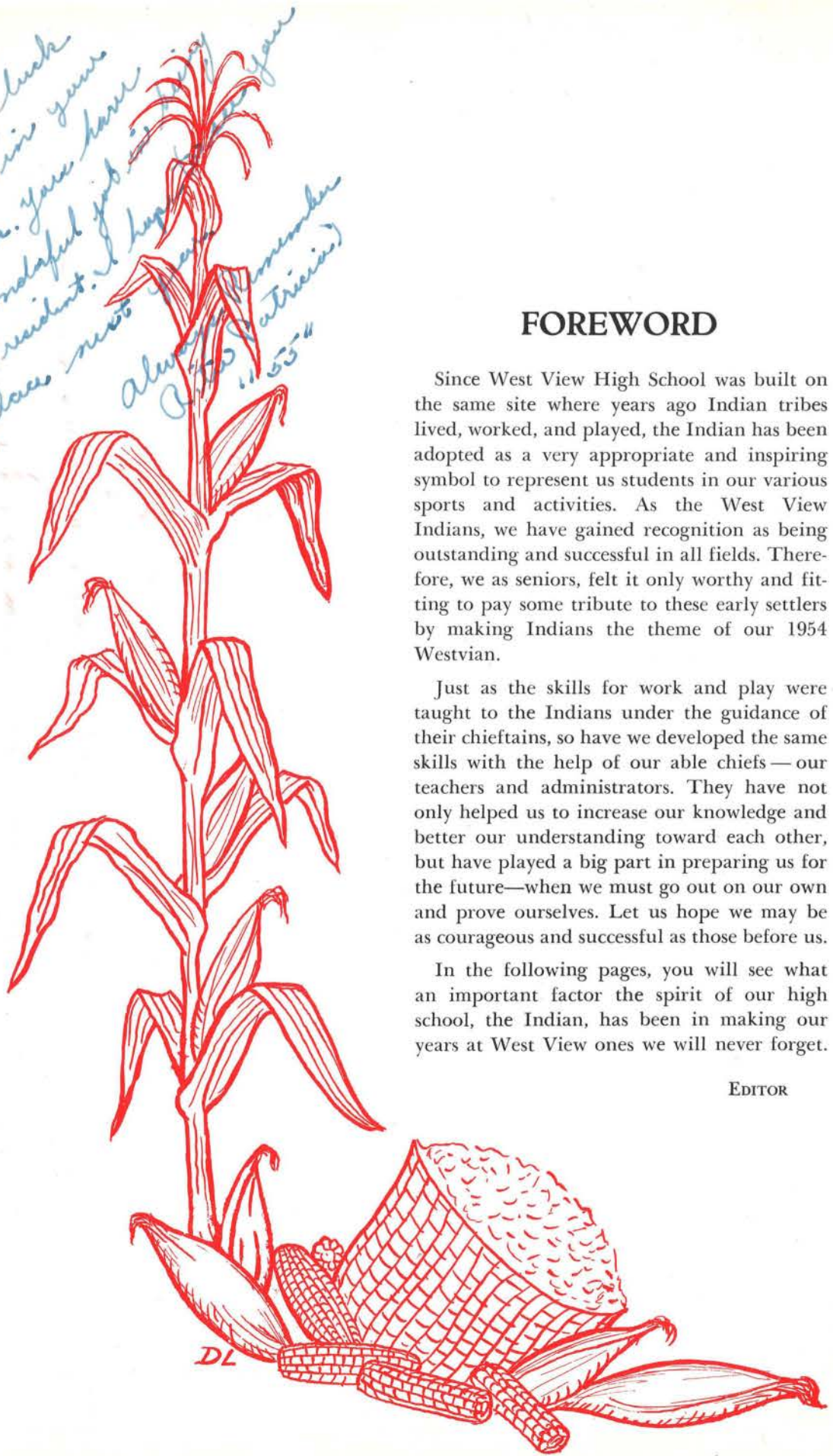

# FOREWORD

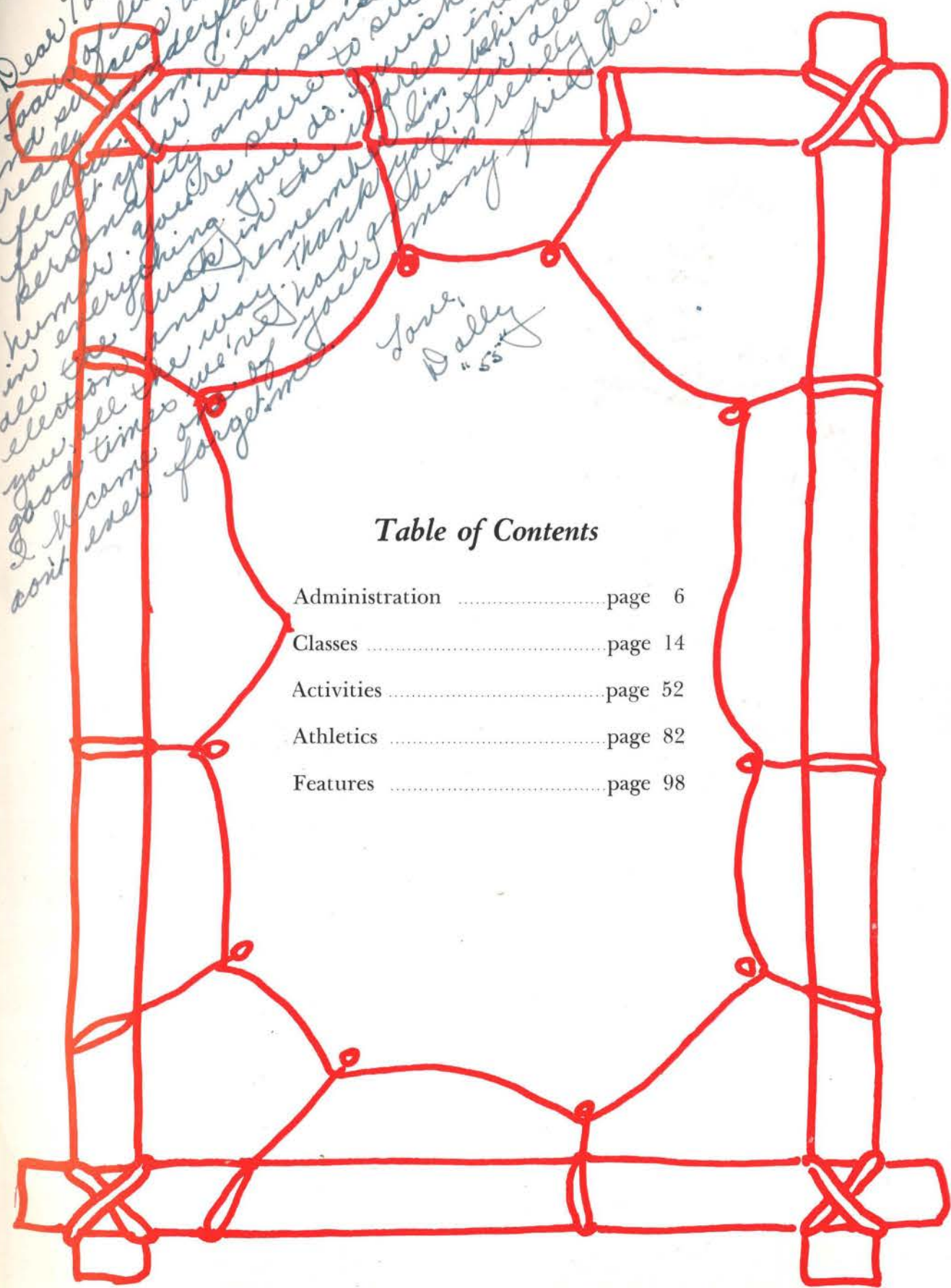

junior high school, but this plan met with disapproval by a large group of citizens who believed the new building should be a senior high school. This difference of opinion called for many extra meetings with parents, architects, and officials from Harrisburg.

The school board members have worked diligently and successfully and yet have received very little thanks or appreciation. But we know that they will always go on working for the benefit of the North Hills Joint School District.

azine campaign. It was up to our secretary of activities, Judy Moore, to schedule our many assemblies.

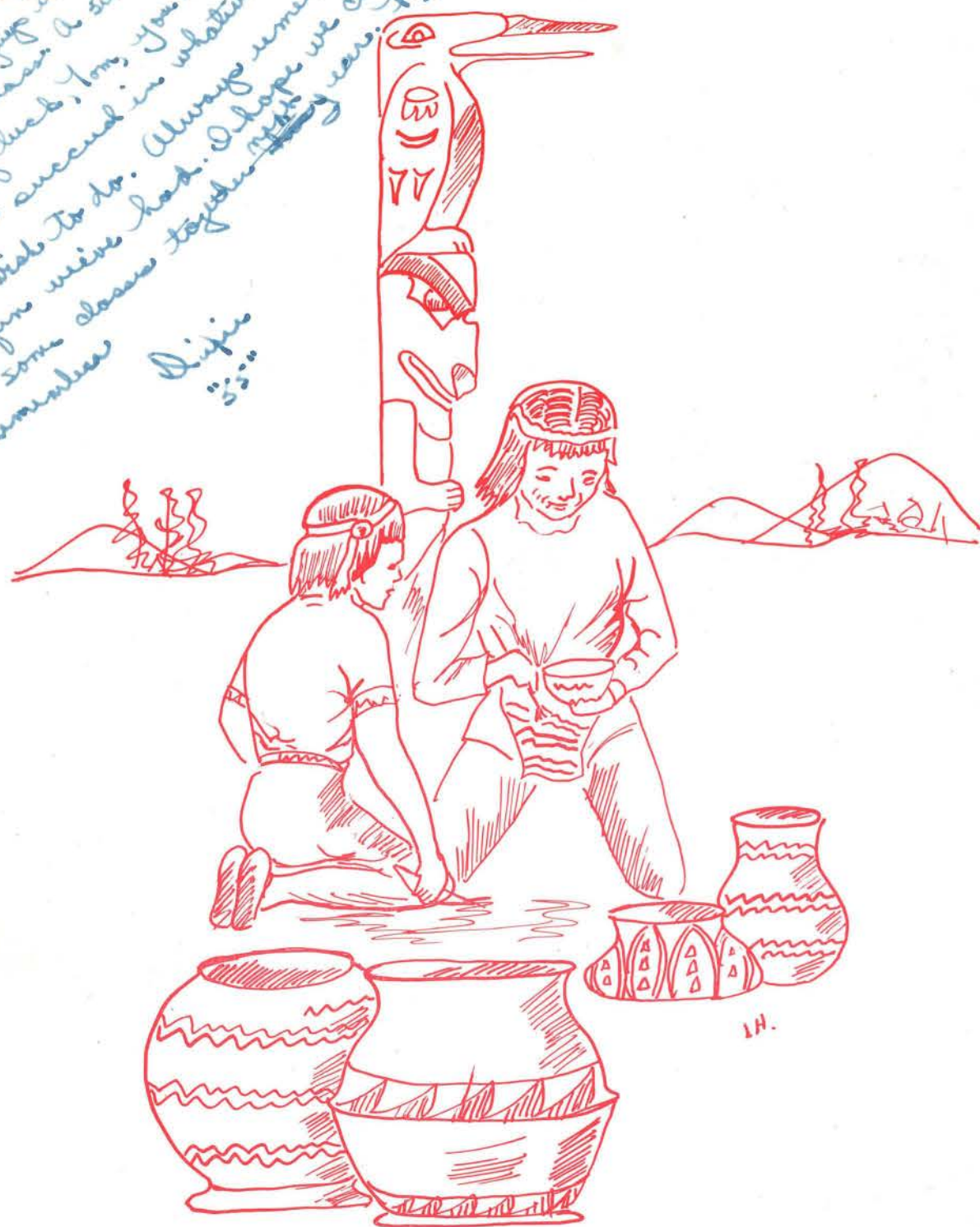

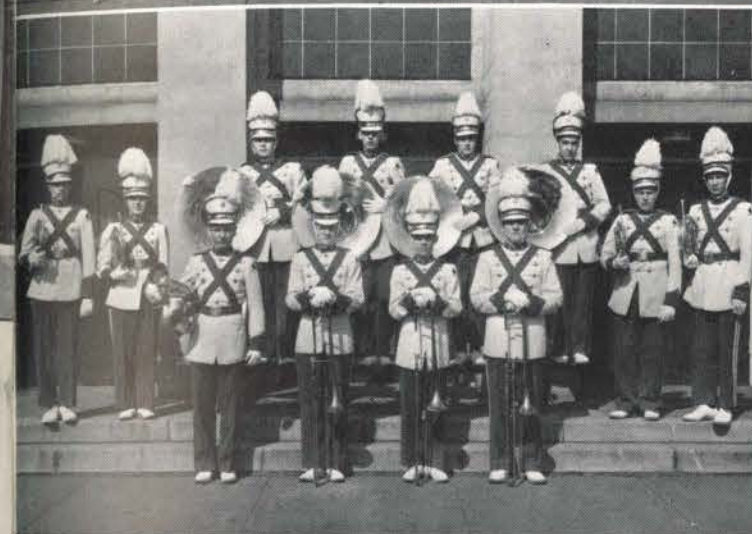
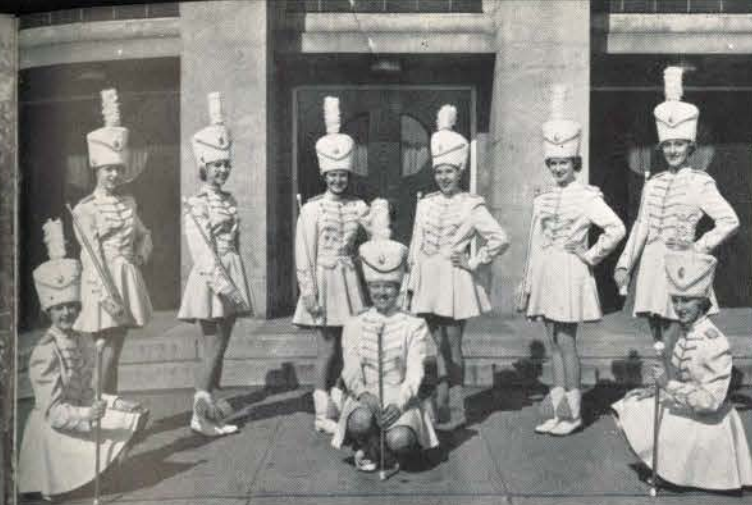
Some highlights of this year were the band's appearances at the Kiwanis Band Festival at

Along with the work there was play. Stunt night, skating parties, dances, picnics, and the annual spaghetti dinner and football game were all part of the band activities.

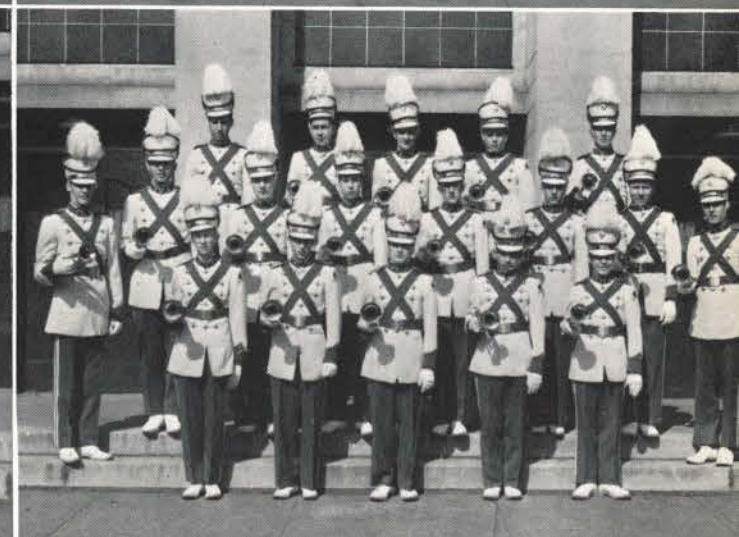
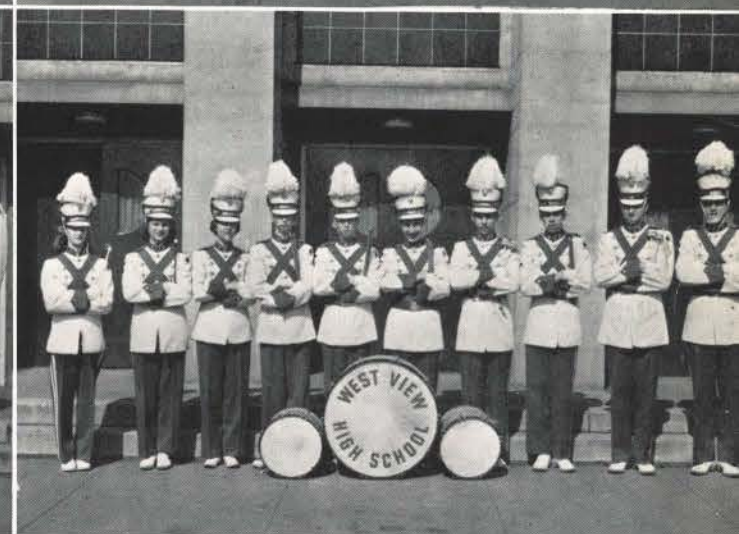
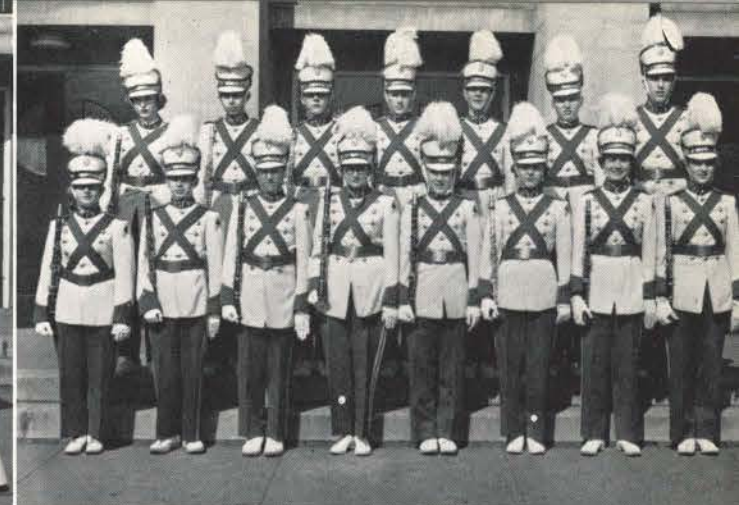

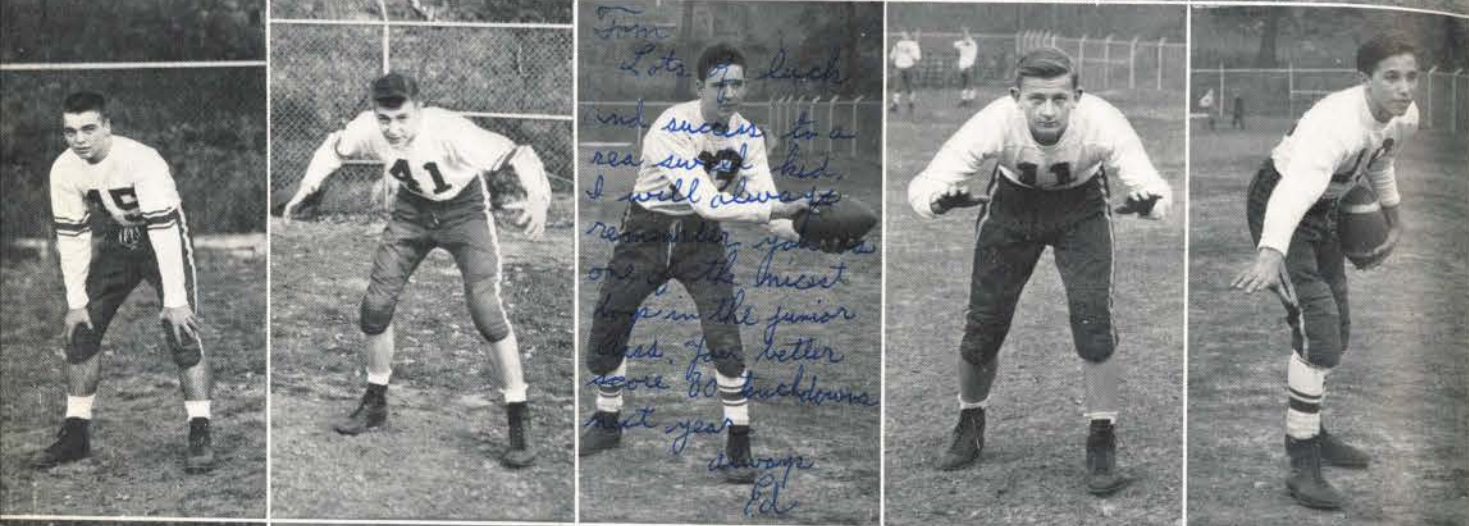

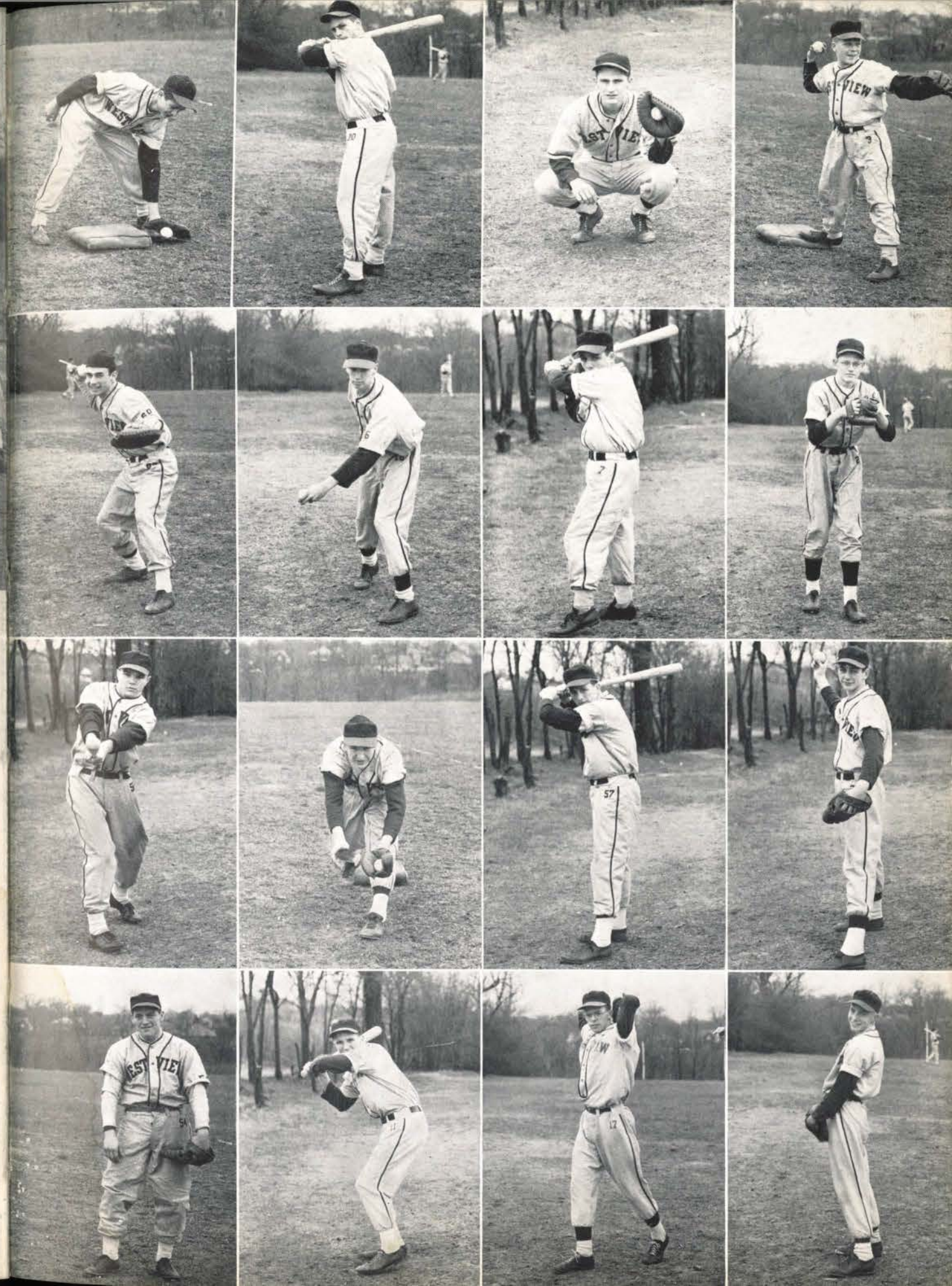
The outfield varied with Jim Geipel, Don Smith, Jack Nardulli, Milton Heim, Paul Bassett, and Don Cook alternating the assignments.

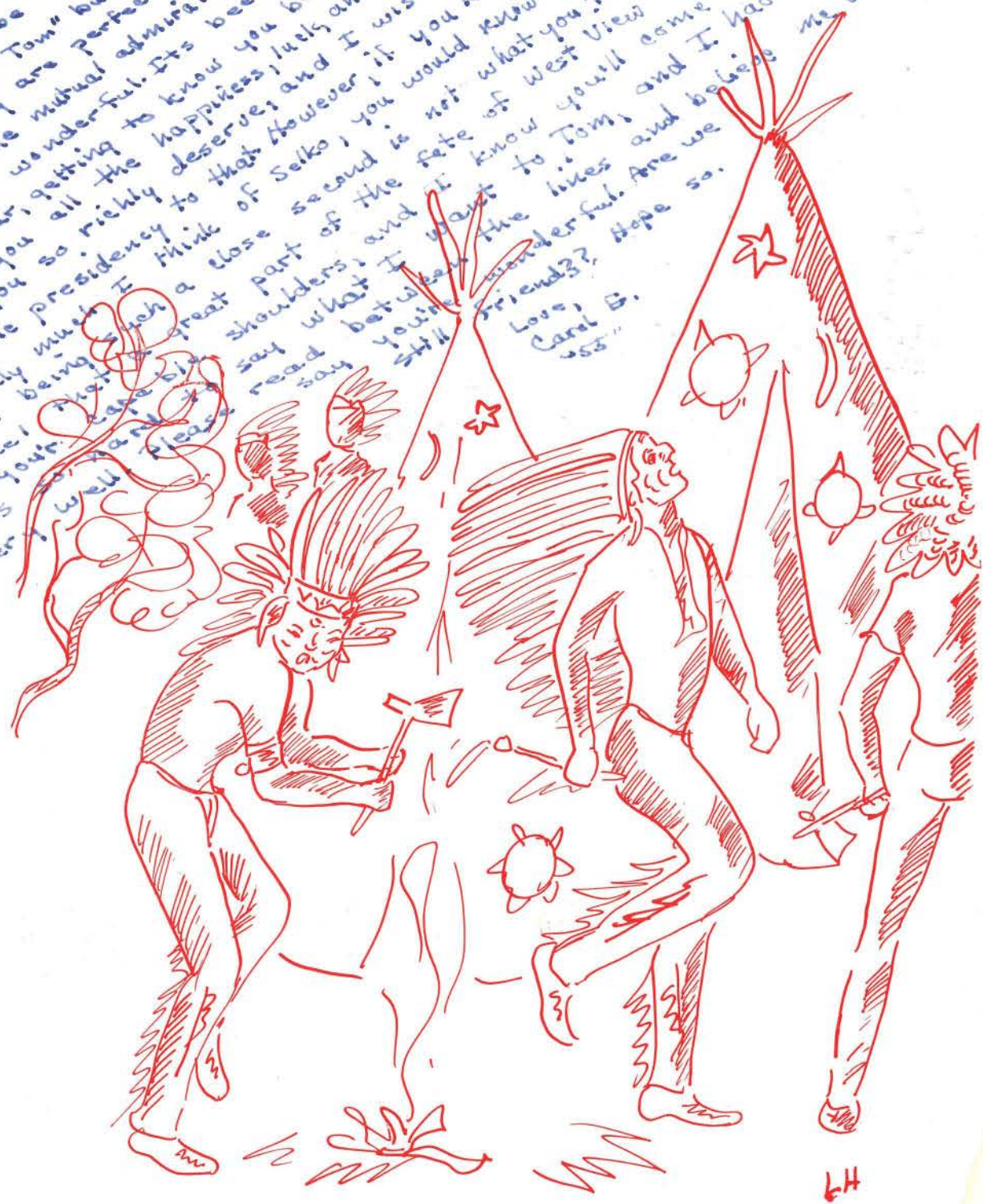

Although sponsored by our Student Council as a project, the Convention, even in its infant stages could be recognized as an enterprise for the entire community.
