


FOREWORD



BOARD OF EDUCATION the trail blazers

There was probably no group working harder for the improvement of our schools than the Board of Education. The members of this board were elected by the people from Ross Township and West View. They held many meetings to try to solve the school problems of this fast-growing community.

This has been a very trying year. In addition to their usual problems of hiring personnel, maintenance, and balancing the budget, they faced the problem of an overcrowded condition in all the schools, particularly the secondary schools. They voted to build a new junior high school, but this plan met with disapproval by a large group of citizens who believed the new building should be a senior high school. This difference of opinion called for many extra meetings with parents, architects, and officials from Harrisburg.

The school board members have worked diligently and successfully and yet have received very little thanks or appreciation. But we know that they will always go on working for the benefit of the North Hills Joint School District.


conducts intertribal pow-wows


STAGE CREW

The three lettermen returning—Ted Bowser Jerry Mattys, and Jack Nardulli—were also the co-captains.

Jerry Mattys played left end on both offense and defense this year. His skill in pass catching led the Indians to many touchdowns. Bob Schmitz was the right end, and he also played both offense and defense. Bob was outstanding in his fine defensive work. The tackles were Jack Nardulli and Paul Gaviglia. These boys provided the "punch" in the West View line. Paul Bassett and Bob Randolph were the guards until Paul became ill after the first game, and he was replaced by Dave Slemmer. August Nauman and Bob Hanna also did a fine job alternating on defense.

The third and fourth games with Oliver and Bellmar were cancelled due to the fact that four of the football players had the misfortune of contracting polio in the early part of the season. The next two games with Bellevue and McKees Rocks were 1-0 forfeitures by both both Town teams.

With the support of the entire student body behind them, the team resumed their schedule on October 24 as Shaler out came to West View. It was a hard-fought game with West View coming out on top, 21-19.

On the following Friday, the Indians traveled to Bethel where they played the most thrilling game of the season. West View came out on top with a score of 26-20. Touchdowns were scored by Weinzetl, Mattys, and Conrad with the help of offensive play by the rest of the team.

The ninth game on the schedule showed West View Tollard journeying to Clark High on November 6. The powerful and and Clark eleven proved too much for the Indians and gave them their only loss of the season 48-6. Bowser scored West View's lone touchdown on an eighty yard run in the final and quarter.

The final game of the season was with Arnold High School. The Arnold team was no match for West View, and the final score was 48-0.

Undoubtedly, the event that familiarized West View to outsiders more than any other during the year was the State Student Council Convention, to which the community played host for three days during October. Although sponsored by our Student Council as a project, the Convention, even in its infant stages could be recognized as an enterprise for the entire community.

When the Convention was mentioned in conversation among students, they did not remember it as a three-day event, but rather as a goal which took months to achieve. It was certain that when plans were formulated early last spring for the event, few people realized its proportions. But as the actual work got under way, it could be seen that the production of such an event would require intense planning, careful speculation, and a lot of hard work. Many people, under the supervision of Mr. Metz, prepared throughout the summer for the then fast-approaching date. When school commenced in September, the "Convention" became a by-word in classroom conversation. By October 1, the school was a veritable beehive of activity. Nightly sessions were held in "204" to take care of housing for delegates, registration, transportation, decorations, recreation, scheduling, and all the other phases of the event. Tension prevailed at fever-pitch during those weeks preceeding the big day.

The activities of everyone in the district were centered around our guests who, when all noses were finally counted, numbered over 700. A feat that all of us were proud of was that all 720 delegates were accommodated by volunteers in our own school district who, in many cases, sacrificed personal comfort for community success for those three days.

Neither guests nor hosts will forget for a long while the enjoyable activities at the Convention; the movie prevue at the Gerard Theatre of Edna Ferber's "So Big", the Get-Acquainted Dance in the Recreation Hall with our own Shuffle Shop band, the President's Dinner at Shannopin Country Club, and the band concert on the athletic field under Mr. Caruso's direction. And certainly none will ever forget the tremendous dinner dance at Danceland with Mr. William Craig's humorous reading and Baron Elliot's orchestra.

Probably the deepest impressions left on the delegates stemmed from the sessions of the convention themselves. The privilege of having Senator Kefauver speak to the first session was certainly appreciated by all who heard him. Mr. Gerald Van Poole of the National Association of Student Councils impressed everyone with his eloquence as a speaker. All who attended benefited greatly from the discussion groups and problem clinics held after the second session.

The highlight of the Convention in the eyes of all West View students occurred during the opening sessions when, just preceding Senator Kefauver's speech on the program, our own student president, Bob Kummer, gave his stirring oration, "Dare to be Leaders." The rafters rang with the well-chosen words of this message. Beautifully given, it surpassed all expectations of effectiveness as the Convention opener. The oration was so well thought of by the Senator that he had it published in the Congressional Record. Mr. Van Poole exclaimed after its closing, "That's the way every convention should be started."

Our first senior activity was held at Parish Hill in North Park on November 25. Winter was already on its way, which proved to be an inviting atmosphere.


The evening commenced with couples dancing to the tunes of the latest records, while others enjoyed themselves in a game of pingpong.

Our Senior Activity was an evening long to be remembered by every senior, and it was a good beginning for our last and best year.






JUNIOR PROM the spring festival


